12	OCCUPATIONAL THERAPY LICENSURE INTERSTATE COMPACT; AMENDING THE
13	OCCUPATIONAL THERAPY ACT TO PROVIDE FOR STATE AND FEDERAL
14	CRIMINAL HISTORY BACKGROUND CHECKS.
15	
16	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:
17	SECTION 1. [ <u>NEW MATERIAL</u> ] SHORT TITLESections 1
18	through l6 of this act may be cited as the "Occupational
19	Therapy Licensure Interstate Compact".
20	SECTION 2. [ <u>NEW MATERIAL</u> ] PURPOSEThe purpose of the
21	compact is to facilitate interstate practice of occupational
22	therapy with the goal of improving public access to
23	occupational therapy services. The practice of occupational
24	therapy occurs in the state where the patient or client is
25	located at the time of the patient or client encounter. The
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compact preserves the regulatory authority of states to protect public health and safety through the current system of state licensure. The compact is designed to achieve the following objectives:

A. increase public access to occupational therapy
services by providing for the mutual recognition of other
member state licenses;

8 B. enhance the states' ability to protect the
9 public's health and safety;

10 C. encourage the cooperation of member states in 11 regulating multistate occupational therapy practice;

D. support spouses of relocating military members;

E. enhance the exchange of licensure, investigative and disciplinary information between member states;

F. allow a remote state to hold a provider of services with a compact privilege in that state accountable to that state's practice standards; and

G. facilitate the use of telehealth technology in order to increase access to occupational therapy services.

SECTION 3. [<u>NEW MATERIAL</u>] DEFINITIONS.--As used in the Occupational Therapy Licensure Interstate Compact and except as otherwise provided:

A. "active duty military" means full-time duty status in the active uniformed service of the United States, including members of the national guard and reserve on active .230893.2

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1 duty orders pursuant to 10 U.S.C. Chapter 1209 and 10 U.S.C. 2 Chapter 1211;

3 Β. "adverse action" means any administrative, civil, equitable or criminal action permitted by a state's laws that is imposed by a licensing board or other authority against an occupational therapist or occupational therapy assistant, 7 including actions against an individual's license or compact 8 privilege such as censure, revocation, suspension, probation, 9 monitoring of the licensee or restriction on the licensee's 10 practice;

C. "alternative program" means a non-disciplinary monitoring process approved by an occupational therapy licensing board;

D. "compact privilege" means the authorization, which is equivalent to a license, granted by a remote state to allow a licensee from another member state to practice as an occupational therapist or practice as an occupational therapy assistant in the remote state under its laws and rules. The practice of occupational therapy occurs in the member state where the patient or client is located at the time of the patient or client encounter;

"continuing competence" or "continuing Ε. education" means a requirement, as a condition of license renewal, to provide evidence of participation in and completion of educational and professional activities relevant to practice .230893.2

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or area of work;

2	F. "current significant investigative information"
3	means investigative information that a licensing board, after
4	an inquiry or investigation that includes notification and an
5	opportunity for the occupational therapist or occupational
6	therapy assistant to respond, if required by state law, has
7	reason to believe is not groundless and if proved true would
8	indicate more than a minor infraction;
9	G. "data system" means a repository of information
10	about licensees, including license status, investigative
11	information, compact privileges and adverse actions;
12	H. "encumbered license" means a license in which an
13	adverse action restricts the practice of occupational therapy
14	by the licensee or said adverse action has been reported to the
15	national practitioner data bank;
16	I. "executive committee" means a group of directors
17	elected or appointed to act on behalf of and within the powers
18	granted to them by the commission;
19	J. "home state" means the member state that is the
20	licensee's primary state of residence;
21	K. "impaired practitioner" means an individual
22	whose professional practice is adversely affected by substance
23	abuse, addiction or other health-related conditions;
24	L. "investigative information" means information,
25	records, or documents received or generated by an occupational
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1 therapy licensing board pursuant to an investigation; 2 "jurisprudence requirement" means the assessment М. 3 of an individual's knowledge of the laws and rules governing 4 the practice of occupational therapy in a state; "licensee" means an individual who currently 5 Ν. 6 holds an authorization from a state to practice as an 7 occupational therapist or as an occupational therapy assistant; 8 0. "member state" means a state that has enacted 9 the compact; 10 Ρ. "occupational therapist" means an individual who is licensed by a state to practice occupational therapy; 11 12 "occupational therapy assistant" means an Q. 13 individual who is licensed by a state to assist in the practice 14 of occupational therapy; "occupational therapy", "occupational therapy 15 R. 16 practice" and the "practice of occupational therapy" mean the care and services provided by an occupational therapist or an 17 occupational therapy assistant as set forth in a member state's 18 19 statutes and regulations; 20 s. "occupational therapy compact commission" or "commission" means the national administrative body whose 21 membership consists of all states that have enacted the 22 23 compact; т. "occupational therapy licensing board" or 24 25 "licensing board" means the agency of a state that is .230893.2

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1 authorized to license and regulate occupational therapists and 2 occupational therapy assistants;

U. "primary state of residence" means the home state in which an occupational therapist or occupational therapy assistant who is not active duty military declares a primary residence for legal purposes as verified by the person's driver's license, federal income tax return, lease, deed, mortgage or voter registration or other verifying documentation as further defined by commission rules;

10 V. "remote state" means a member state other than 11 the home state where a licensee is exercising or seeking to 12 exercise the compact privilege;

W. "rule" means a regulation promulgated by the commission that has the force of law;

X. "state" means any state, commonwealth, district or territory of the United States that regulates the practice of occupational therapy;

Y. "single-state license" means an occupational therapist or occupational therapy assistant license issued by a member state that authorizes practice only within the issuing state and does not include a compact privilege in any other member state; and

Z. "telehealth" means the application of telecommunication technology to deliver occupational therapy services for assessment, intervention or consultation.

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1 [NEW MATERIAL] STATE PARTICIPATION IN THE SECTION 4. 2 COMPACT . --3 Α. To participate in the compact, a member state 4 shall: 5 license occupational therapists and (1)6 occupational therapy assistants; 7 (2) participate fully in the commission's data 8 system, including using the commission's unique identifier as 9 defined in rules of the commission; 10 have a mechanism in place for receiving (3) 11 and investigating complaints about licensees; 12 (4) notify the commission, in compliance with 13 the terms of the compact and rules, of any adverse action or 14 the availability of investigative information regarding a 15 licensee; 16 (5) implement or utilize procedures for considering the criminal history records of applicants for an 17 18 initial compact privilege. These procedures shall include the 19 submission of fingerprints or other biometric-based information 20 by applicants for the purpose of obtaining an applicant's 21 criminal history record information from the federal bureau of investigation and the agency responsible for retaining that 22 23 state's criminal records within a time frame established by the When a member state receives the results of the 24 commission. 25 federal bureau of investigation criminal record search, the .230893.2 - 7 -

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1	member state shall use the results in making licensure
2	decisions. Communication between a member state and the
3	commission and among member states regarding the verification
4	of eligibility for licensure through the compact shall not
5	include any information received from the federal bureau of
6	investigation relating to a federal criminal records check
7	performed by a member state under Public Law 92-544;
8	(6) comply with the rules of the commission;
9	(7) utilize only a recognized national
10	examination as a requirement for licensure pursuant to the
11	rules of the commission; and
12	(8) have continuing competence or continuing
13	education requirements as a condition for license renewal.
14	B. A member state shall grant the compact privilege
15	to a licensee holding a valid unencumbered license in another
16	member state in accordance with the terms of the compact and
17	rules.
18	C. Member states may charge a fee for granting a
19	compact privilege.
20	D. A member state shall provide for the state's
21	delegate to attend all occupational therapy compact commission
22	meetings.
23	E. Individuals not residing in a member state shall
24	continue to be able to apply for a member state's single-state
25	license as provided under the laws of each member state.
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1 However, the single-state license granted to these individuals 2 shall not be recognized as granting the compact privilege in 3 any other member state. 4 F. Nothing in the compact shall affect the 5 requirements established by a member state for the issuance of a single-state license. 6 7 SECTION 5. [NEW MATERIAL] COMPACT PRIVILEGE .--8 To exercise the compact privilege under the Α. 9 terms and provisions of the compact, the licensee shall: 10 (1) hold a license in the home state; 11 (2) have a valid United States social security 12 number or national practitioner identification number; 13 have no encumbrance on any state license; (3) 14 (4) be eligible for a compact privilege in any 15 member state in accordance with Subsections D, F, G and H of 16 this section; (5) have paid all fines and completed all 17 18 requirements resulting from any adverse action against any license or compact privilege, and two years have elapsed from 19 20 the date of such completion; 21 (6) notify the commission that the licensee is 22 seeking the compact privilege within a remote state; 23 (7) pay any applicable fees, including any state fee, for the compact privilege; 24 25 (8) complete a criminal background check in .230893.2 - 9 -

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1 accordance with Section 4 of the Occupational Therapy Licensure 2 Interstate Compact. The licensee shall be responsible for the 3 payment of any fee associated with the completion of a criminal 4 background check;

5 (9) meet any jurisprudence requirements 6 established by the remote state or states in which the licensee 7 is seeking a compact privilege; and

(10) report to the commission adverse action taken by any nonmember state within thirty days from the date 10 the adverse action is taken.

Β. The compact privilege is valid until the expiration date of the home state license. The licensee must comply with the requirements of Subsection A of this section to maintain the compact privilege in the remote state.

A licensee providing occupational therapy in a C. remote state under the compact privilege shall function within the laws and regulations of the remote state.

Occupational therapy assistants practicing in a D. remote state shall be supervised by an occupational therapist licensed or holding a compact privilege in that remote state.

Ε. A licensee providing occupational therapy in a remote state is subject to that state's regulatory authority. A remote state may, in accordance with due process and that state's laws, remove a licensee's compact privilege in the remote state for a specific period of time, impose fines or .230893.2

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1 take any other necessary actions to protect the health and 2 safety of its citizens. The licensee may be ineligible for a 3 compact privilege in any state until the specific time for 4 removal has passed and all fines are paid. 5 If a home state license is encumbered, the F. 6 licensee shall lose the compact privilege in any remote state 7 until the following occur: 8 (1) the home state license is no longer 9 encumbered; and 10 two years have elapsed from the date on (2) which the home state license became unencumbered. 11 12 G. Once an encumbered license in the home state is 13 restored to good standing, the licensee must meet the 14 requirements of Subsection A of this section to obtain a 15 compact privilege in any remote state. 16 H. If a licensee's compact privilege in any remote 17 state is removed, the individual may lose the compact privilege in any other remote state until the following occur: 18 19 (1)the specific period of time for which the 20 compact privilege was removed has ended; all fines have been paid and all 21 (2) conditions have been met; 22 (3) two years have elapsed from the date in 23 which the requirements in Paragraphs (1) and (2) of this 24 25 subsection were completed; and .230893.2 - 11 -

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1 (4) the compact privileges are reinstated by 2 the commission, and the compact data system is updated to 3 reflect reinstatement. 4 If a licensee's compact privilege in any remote I. 5 state is removed due to an erroneous charge, privileges shall 6 be restored through the compact data system. 7 Once the requirements of Subsection H have been J. 8 met, the licensee must meet the requirements in Subsection A of 9 this section to obtain a compact privilege in a remote state. 10 [NEW MATERIAL] OBTAINING A NEW HOME STATE SECTION 6. 11 LICENSE BY VIRTUE OF COMPACT PRIVILEGE .--12 An occupational therapist or occupational Α. 13 therapy assistant may hold a home state license, which allows 14 for compact privileges in member states, in only one member 15 state at a time. 16 Β. If an occupational therapist or occupational 17 therapy assistant changes primary state of residence by moving 18 between two member states: 19 (1) the occupational therapist or occupational 20 therapy assistant shall file an application for obtaining a new 21 home state license by virtue of a compact privilege, pay all 22 applicable fees and notify the current and new home state in 23 accordance with applicable rules adopted by the commission; (2) upon receipt of an application for 24 25 obtaining a new home state license by virtue of compact .230893.2 - 12 -

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1 privilege, the new home state shall verify that the occupational therapist or occupational therapy assistant meets the pertinent criteria outlined in Section 5 of the Occupational Therapy Licensure Interstate Compact via the data system, without need for primary source verification except for: a federal bureau of investigation (a) fingerprint-based criminal background check, if not previously performed or updated pursuant to applicable rules adopted by the commission in accordance with Public Law 92-544; any other criminal background check (b) as required by the new home state; and submission of any requisite (c) jurisprudence requirements of the new home state; the former home state shall convert the (3) former home state license into a compact privilege once the new home state has activated the new home state license in accordance with applicable rules adopted by the commission; (4) notwithstanding any other provision of the compact, if the occupational therapist or occupational therapy assistant cannot meet the requirements in Section 5 of the Occupational Therapy Licensure Interstate Compact, the new home state shall apply its requirements for issuing a new singlestate license; and (5) the occupational therapist or the

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1 occupational therapy assistant shall pay all applicable fees to 2 the new home state in order to be issued a new home state 3 license.

C. If an occupational therapist or occupational therapy assistant changes primary state of residence by moving from a member state to a nonmember state, or from a nonmember state to a member state, the state criteria shall apply for issuance of a single-state license in the new state.

D. Nothing in the compact shall interfere with a licensee's ability to hold a single-state license in multiple states; however, for the purposes of the compact, a licensee shall have only one home state license.

E. Nothing in the compact shall affect the requirements established by a member state for the issuance of a single-state license.

SECTION 7. [NEW MATERIAL] ACTIVE DUTY MILITARY PERSONNEL OR THEIR SPOUSES.--Active duty military personnel, or their spouses, shall designate a home state where the individual has a current license in good standing. The individual may retain the home state designation during the period the service member is on active duty. Subsequent to designating a home state, the individual shall only change the individual's home state through application for licensure in the new state or through the process described in Section 6 of the Occupational Therapy Licensure Interstate Compact.

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1 [NEW MATERIAL] ADVERSE ACTIONS .--SECTION 8. 2 A home state shall have exclusive power to Α. 3 impose adverse action against an occupational therapist's or 4 occupational therapy assistant's license issued by the home 5 state. 6 Β. In addition to the other powers conferred by 7 state law, a remote state shall have the authority, in 8 accordance with existing state due process law, to: 9 take adverse action against an (1) 10 occupational therapist's or occupational therapy assistant's 11 compact privilege within that member state; and 12 issue subpoenas for both hearings and (2) 13 investigations that require the attendance and testimony of 14 witnesses as well as the production of evidence. Subpoenas 15 issued by a licensing board in a member state for the 16 attendance and testimony of witnesses or the production of 17 evidence from another member state shall be enforced in the 18 latter state by any court of competent jurisdiction according 19 to the practice and procedure of that court applicable to 20 subpoenas issued in proceedings pending before it. The issuing 21 authority shall pay any witness fees, travel expenses, mileage 22 and other fees required by the service statutes of the state in 23 which the witnesses or evidence are located. 24 C.

C. For purposes of taking adverse action, the home state shall give the same priority and effect to reported

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conduct received from a member state as it would if the conduct had occurred within the home state. In so doing, the home state shall apply its own state laws to determine appropriate action.

D. The home state shall complete any pending investigations of an occupational therapist or occupational therapy assistant who changes primary state of residence during the course of the investigations. The home state shall also have the authority to take appropriate action and shall promptly report the conclusions of the investigations to the data system. The data system administrator shall promptly notify the new home state of any adverse actions.

E. If otherwise permitted by state law, a member state may recover from the affected occupational therapist or occupational therapy assistant the costs of investigations and disposition of cases resulting from any adverse action taken against that occupational therapist or occupational therapy assistant.

F. A member state may take adverse action based on the factual findings of the remote state, provided that the member state follows its own procedures for taking the adverse action.

G. In addition to the authority granted to a member state by its respective state occupational therapy laws and regulations or other applicable state law, any member state may .230893.2

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participate with other member states in joint investigations of licensees. Member states shall share any investigative, litigation or compliance materials in furtherance of any joint or individual investigation initiated under the compact.

Η. If adverse action is taken by the home state against an occupational therapist's or occupational therapy 7 assistant's license, the occupational therapist's or 8 occupational therapy assistant's compact privilege in all other member states shall be deactivated until all encumbrances have 10 been removed from the state license. All home state disciplinary orders that impose adverse action against an 12 occupational therapist's or occupational therapy assistant's license shall include a statement that the occupational therapist's or occupational therapy assistant's compact privilege is deactivated in all member states during the pendency of the order.

Τ. If a member state takes adverse action, it shall promptly notify the administrator of the data system. The administrator of the data system shall promptly notify the home state of any adverse actions by remote states.

Nothing in the compact shall override a member J. state's decision that participation in an alternative program may be used in lieu of adverse action.

SECTION 9. [NEW MATERIAL] OCCUPATIONAL THERAPY COMPACT COMMISSION--CREATED.--

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1 Α. The compact member states hereby create and 2 establish a joint public agency known as the "occupational 3 therapy compact commission", subject to the following 4 provisions: 5 the commission is an instrumentality of (1)6 the compact states; 7 (2) venue is proper and judicial proceedings 8 by or against the commission shall be brought solely and 9 exclusively in a court of competent jurisdiction where the 10 principal office of the commission is located. The commission 11 may waive venue and jurisdictional defenses to the extent it 12 adopts or consents to participate in alternative dispute 13 resolution proceedings; and 14 (3) nothing in the compact shall be construed 15 to be a waiver of sovereign immunity. 16 Β. Membership, voting and meetings of the 17 commission shall proceed as follows: 18 each member state shall have and be (1) 19 limited to one delegate selected by that member state's 20 licensing board. The delegate shall be either: 21 (a) a current member of the licensing 22 board who is an occupational therapist, occupational therapy 23 assistant or public member; or 24 an administrator of the licensing (b) 25 board; .230893.2 - 18 -

1 any delegate may be removed or suspended (2) 2 from office as provided by the law of the state from which the 3 delegate is appointed; 4 (3) the member state licensing board shall fill any vacancy occurring in the commission within ninety 5 6 days; 7 each delegate shall be entitled to one (4) vote with regard to the promulgation of rules and creation of 8 9 bylaws and shall otherwise have an opportunity to participate 10 in the business and affairs of the commission; a delegate shall vote in person or by such 11 (5) 12 other means as provided in the bylaws. The bylaws may provide for delegates' participation in meetings by telephone or other 13 14 means of communication; the commission shall meet at least once 15 (6) 16 during each calendar year. Additional meetings shall be held as set forth in the bylaws; and 17 (7) the commission shall establish by rule a 18 19 term of office for delegates. 20 C. The commission shall: establish a code of ethics for the 21 (1)commission; 22 establish the fiscal year of the 23 (2) commission; 24 25 (3) establish bylaws; .230893.2 - 19 -

1	(4) maintain its financial records in
2	accordance with the bylaws;
3	(5) meet and take such actions as are
4	consistent with the provisions of the compact and the bylaws;
5	(6) promulgate uniform rules to facilitate and
6	coordinate implementation and administration of the compact.
7	The rules shall have the force and effect of law and shall be
8	binding in all member states;
9	(7) bring and prosecute legal proceedings or
10	actions in the name of the commission; provided that the
11	standing of any state occupational therapy licensing board to
12	sue or be sued under applicable law shall not be affected;
13	(8) purchase and maintain insurance and bonds;
14	(9) borrow, accept or contract for services of
15	personnel, including employees of a member state;
16	(10) hire employees, elect or appoint
17	officers, fix compensation, define duties, grant such
18	individuals appropriate authority to carry out the purposes of
19	the compact and establish the commission's personnel policies
20	and programs relating to conflicts of interest, qualifications
21	of personnel and other related personnel matters;
22	(11) accept any and all appropriate donations
23	and grants of money, equipment, supplies, materials and
24	services and receive, utilize and dispose of the same; provided
25	that at all times the commission shall avoid any appearance of
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1	<pre>impropriety or conflict of interest;</pre>
2	(12) lease, purchase, accept appropriate gifts
3	or donations of, or otherwise own, hold, improve or use, any
4	property, whether real, personal or mixed; provided that at all
5	times the commission shall avoid any appearance of impropriety;
6	(13) sell, convey, mortgage, pledge, lease,
7	exchange, abandon or otherwise dispose of any property, whether
8	real, personal or mixed;
9	(14) establish a budget and make expenditures;
10	(15) borrow money;
11	(16) appoint committees, including standing
12	committees composed of members, state regulators, state
13	legislators or their representatives, consumer representatives
14	and such other interested persons as may be designated in the
15	compact and the bylaws;
16	(17) provide and receive information from, and
17	cooperate with, law enforcement agencies;
18	(18) establish and elect an executive
19	committee; and
20	(19) perform such other functions as may be
21	necessary or appropriate to achieve the purposes of the compact
22	consistent with the state regulation of occupational therapy
23	licensure and practice.
24	D. The executive committee shall have the power to
25	act on behalf of the commission according to the terms of the
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1	compact and shall be composed of nine members as follows:
2	(1) seven voting members who are elected by
3	the commission from the current membership of the commission;
4	(2) one nonvoting ex-officio member from a
5	recognized national occupational therapy professional
6	association; and
7	(3) one nonvoting ex-officio member from a
8	recognized national occupational therapy certification
9	organization.
10	E. The ex-officio members of the executive
11	committee shall be selected by their respective organizations.
12	F. The commission may remove any member of the
13	executive committee as provided in bylaws.
14	G. The executive committee shall meet at least
15	annually.
16	H. The executive committee shall have the following
17	duties and responsibilities:
18	(1) recommend to the entire commission changes
19	to the rules or bylaws, changes to the compact legislation,
20	fees paid by compact member states, such as annual dues and any
21	commission compact fee charged to licensees for the compact
22	privilege;
23	(2) ensure that compact administration
24	services are appropriately provided, contractual or otherwise;
25	(3) prepare and recommend a budget;
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1	(4) maintain financial records on behalf of
2	the commission;
3	(5) monitor compact compliance of member
4	states and provide compliance reports to the commission;
5	(6) establish additional committees as
6	necessary; and
7	(7) carry out other duties as provided in
8	rules or bylaws.
9	I. All meetings of the commission shall be open to
10	the public, and public notice of meetings shall be given in the
11	same manner as required under the rulemaking provisions in
12	Section 12 of the Occupational Therapy Licensure Interstate
13	Compact.
14	J. The commission or the executive committee or
15	other committees of the commission may convene in a closed,
16	nonpublic meeting if the commission or executive committee or
17	other committees of the commission must discuss:
18	(1) noncompliance of a member state with its
19	obligations under the compact;
20	(2) the employment, compensation, discipline
21	or other matters, practices or procedures related to specific
22	employees or other matters related to the commission's internal
23	personnel practices and procedures;
24	(3) current, threatened or reasonably
25	anticipated litigation;
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1	(4) negotiation of contracts for the purchase,
2	lease or sale of goods, services or real estate;
3	(5) accusations made of any person of a crime
4	or formal censuring of any person;
5	(6) disclosure of trade secrets or commercial
6	or financial information that is privileged or confidential;
7	(7) disclosure of information of a personal
8	nature where disclosure would constitute a clearly unwarranted
9	invasion of personal privacy;
10	(8) disclosure of investigative records
11	compiled for law enforcement purposes;
12	(9) disclosure of information related to any
13	investigative reports prepared by or on behalf of or for use of
14	the commission or other committee charged with responsibility
15	of investigation or determination of compliance issues pursuant
16	to the compact; or
17	(10) matters specifically exempted from
18	disclosure by federal or member state statute.
19	K. If a meeting, or portion of a meeting, is closed
20	pursuant to Subsection J of this section, the commission's
21	legal counsel or designee shall certify that the meeting may be
22	closed and shall reference each relevant exempting provision.
23	L. The commission shall keep minutes that fully and
24	clearly describe all matters discussed in a meeting and shall
25	provide a full and accurate summary of actions taken, and the
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reasons therefore, including a description of the views expressed. All documents considered in connection with an action shall be identified in the minutes. All minutes and documents of a closed meeting shall remain under seal, subject to release by a majority vote of the commission or order of a court of competent jurisdiction.

The commission shall pay, or provide for the Μ. payment of, the reasonable expenses of its establishment, organization and ongoing activities. The commission may accept any and all appropriate revenue sources, donations and grants of money, equipment, supplies, materials and services. The commission may levy on and collect an annual assessment from each member state or impose fees on other parties to cover the cost of the operations and activities of the commission and its staff, which must be in a total amount sufficient to cover its annual budget as approved by the commission each year for which revenue is not provided by other sources. The aggregate annual assessment amount shall be allocated based upon a formula to be determined by the commission, which shall promulgate a rule binding upon all member states.

N. The commission shall not incur obligations of any kind prior to securing the funds adequate to meet the obligations; nor shall the commission pledge the credit of any of the member states, except by and with the authority of the member state.

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1 0. The commission shall keep accurate accounts of 2 all receipts and disbursements. The receipts and disbursements 3 of the commission shall be subject to the audit and accounting 4 procedures established under its bylaws. However, all receipts 5 and disbursements of funds handled by the commission shall be audited yearly by a certified or licensed public accountant, 6 7 and the report of the audit shall be included in and become 8 part of the annual report of the commission. 9 SECTION 10. [NEW MATERIAL] QUALIFIED IMMUNITY, DEFENSE

10 AND INDEMNIFICATION.--

A. The members, officers, executive director, employees and representatives of the commission shall be immune from suit and liability, either personally or in their official capacity, for any claim for damage to or loss of property or personal injury or other civil liability caused by or arising out of any actual or alleged act, error or omission that occurred, or that the person against whom the claim is made had a reasonable basis for believing occurred within the scope of commission employment, duties or responsibilities; provided that nothing in this subsection shall be construed to protect any such person from suit or liability for any damage, loss, injury or liability caused by the intentional or willful or wanton misconduct of that person.

B. The commission shall defend any member, officer, executive director, employee or representative of the .230893.2

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commission in any civil action seeking to impose liability 2 arising out of any actual or alleged act, error or omission that occurred within the scope of commission employment, duties or responsibilities, or that the person against whom the claim is made had a reasonable basis for believing occurred within the scope of commission employment, duties or responsibilities; provided that nothing in this section shall be construed to prohibit that person from retaining counsel; and further provided that the actual or alleged act, error or omission did not result from that person's intentional or willful or wanton misconduct.

C. The commission shall indemnify and hold harmless any member, officer, executive director, employee or representative of the commission for the amount of any settlement or judgment obtained against that person arising out of any actual or alleged act, error or omission that occurred within the scope of commission employment, duties or responsibilities, or that such person had a reasonable basis for believing occurred within the scope of commission employment, duties or responsibilities; provided that the actual or alleged act, error or omission did not result from the intentional or willful or wanton misconduct of that person.

> [NEW MATERIAL] DATA SYSTEM .--SECTION 11.

The commission shall provide for the Α. development, maintenance and utilization of a coordinated .230893.2 - 27 -

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1 database and reporting system containing licensure, adverse 2 action and investigative information on all licensed 3 individuals in member states. 4 Β. A member state shall submit a uniform data set 5 to the data system on all individuals to whom the compact is 6 applicable, using a unique identifier, as required by the rules 7 of the commission, including: 8 (1) identifying information; 9 licensure data; (2) 10 adverse actions against a license or (3) 11 compact privilege; 12 (4) non-confidential information related to 13 alternative program participation; 14 any denial of application for licensure, (5) 15 and the reason for such denial; 16 (6) other information that may facilitate the 17 administration of the compact, as determined by the rules of 18 the commission; and 19 current significant investigative (7) 20 information. 21 C. Current significant investigative information 22 and other investigative information pertaining to a licensee in 23 any member state shall only be available to other member 24 states. 25 The commission shall promptly notify all member D. .230893.2 - 28 -

states of any adverse action taken against a licensee or an individual applying for a license. Adverse action information pertaining to a licensee in any member state will be available to any other member state.

Ε. Member states contributing information to the data system may designate information that may not be shared with the public without the express permission of the 8 contributing state.

9 F. Any information submitted to the data system 10 that is subsequently required to be expunged by the laws of the member state contributing the information shall be removed from 11 12 the data system.

> SECTION 12. [NEW MATERIAL] RULEMAKING .--

Α. The commission shall exercise its rulemaking powers pursuant to the criteria set forth in this section and the rules adopted thereunder. Rules and amendments shall become binding as of the date specified in each rule or amendment.

The commission shall promulgate reasonable rules Β. in order to effectively and efficiently achieve the purposes of the compact. In the event the commission exercises its rulemaking authority in a manner that is beyond the scope of the purposes of the compact, such an action by the commission shall be invalid and have no force and effect.

C. If a majority of the legislatures of the member .230893.2 - 29 -

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states rejects a rule, by enactment of a statute or resolution in the same manner used to adopt the compact within four years of the date of adoption of the rule, the rule shall have no further force and effect in any member state. D. Rules or amendments to the rules shall be adopted at a regular or special meeting of the commission.

E. Prior to promulgation and adoption of a final
rule by the commission, and at least thirty days in advance of
the meeting at which the rule will be considered and voted
upon, the commission shall file a notice of proposed
rulemaking:

(1) on the website of the commission or otherpublicly accessible platform; and

(2) on the website of each member state occupational therapy licensing board or other publicly accessible platform or the publication in which each state would otherwise publish proposed rules.

F. The notice of proposed rulemaking shall include:

(1) the proposed time, date and location of the meeting in which the rule will be considered and voted upon;

(2) the text of the proposed rule or amendment and the reason for the proposed rule;

(3) a request for comments on the proposedrule from any interested person; and

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1	(4) the manner in which interested persons may
2	submit notice to the commission of their intention to attend
3	the public hearing and any written comments.
4	G. Prior to adoption of a proposed rule, the
5	commission shall allow persons to submit written data, facts,
6	opinions and arguments, which shall be made available to the
7	public.
8	H. The commission shall grant an opportunity for a
9	public hearing before it adopts a rule or amendment if a
10	hearing is requested by:
11	(1) at least twenty-five persons;
12	(2) a state or federal governmental
13	subdivision or agency; or
14	(3) an association or organization having at
15	least twenty-five members.
16	I. If a hearing is held on the proposed rule or
17	amendment, the commission shall publish the place, time and
18	date of the scheduled public hearing. If the hearing is held
, 19	via electronic means, the commission shall publish the
20	mechanism for access to the electronic hearing and the
21	procedure for hearings shall be conducted according to the
22	following provisions:
23	(1) all persons wishing to be heard at the
24	hearing shall notify the executive director of the commission
25	or other designated member in writing of their desire to appear
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1	and testify at the hearing not less than five business days
2	before the scheduled date of the hearing;
3	(2) hearings shall be conducted in a manner

16	K. If no written notice of intent to attend the
17	public hearing by interested parties is received, the
18	commission may proceed with promulgation of the proposed rule
19	without a public hearing.
20	L. The commission shall, by majority vote of all
21	members, take final action on the proposed rule and shall
22	determine the effective date of the rule, if any, based on the
23	rulemaking record and the full text of the rule.
24	M. Upon determination that an emergency exists, the
25	commission may consider and adopt an emergency rule without
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prior notice, opportunity for comment or hearing; provided that the usual rulemaking procedures provided in the compact and in this section shall be retroactively applied to the rule as soon as reasonably possible, but in no event later than ninety days after the effective date of the rule. For the purposes of this provision, an emergency rule is one that must be adopted immediately in order to:

8 (1) meet an imminent threat to public health,
9 safety or welfare;

10 (2) prevent a loss of commission or member
11 state funds;

(3) meet a deadline for the promulgation of an administrative rule that is established by federal law or rule; or

(4) protect public health and safety.

N. The commission or an authorized committee of the commission may direct revisions to a previously adopted rule or amendment for purposes of correcting typographical errors, errors in format, errors in consistency or grammatical errors. Public notice of any revisions shall be posted on the website of the commission. The revision shall be subject to challenge by any person for a period of thirty days after posting. The revision may be challenged only on grounds that the revision results in a material change to a rule. A challenge shall be made in writing and delivered to the chair of the commission

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prior to the end of the notice period. If no challenge is made, the revision shall take effect without further action. If the revision is challenged, the revision may not take effect without the approval of the commission.

SECTION 13. [<u>NEW MATERIAL</u>] OVERSIGHT, DISPUTE RESOLUTION AND ENFORCEMENT.--

A. The executive, legislative and judicial branches of state government in each member state shall enforce the compact and take all actions necessary and appropriate to effectuate the compact's purposes and intent. The provisions of the compact and the rules promulgated hereunder shall have standing as statutory law.

B. All courts shall take judicial notice of the compact and the rules in any judicial or administrative proceeding in a member state pertaining to the subject matter of the compact which may affect the powers, responsibilities or actions of the commission. The commission shall be entitled to receive service of process in any judicial or administrative proceeding and shall have standing to intervene in such a proceeding for all purposes. Failure to provide service of process to the commission shall render a judgment or order void as to the commission, the compact or promulgated rules.

C. If the commission determines that a member state has defaulted in the performance of its obligations or responsibilities under the compact or the promulgated rules,

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1 the commission shall:

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(1) provide written notice to the defaulting state and other member states of the nature of the default, the proposed means of curing the default or any other action to be taken by the commission; and

(2) provide remedial training and specific technical assistance regarding the default.

D. If a state in default fails to cure the default, the defaulting state may be terminated from the compact upon an affirmative vote of a majority of the member states, and all rights, privileges and benefits conferred by the compact may be terminated on the effective date of termination. A cure of the default does not relieve the offending state of obligations or liabilities incurred during the period of default.

E. Termination of membership in the compact shall be imposed only after all other means of securing compliance have been exhausted. Notice of intent to suspend or terminate shall be given by the commission to the governor, the majority and minority leaders of the defaulting state's legislature and each of the member states.

F. A state that has been terminated is responsible for all assessments, obligations and liabilities incurred through the effective date of termination, including obligations that extend beyond the effective date of termination.

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1 G. The commission shall not bear any costs related 2 to a state that is found to be in default or that has been 3 terminated from the compact, unless agreed upon in writing 4 between the commission and the defaulting state. 5 The defaulting state may appeal the action of н. 6 the commission by petitioning the United States district court 7 for the District of Columbia or the federal district where the 8 commission has its principal offices. The prevailing member 9 shall be awarded all costs of such litigation, including 10 reasonable attorney fees. 11 I. Upon request by a member state, the commission 12 shall attempt to resolve disputes related to the compact that arise among member states and between member and nonmember 13 14 states. 15 J. The commission shall promulgate a rule providing 16 for both mediation and binding dispute resolution for disputes 17 as appropriate. 18 The commission, in the reasonable exercise of Κ. 19 its discretion, shall enforce the provisions and rules of the 20 compact. 21 L. By majority vote, the commission may initiate 22 legal action in the United States district court for the 23 District of Columbia or the federal district where the 24 commission has its principal offices against a member state in 25 default to enforce compliance with the provisions of the

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compact and its promulgated rules and bylaws. The relief
 sought may include both injunctive relief and damages. In the
 event judicial enforcement is necessary, the prevailing member
 shall be awarded all costs of such litigation, including
 reasonable attorney fees.

M. The remedies provided in the compact shall not be the exclusive remedies of the commission. The commission may pursue any other remedies available under federal or state law.

SECTION 14. [<u>NEW MATERIAL</u>] DATE OF IMPLEMENTATION OF THE OCCUPATIONAL THERAPY LICENSURE INTERSTATE COMPACT AND ASSOCIATED RULES, WITHDRAWAL AND AMENDMENT.--

A. The compact shall come into effect on the date on which the compact statute is enacted into law in the tenth member state. The provisions, which become effective at that time, shall be limited to the powers granted to the commission relating to assembly and the promulgation of rules. Thereafter, the commission shall meet and exercise rulemaking powers necessary to the implementation and administration of the compact.

B. Any state that joins the compact subsequent to the commission's initial adoption of the rules shall be subject to the rules as they exist on the date on which the compact becomes law in that state. Any rule that has been previously adopted by the commission shall have the full force and effect

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of law on the day the compact becomes law in that state.

C. Any member state may withdraw from the compact by enacting a statute repealing the same.

D. A member state's withdrawal shall not take effect until six months after enactment of the repealing statute.

E. Withdrawal shall not affect the continuing requirement of the withdrawing state's occupational therapy licensing board to comply with the investigative and adverse action reporting requirements of the compact prior to the effective date of withdrawal.

F. Nothing contained in the compact shall be construed to invalidate or prevent any occupational therapy licensure agreement or other cooperative arrangement between a member state and a nonmember state that does not conflict with the provisions of the compact.

G. The compact may be amended by the member states. No amendment to the compact shall become effective and binding upon any member state until it is enacted into the laws of all member states.

SECTION 15. [<u>NEW MATERIAL</u>] CONSTRUCTION AND SEVERABILITY.--The compact shall be liberally construed so as to effectuate the purposes of the compact. The provisions of the compact shall be severable and if any phrase, clause, sentence or provision of the compact is declared to be contrary .230893.2

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to the constitution of any member state or of the United States or the applicability thereof to any government, agency, person or circumstance is held invalid, the validity of the remainder of the compact and the applicability thereof to any government, agency, person or circumstance shall not be affected thereby. If the compact shall be held contrary to the constitution of any member state, the compact shall remain in full force and effect as to the remaining member states and in full force and effect as to the member state affected as to all severable matters.

SECTION 16. [NEW MATERIAL] BINDING EFFECT OF COMPACT AND OTHER LAWS .--

A licensee providing occupational therapy in a Α. remote state under the compact privilege shall function within the laws and regulations of the remote state.

Β. Nothing in the compact prevents the enforcement of any other law of a member state that is not inconsistent with the compact.

C. Any laws in a member state in conflict with the compact are superseded to the extent of the conflict.

D. Any lawful actions of the commission, including all rules and bylaws promulgated by the commission, are binding upon the member states.

All agreements between the commission and the Ε. member states are binding in accordance with their terms.
