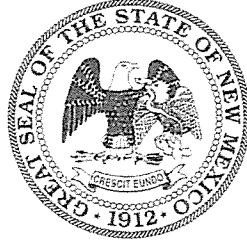

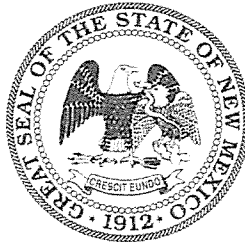
The New Mexico Gaming Control Board, through the State Gaming Representative, monitors the 2015 Tribal-State Class III Gaming Compact “2015 Compact”) signed by the New Mexico Gaming Tribes. These Tribes report “Adjusted Net Win” and pay “Revenue Share” based on “Adjusted Net Win” to the State on a quarterly basis. “Adjusted Net Win” is the amount wagered on gaming machines, less the amount paid out in cash and non-cash prizes won on the gaming machines, less State and Tribal Regulatory Fees. “Adjusted Net Win” is not the net profit of the casino. The total amount paid to the State Treasurer for revenue sharing by the Tribes operating casinos for the quarter ending June 30, 2023, was \$20,377,653. This revenue is deposited into the General Fund of the State of New Mexico.

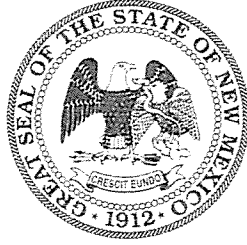

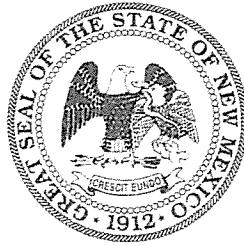

Organizational Structure

What has changed with this position? Why does your agency want to initiate change?

The NM Gaming Control Board and the agency Executive Director have determined that the agency could best serve the public with the addition of a **Responsible Gaming Coordinator** to promote responsible gambling in the State. This position will serve to assist individuals with controlling gambling behavior if they feel they have a problem or at risk of developing a gambling problem or addiction. This position would oversee New Mexico's self-exclusion program and assist individuals with seeking support for recovery, seeking professional counseling, and reducing social costs created by gambling addiction.

What organizational structure changes will be affected by the request?

This position will work for the NMGCB Enforcement Division Director and will coordinate closely with the State Gaming Representative on self-exclusion matters at tribal casinos. The position being reclassified was also organized in the Enforcement Division of the NMGCB.

Why does this job exist? (High level description of overall purpose of position)

This position will primarily address and mitigate the potential negative consequences of gambling addiction. Compulsive/Addictive gambling is a serious mental health condition characterized by an uncontrollable urge to gamble despite negative consequences and is a public health concern. As gaming expands nationwide, there is an increased need to address potential negative impacts including problem gambling.

This position will play a crucial role in developing and implementing prevention and educational programs aimed at raising awareness about gambling addiction, supporting vulnerable individuals, and connect them with appropriate treatment and support services such as counseling, therapy, and support groups. The overall purpose of this position is to address the negative impacts of gambling addiction, promote responsible gambling practices, and provide support and resources for individuals and families affected by compulsive gambling behaviors.

What does this job do? How does the job get done?
(Key responsibilities-include percent (%) of time spent, totaling 100%)

50% coordinate submission of self-exclusion applications, collect essential information and preferred exclusion duration. Verify the authenticity of the application and identity of the applicant through identification documents and verification of personal information and ensure that the verification process is secure and compliant with existing laws and regulations. Add excluded individuals to the agency database, create Decision and Orders and notify casinos.

50% provide information about responsible gambling, support resources for gambling addiction, and contact details for helplines and organizations and coordinate with area casinos related to responsible gaming issues. Maintain strong security measures to protect applicant information and confidentiality in compliance with existing laws and regulations.
