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2023 Agency Accomplishments and Challenges

- TX v NM Original 141 Three State Consent Decree with US Exceptions and amici briefs filed await spring SCOTUS scheduling.
- **\$65M** in Lower Rio Grande funding received last session being utilized to reduce groundwater depletions, investigate means to capture and use stormwater effectively, and investigate development of alternative sources of supply from brackish aquifers and Salt Basin.
 - Successful LRG groundwater leasing program roll-out on the heals of the pilot leasing program. Over 3,500 acres in applications are now being processed for closing in December.
- Indian Water Rights Settlements and Implementation federal fund matches are complete and \$millions in federal construction is underway for three settlements NGWSP, Pojoaque Valley Project, and Taos area.
 - o Four new settlements have been signed and will be discussed in detail during this agenda.
- Water Policy and Infrastructure Task Force Recommendations and Report continue to play an important role is focusing on key issues in preparing New Mexico for the experienced and anticipated impacts of climate change.

Legislative Priorities For 2024 Session

Enhanced Enforcement for OSE

- Bring fee structure into the 21 century
- Protect valid water rights holders
- Ensure OSE has sufficient ability to protect NM's water in the face of increasing scarcity

Water Project Finance Act Updates

- Broaden WTB/NMFA authorities to fund local capacity development
- Add funding and increase use of corpus over the next five years
- Reduce onerous qualification requirements in the Act
- Board membership changes
