RE: SUMMARY OF PUBLIC EDUCATION-RELATED LEGISLATION PASSED BY THE 49<sup>TH</sup> LEGISLATURE, 1<sup>ST</sup> SPECIAL SESSION (after executive action)

This memo and the attached materials provide an overview of legislation from the 1<sup>st</sup> Special Session of the 49<sup>th</sup> Legislature related to public school support and other education-related appropriations, after executive action.

On October 17, 2009 the Governor issued an Executive Proclamation (see Attachment 1) calling the 49<sup>th</sup> Legislature into special session to address FY 09 and FY 10 budget shortfalls. For FY 09, the proclamation requested consideration of the use of the state's reserves to meet FY 09 obligations. For the state's FY 10 budget, the Governor's proclamation prescribed 10 measures for the Legislature's consideration and excluded "any other measures that would alter existing taxation and/or revenue enhancement structures." The proclamation also prohibited "measures reducing salaries or raising tax rates, reducing or eliminating tax credits, rebates, exemptions, or deductions, or imposing new taxes."

Overall, the 2009 Legislature, in special session, passed eight bills and one joint memorial. Seven of these bills were signed into law, two with partial vetoes and one was pocket vetoed. As a package, these bills addressed solvency issues for FY 09 and FY 10 that had been identified by the Legislative Finance Committee (LFC). According to the LFC, in October 2009, the FY 09 budget exceeded appropriations by \$214 million. For FY 10, the LFC projected a shortfall of approximately \$650 million. The following

material outlines legislative action in the special session, after Executive action, for each respective fiscal year:

#### **FY 2009**

CS/HB 6, Transfer Reserves to General Fund for 2009, (Laws 2009, 1<sup>st</sup> Special Session, Ch. 3, partial veto) transfers \$225 million from the operating reserve to the appropriation account of the General Fund to meet FY 09 obligations.

#### FY 2010

CS/HB 6, *Transfer Reserves to General Fund for 2009*, (Laws 2009, 1<sup>st</sup> Special Session, Ch. 3) also permits the Governor, with State Board of Finance approval, to transfer from the Tax Stabilization Reserve to the appropriation account of the General Fund up to \$115 million to meet FY 10 shortfalls.

HB 3a, with emergency clause, *Fund Transfers & Appropriation Voids*, (Laws 2009, 1<sup>st</sup> Special Session, Ch. 2, partial veto) transfers \$108.3 million to the General Fund from various state funds and voids \$1.2 million appropriated in Laws 2008.

HB 16, *Reduce Legislative Appropriations*, (Laws 2009, 1<sup>st</sup> Special Session, Ch. 4) reduces by 5.3 percent the General Fund appropriations in Laws 2009, Chapter 1 (the Feed Bill) for permanent legislative offices, including the staff office of the Legislative Education Study Committee, and requires the Legislative Council to determine the reduction of each legislative agency.

CS/HB 17 & 33a, Reduce 2009 General Fund Appropriations, (Laws 2009, 1st Special Session, Ch. 5, partial veto) reduces General Fund appropriations in Laws 2009, Chapter 124 (General Appropriation Act of 2009) by various amounts; appropriates cash balances from the Tobacco Settlement Program Fund; appropriates emergency supplemental funding for public schools in FY 10; appropriates \$29 million from the Public School Capital Outlay Fund to the New Mexico Public School Insurance Authority to pay or reimburse school districts and charter schools for property insurance premiums; and requires the Legislative Council Service, the Legislative Finance Committee, and the Department of Finance and Administration to review General Fund unexpended capital outlay projects and identify \$150 million of voidable projects to be submitted for consideration of the 2010 Legislature.

NOTE: As passed by the Legislature, CS/HB 17 & 33a, would have reduced the State Equalization Guarantee by approximately 4.0 percent but would have offset 2.0 percent of this reduction with \$45.5 million from federal education stabilization dollars. The Governor vetoed the federal fund offset; however, in his veto message the Governor indicated that he "will be distributing federal education stabilization funds in a timely manner to offset HB 17/33's cuts to public and higher education." These actions may require the Secretary of Public Education to reset the FY 10 unit value of \$3,862.79. Table 1 outlines the final effects of CS/HB 17 & 33a on public school support and related appropriations, after executive action.

SB 24a, with emergency clause, *School District Flexibility & Insurance*, (Laws 2009, 1<sup>st</sup> Special Session, Ch. 6) contains the appropriation and provisions for property insurance payment and reimbursement to school districts and charters school that are included in CS/HB17 & 33.

SB 29, with emergency clause, *General Fund Projects to STB Projects*, (Laws 2009, 1<sup>st</sup> Special Session, Ch. 7, partial veto) voids approximately \$124.5 million in General Fund capital outlay projects authorized in previous years, including approximately \$4.7 million in education-related projects; and authorizes severance tax bonds to be issued for the purpose of funding the projects whose General Fund dollars were reverted.

SJM 1, *Hold Tribal People Harmless on Medicaid Cuts*, requests that Native American tribes, nations, and pueblos be held harmless from cuts to Medicaid funding or programs.

Finally, the 2009 Legislature in its special session also passed SB 25, School District Cash Balance Transfers. The bill would have allowed school districts to make temporary cash transfers to their operational accounts of unexpended revenue from a tax imposed pursuant to the Public School Capital Improvements Act (SB 9) as long as none of the money were used for salaries and the district repaid the transferred amount by FY 16 according to a repayment schedule approved by the Public Education Department. However, the bill was pocket vetoed.

# Proclamation

WHEREAS, immediate consideration of issues critical to the economic health and welfare and public safety of New Mexico and its citizens is necessary and such conditions have arisen since the conclusion of the First Session of the Forty-Ninth Legislature;

WHEREAS, the national economic recession has caused unavoidable and severe impacts to the state's economy, leading to budget projections indicating that the state faces a significant budget shortfall in fiscal years 2009 and 2010;

WHEREAS, current economic conditions make it incumbent upon state government officials to balance the budget and provide a foundation for enduring economic stability; and

WHEREAS, this administration believes that the state budget can be balanced by making fiscally responsible reductions to state expenditures that do not harm public education and without raising taxes.

NOW THEREFORE, I, Bill Richardson, Governor of the State of New Mexico, by virtue of the Authority vested in me pursuant to the Constitution of New Mexico, do hereby call the Forty-Ninth Legislature of the State of New Mexico into Special Session at 3 o'clock p.m., Saturday, October 17, 2009, at the State Capitol in Santa Fe. In accordance with Article IV, Section 6 of the Constitution, this Special Session is called for the purpose of considering and enacting legislation concerning the following objects and no others:

- 1. the transfer of funds from the tax stabilization reserve and the general fund operating reserve to the general fund for purposes of meeting fiscal year 2009 appropriations;
- 2. legislation to balance the state's fiscal year 2010 budget, limited to such measures as set forth below, and excluding any other measures that would alter existing taxation and/or revenue enhancement structures:
  - the transfer of certain fund and appropriation balances to the general fund for purposes of meeting expenditures from the general fund;



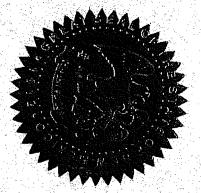
- the reduction and deauthorization of appropriations made in the General Appropriation Act of 2008, the General Appropriation Act of 2009, Laws 2009, Chapter 1, and various capital outlay bills;
- the enactment of new sections of law and amendments to existing sections of law to implement appropriation reductions made in the first special session of the forty-ninth legislature;
- the enactment of increased fiscal year 2010 budget adjustment authority for all state agencies;
- the appropriation of funds from the tobacco settlement program fund to the medical assistance program of the human services department to offset general fund appropriation reductions;
- the appropriation of funds from the general fund to the second judicial district court to meet operational expenses in fiscal year 2010;
- the authorization for the State Board of Finance to issue short-term supplemental severance tax bonds and severance tax bonds, the appropriation of the proceeds of those bonds to the general fund to restore the general fund for allotments made from the general fund for general fund capital appropriations in previous sessions and appropriations in the General Appropriation Act of 2009 for the administration of capital projects or the maintenance of capital projects, and the amendment of Section 7-27-12 NMSA 1978 to authorize the issuance of supplemental severance tax bonds for such purposes;
- the voiding of certain appropriations of severance tax bond proceeds and the appropriation of bond proceeds for other capital projects;
- the amendment of Section 22-11-21 NMSA 1978 to temporarily reduce the employer's contributions under the Educational Retirement Act, with previously scheduled contribution increases being fully phased in beginning in fiscal year 2013; and
- the amendment of Section 7-1-6.56 NMSA 1978 to delay a \$250,000 per month distribution to the retiree health care fund scheduled to begin on July 1, 2009, until June 30, 2011, and the transfer to the general fund of monthly distributions that occurred under current law since July 1, 2009.
- 3. the appropriation of legislative cash balances for the purpose of paying the expenses of the special session called pursuant to this Proclamation.



4. legislation concerning the objects in this proclamation shall not include measures reducing salaries or raising tax rates, reducing or eliminating tax credits, rebates, exemptions, or deductions, or imposing new taxes.

## Governor Bill Richardson Acts on Budget Bills; Signs Executive Order Mandating Responsible Spending Cuts

Governor Sets 5 Mandatory Furlough Days

SANTA FE – Governor Bill Richardson took a number of aggressive steps today to help balance the state budget. The Governor signed legislation, while vetoing irresponsible budget cuts that would have cut critical health services, closed prisons and jeopardized protection for kids.

After taking final action on the special-session legislation, Governor Richardson signed an Executive Order that sets five furlough days for state employees and further cuts state agency budgets by an average of 7 percent for the budget year.

The Governor's budget action, combined with his efforts to save \$150 million by freezing capital outlay projects, will put the state on a responsible path toward balancing the current-year budget.

"Since the session ended, I have heard from hundreds to New Mexicans, including many legislators — who want me to exercise my veto pen to preserve those services," Governor Richardson said. "I understand and share their concerns, particularly in light of the previous budget cuts.

"However, it would be fiscally irresponsible to simply veto this bill and wait for the Legislature to meet again in January – more than half-way through the fiscal year. "Instead, I am signing an Executive Order today that directs more responsible budget cuts across state government."

Governor Richardson's Executive Order spells out his plan for state agencies:

#### **EXECUTIVE ORDER 2009-044**

ORDER CONCERNING FISCAL YEAR 2010 BUDGET GAP; REQUIRING STATE AGENCIES TO REDUCE FISCAL YEAR 2010 OPERATING EXPENDITURES; REQUIRING THE FURLOUGH OF STATE EMPLOYEES; DIRECTING THE PUBLIC EDUCATION DEPARTMENT AND HIGHER EDUCATION DEPARTMENT TO TAKE STEPS NECESSARY TO RESTORE FURTHER CUTS TO PUBLIC AND HIGHER EDUCATION

WHEREAS, Governor Richardson called the Legislature into special session in order to address the State's fiscal year 2010 budget shortfall;

WHEREAS, even if fully implemented, the so-called solvency bills passed during the First Special Session of the Forty-Ninth Legislature were insufficient to bridge the budget gap;

WHEREAS, among other shortcomings, the solvency bills failed to cut capital appropriations or effectively use supplemental severance tax bonding capacity;

WHEREAS, Section 2(A)(4) of the House Appropriations and Finance Committee Substitute for House Bills 17 and 33 ("HB 17/33"), as amended, sought to impose deep, aggregate cuts of 7.6% to the already reduced operating budgets of State agencies under the control of the Governor;

WHEREAS, implementing such cuts would likely have caused dangerous and unacceptable harm to core services;

WHEREAS, the Administration concluded that the cuts called for in Section 2(A)(4) would likely have (i) severely compromised the ability of the Children, Youth, and Families Department to investigate child neglect and abuse cases and take kids into protective custody, putting kids at risk and jeopardizing federal funding to the State; (ii) forced the Department of Health to temporarily close some public health offices and reduce services at school-based and rural primary care clinics, which provide services to citizens with few (if any) other treatment options; and (iii) resulted in the closure of two adult correctional facilities, resulting in hundreds of prisoners being released early with inadequate supervision and employees being put out of work;

**WHEREAS**, to avoid such unacceptable results, the Governor this day vetoed Section 2(A)(4) of HB 17/33;

WHEREAS, the Richardson Administration recognizes the need to responsibly and meaningfully reduce agency expenditures as part of a package of solvency measures that completes the job started in the First Special Session of the Forty-Ninth Legislature;

WHEREAS, the expenditure restrictions imposed in this Executive Order will result in savings that will, along with other measures to be proposed by the Richardson Administration during future legislative sessions, bridge the budget gap while maintaining adequate levels of services and a prudent level of budget reserves; and

**WHEREAS**, the fiscal year 2010 budget shortfall is so severe that solvency measures unfortunately must include the furlough of state employees.

**NOW, THEREFORE**, I, Bill Richardson, Governor of the State of New Mexico, by virtue of the authority and responsibility vested in me by the Constitution and the laws of the State of New Mexico, do hereby order the following:

#### 1. Expenditure and Encumbrance Restrictions.

A. General Fund Agencies. In fiscal year 2010, the following agencies shall restrict their expenditures from general fund operating appropriations to achieve the savings indicated, calculated as the difference between their fiscal year 2010 general fund operating budgets and the amount of their actual expenditures:

B. <u>Non-General Fund Agencies.</u> The following agencies funded by other state funds shall develop expenditure restriction requirements that result in responsible but meaningful operating budget savings for fiscal year 2010: State Investment Council; Board of Examiners for Architects; Medical Board; Board of Nursing; State Board of Licensure for Engineers and Land Surveyors; Board of Veterinary Medicine; Department of Game and Fish; Youth Conservation Corps; Commission for Deaf and Hard-of-Hearing Persons; Workers' Compensation Administration; Miners' Hospital of New Mexico; Veterans' Services Department; and Department of Transportation. The operating budget savings requirements of these agencies are subject to approval by the State Budget Division ("SBD") of the Department of Finance and Administration ("DFA"). Agencies subject to this subsection must submit their proposed savings requirements to SBD by 5:00 p.m. on November 17, 2009.

#### C. <u>Implementation</u>.

- i. Agencies subject to expenditure restrictions under Section 1(A) or Section 1(B) shall submit to SBD for SBD's review and approval a fiscal year 2010 expenditure plan. The expenditure plan shall be in such form and contain such information as SBD may require but, at a minimum, shall show the agency's operating budget by category, the agency's restricted expenditure amount by category, and the difference (savings) between the two. All plans are due to SBD by 5:00 p.m. on November 20, 2009.
- ii. Agencies may request and SBD may approve of expenditure plan amendments, provided that the total savings under the amended plan equals the amount stated in Section 1(A) or amount developed pursuant to Section 1(B).
- iii. Agencies may not encumber or expend more than the expenditure amount in its SBD-approved expenditure plan for any given category.
- iv. By 5:00 p.m. on November 25, 2009, agencies shall, as necessary, submit to DFA's Financial Control Division and Contracts Review Bureau the necessary documentation to reduce outstanding encumbrances to bring them in line with their expenditure plans.
- v. DFA is authorized and empowered to take such other action as may be necessary or advisable to effectuate or enforce the requirements contained in or developed pursuant to Section 1 of this Executive Order, including deadlines. Without limiting the generality of the foregoing, DFA may in appropriate cases extend the deadlines contained in this Section in writing.

#### 2. Furloughs.

A. Immediately, the Chief of Staff for the Office of the Governor shall:

- i. notify the unions with collective bargaining agreements covering employees at agencies subject to Section 1(A) or Section 1(B) of this Executive Order of the need for furloughs and discuss those furloughs with the unions;
  - ii. develop a furlough plan that:
- a. is limited to those agencies subject to expenditure restrictions under Section 1(A) or Section 1(B) of this Executive Order;
  - b. is consistent with Regulation 1.7.10.8 NMAC;
- c. limits the number of required furlough days, which, if possible, should be no more than five (5) days during fiscal year 2010;
- d. to the extent practicable and advisable, given the needs of individual agencies, schedule furlough days in a manner that least affects the provision of services to the public;
- e. provides a process for limited exceptions based upon public safety, welfare, and cost-effectiveness; and
- iii. seek approval of the furlough plan from the State Personnel Board in accordance with Regulation 1.7.10.8(A) NMAC; and
  - iv. oversee agency implementation of the approved furlough plan.
  - B. Agencies subject to the approved furlough plan shall implement the plan.
- C. The State Personnel Director shall issue necessary or desirable guidance to affected agencies to implement the approved furlough plan, which guidance shall help agencies avoid overtime or other liabilities during the weeks when the furlough is effective.
- 3. Non-Compliance with Section 1 or Section 2. DFA shall report to the Office of the Governor any agency that fails to comply with the requirements, including deadlines, of Section 1 or Section 2 of this Executive Order. The head of an agency, including a board or commission, that fails to comply with any of the requirements of Section 1 or Section 2 of this Executive Order shall be held accountable for the non-compliance.
- 4. Agencies Not Under Gubernatorial Control. Agencies not under Gubernatorial control and whose fiscal year 2010 operating budgets were not reduced in the First Special Session of the Forty-Ninth Legislature are respectfully requested to impose expenditure restrictions that will result in administrative operating budget savings of approximately three percent (3%). These agencies include the Public School Insurance Authority, Educational Retirement Board, Public Employees Retirement Association, Public School Facilities Authority, Retiree Health Care Authority, State Commission of Public Records, and Martin Luther King, Jr. Commission.
- 5. Recalculation of Fiscal Year 2010 Support Restoration Subgrants. In order to offset the reductions to public and higher education contained in HB 17/33 and pursuant to Executive Order 2009-035, the Public Education Department and Higher Education Department are directed to expeditiously:
- A. calculate the amount of each local educational agency's and public institution of higher education's fiscal year 2010 Support Restoration Subgrant; and

B. take the steps necessary to enable the recalculated Support Restoration Subgrants to be awarded and funds distributed to local educational agencies and public institutions of higher educations.

#### 6. **General Provisions.**

- A. This Executive Order supersedes any other previous orders, proclamations, or directives in conflict.
- B. This Executive Order shall take effect immediately and shall remain in effect until such time as it is rescinded by the Governor.
- C. This order is not intended to, and does not, create any right or benefit, substantive or procedural, enforceable at law or in equity by any party against the State, its agencies, instrumentalities, or entities, its officers, employees, or agents, or any other person.

### **Governor Bill Richardson Announces Budget Balancing Task Force**

SANTA FE-Governor Bill Richardson today announced he has formed a task force to study a variety of proposals to help balance the State's budget. The task force will thoroughly review and scrutinize new revenue options as well as seek public input on the options before the regular legislative session gets underway in January.

"Our revenue has taken a major hit from the global economic crisis, and we've responded by taking bold action to cut state spending to offset those losses," Governor Richardson said. "But moving forward we must also take a serious look at options to increase our revenue in ways that allow us to maintain our competitive advantage and address New Mexico's long-term financial health."

Governor Richardson appointed Rick Homans, Secretary of the Taxation and Revenue Department, to chair the task force that consists of more than 40 New Mexicans representing a wide range of industries, education, labor and other non-profit organizations. - (1) for the expense of the house of representatives, one hundred ninety-five thousand six hundred fifty dollars (\$195,650) to be disbursed on vouchers signed by the speaker and the chief clerk of the house of representatives or the chief clerk's designee;
- (2) for the expense of the senate, one hundred thirty-three thousand nine hundred dollars (\$133,900) to be disbursed on vouchers signed by the chair of the committees' committee and the chief clerk of the senate or the chief clerk's designee; and
- (3) for the expense of the legislative council service, the joint bill room and the legislative switchboard, forty thousand four hundred dollars (\$40,400) to HB 1 Page 1

be disbursed on vouchers signed by the director of the legislative council service or the director's designee.

B. Following adjournment of the first special session of the forty-ninth legislature, expenditures authorized in this section shall be disbursed on vouchers signed by the director of the legislative council service or the director's designee.

#### HOUSE EXECUTIVE MESSAGE NO. 3

Honorable Speaker Luján and Members of the House:

I have this day SIGNED

HOUSE BILL 3, as amended, with emergency clause

enacted by the Forty-Ninth Legislature, First Special Session, 2009, except the following item or items, part or parts, which I hereby veto pursuant to the authority granted me in Article IV, Section 22 of the Constitution of New Mexico:

On page 1, I have vetoed all of line 25, and on page 2, I have vetoed all of line 1. The audit fund's balances are insufficient to support the proposed \$500,000 transfer to the general fund.

On page 2, I have vetoed all of lines 7 through 9, which would have transferred \$500,000 from the domestic violence offender treatment or intervention fund to the general fund. Preventing domestic violence has been a priority of my Administration. Hard economic times can increase the prevalence of domestic violence. With demand for these services potentially increasing, now is simply not the time to reduce funding for domestic violence programs.

On page 2, I have vetoed all of lines 10 through 11, which would have transferred \$3 million from the enhanced 911 fund to the general fund. New Mexico's \$888,893 federal grant for enhanced 911 would have been terminated had this transfer occurred. Funding losses of this magnitude would have affected the long-term viability of the enhanced 911 fund, dangerously undermining the State's ability to enhance and maintain its emergency response capabilities.

House Executive Message 3 November 9, 2009 Page 1 of 2 On page 4, I have vetoed all of lines 2 through 3, which would have transferred \$800,000 from the trail safety fund to the general fund. This program has just started. Depriving it of funds at this time would have unacceptably impeded the program's progress.

On page 4, I have vetoed all of lines 23 through 25, which would have transferred \$250,000 from the children, youth and families pre-kindergarten fund to the general fund. Every day brings fresh evidence of the individual and social dividends that pre-kindergarten investment yields. Like the proposed transfer from the public pre-kindergarten fund, which I have also vetoed, this transfer is not necessary.

On page 5, I have vetoed all of lines 24 through 25, and on page 6, I have vetoed all of line 1, which would have transferred \$1,450,200 from the public pre-kindergarten fund to the general fund, for the reasons stated above.

Honorable Speaker Luján and Members of the House:

Times such as these challenge leaders to put aside pork-barrel politics, consider all options, and deliver creative, complete solutions. I admire much of the work and the dedication of our citizen legislators, who put aside personal pursuits and remuneration to selflessly serve the public during the special session. The truth is, however, that we did not completely meet the challenge.

While a good start, the fiscal year 2010 solvency bills passed during the special session did not completely bridge the budget gap. This was partly due to the Legislature's failure to put aside pork-barrel politics and void past capital appropriations. Many of those appropriations were hard to justify during times of plenty, either because they were not fully funded, not well-planned, or addressed only a marginal need. In these hard times, where core services face deep cuts, such appropriations simply cannot be justified. The Legislature also failed to duly consider the executive proposal to use supplemental severance tax bonds, which will be paid off by fiscal year end, to provide general fund operating revenue in the current fiscal year. This resulted in our trying to do a challenging job without all of the available tools.

This backdrop frames my primary objection to the House Appropriations and Finance Committee Substitute for House Bills 17 and 33, as amended ("HB 17/33"): Section 2(A)(4). That section would have reduced the operating appropriations to state agencies under my control by an aggregate of seven and six-tenths percent. Respectfully, Section 2(A)(4) is not a model of legislative draftsmanship. It would have raised substantial implementation and interpretation issues that could have engulfed my administration in controversy and potential lawsuits at a time when our focus needs to be on bridging the budget gap.

Those real issues aside, the bottom-line is that, with almost half the fiscal year gone, that cut, which amounts to approximately \$125 million, is simply too deep. Implementing it would have

House Executive Message 5 November 12, 2009 Page 1 of 4 caused dangerous and unacceptable harm to core services. For example, the ability of the Children, Youth, and Families Department to investigate child neglect and abuse cases and take kids into protective custody would likely have been severely compromised, putting kids at risk and jeopardizing federal funding to the State. The Department of Health would have likely been forced to temporarily close some public health offices and reduce services at school-based and rural primary care clinics, which provide services to citizens with few (if any) other options. Two adult correctional facilities probably would have been closed, resulting in hundreds of prisoners being released early with inadequate supervision and employees being put out of work.

Cuts this deep could only be justified if all other responsible options had been exhausted and we still came up short. As explained above, however, that is not the case. Consequently, I have vetoed Section 2(A)(4) of HB 17/33 in its entirety.

That does not mean, however, that I am postponing meaningful restrictions on the expenditures of agencies under my control. Today I issue an executive order that imposes such restrictions while maintaining core services at acceptable levels. These expenditure restrictions will result in general fund savings that will, along with other measures that I will propose to the Legislature, bridge the budget gap while maintaining adequate levels of services and a prudent level of reserves.

My other objections to HB 17/33 are largely constitutional.

Parts of it sought to impermissibly intrude into the Executive managerial function. Section 11 attempted to control the content of the fiscal year 2011 Executive budget recommendation. Section 2(B) tried to mandate that the vetoed appropriation reductions in Section 2(A)(4) be implemented first through cuts to the salaries and benefits of exempt employees at agencies under the control of the Governor. I strongly object to the Legislature's continuing efforts to unconstitutionally reserve onto itself close powers of supervision and micromanagement.

HB 17/33 also contains parts that would, if enacted, nullify substantive law and/or create general legislation, practices precluded by Article IV, Section 16 of the New Mexico Constitution. Of particular concern is the Legislature's continuing efforts to enact reporting requirements and institute other means of Legislative oversight beyond what exists in substantive law. The Legislature's efforts to override substantive law by limiting emergency supplemental distributions to small, rural school districts is as misguided as it is unconstitutional. As a matter of basic fairness, students in a financially needy district should not be penalized because their district is urban or large.

The Legislature has also attempted to assert control over state fiscal stabilization funds awarded to the Governor by the federal government. Our Supreme Court, however, has clearly ruled that such federal funds are beyond the Legislature's appropriation power. In addition, the Legislature's proposal to simply deposit government services funds into the general fund would have raised substantial compliance issues under the federal American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009, which requires the State to specifically account to the federal government on how every dollar was spent and the impact the spending had on jobs. Depositing

the federal money into the general fund to fund all State operations would have precluded the State from complying with these stringent reporting requirements. I have vetoed the offending provisions as a matter of principle. Concerned citizens should know, however, that I will be distributing federal education stabilization funds in a timely manner to offset HB 17/33's cuts to public and higher education.

Finally, HB 17/33 would have denied the New Mexico Computing Applications Center of needed seed funding. The Center will ultimately be self-sufficient. But it needs State funding during these critical early days to get to that point.

My vetoes remedy these deficiencies.

On page 8, I have vetoed all of line 25, and on page 9, I have vetoed all of lines 1 through 11.

On page 9, I have vetoed all of lines 12 through 16.

I look forward to working with you to finish in future sessions the work we began in the special session.

FINANCE AND ADMINISTRATION.--

A. The department of finance and administration shall reduce fiscal year 2010 operating budgets and adjust allotments to comply with the provisions of this 2009 special session act and may reduce appropriations from other state funds, internal service/interagency transfers and federal funds as necessary to match the general fund reductions in the fiscal year 2010 operating budgets. The legislative finance committee shall review the adjusted operating budgets in a timely manner.

If, in this act or any other act of the first special session of the forty-ninth legislature, a general fund appropriation or budget is reduced and funds in excess of the amount of the reduced appropriation or budget have already been allotted to the state agency receiving the appropriation, the department of finance and administration may reduce any other general fund allotment to the state agency in order to recoup the over-allotment of the reduced appropriation or budget. In the case of an appropriation made to one state agency but disbursed or transferred to another state agency, the department of finance and administration may reduce any other general fund allotment to the agency to which the appropriation was disbursed or transferred in order to recoup the over-allotment of the reduced appropriation or budget. The authority provided in this section is additional to any other power the department of finance and administration has to remedy over-allotments, and the grant of authority in this section shall not be deemed to be a legislative determination that the department of finance and administration does not otherwise have the authority provided in this section.

C. As used in this section, "state agency" means any department, institution, board, bureau, commission, district or committee of the government of the state and means every office or officer of any of the above."

A minimum of one hundred fifty million dollars (\$150,000,000) in unexpended general fund capital outlay

projects that have been determined by the legislative council service, the legislative finance committee and the department of finance and administration to be voidable shall be submitted as a bill for legislative consideration and action in the second session of the forty-ninth legislature.

AN ACT

RELATING TO FLEXIBILITY FOR PUBLIC SCHOOLS; MAKING AN APPROPRIATION FROM THE PUBLIC SCHOOL CAPITAL OUTLAY FUND TO PAY FOR PROPERTY INSURANCE ON BEHALF OF SCHOOL DISTRICTS AND CHARTER SCHOOLS DURING FISCAL YEAR 2010; DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

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BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. APPROPRIATION -- PUBLIC SCHOOL CAPITAL OUTLAY FUND FOR INSURANCE COVERAGE .-- Notwithstanding the provisions of the Public School Capital Outlay Act, twenty-nine million dollars (\$29,000,000) is appropriated from the public school capital outlay fund to the public school insurance authority for expenditure in fiscal year 2010 for the purpose of reimbursing or paying property insurance premiums on behalf of school districts and charter schools. Of the appropriation, the amount necessary to reimburse or pay up to seven million dollars (\$7,000,000), for property insurance coverage in fiscal year 2010 for the Albuquerque public school district, shall be distributed by the public school insurance authority to the Albuquerque public school district. Any unexpended or unencumbered balance remaining at the end of fiscal year 2010 shall revert to the public school capital outlay fund.

Given the State's critical financial situation it would be imprudent to provide continued severance tax bond funding to capital projects that have made little to no progress using their original general fund appropriations, which in some cases are several years old. Many of the general fund capital appropriations contained in this bill were for projects that were identified by state agencies as having made little to no progress since the date of the original appropriation. There is no reason to believe that providing new severance tax bond appropriations with extended expiration dates will result in immediate progress given the history of these particular projects.

For this reason, I am vetoing certain severance tax bond appropriations for projects that meet the following criteria:

- General fund capital appropriations that lack legally binding third-party contracts are vetoed without the impairment of any third-party contracts.
- General fund capital appropriations for projects that were deemed inadequately
  funded and unable to be initiated or completed were vetoed so that the State can
  put available severance tax bonding capacity to immediate use in the upcoming
  Legislative Session.
- Certain general fund capital appropriations, although worthy and justified when originally appropriated, have stagnated for various reasons and are not prepared for implementation.
- General fund capital appropriations for projects that have constitutional concerns.

My capital outlay projects were subject to the same level of review, and I have vetoed several appropriations for my own projects in order to put our limited state funds to the best possible use.

In vetoing the severance tax bond appropriations for these projects, I am freeing up an additional \$11.6 million in severance tax bonding capacity, which will be available for appropriation during the 2010 Regular Session.

Section 2. SEVERANCE TAX BONDS--AUTHORIZATIONS--

A. The state board of finance may issue and sell severance tax bonds in compliance with the Severance Tax Bonding Act in an amount not to exceed the total of the amounts authorized for purposes specified in this act. The state board of finance shall schedule the issuance and sale of the bonds in the most expeditious and economical manner possible upon a finding by the board that the project has been developed sufficiently to justify the issuance and that the project can proceed to contract within a reasonable time. The state board of finance shall further take the appropriate steps necessary to comply with the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended. Proceeds from the sale of the bonds are appropriated for the purposes specified in this act.

- B. The agencies named in this act shall certify to the state board of finance when the money from the proceeds of the severance tax bonds authorized in this section is needed for the purposes specified in the applicable section of this act. If an agency has not certified the need for the issuance of the bonds for a particular project, including projects that have been reauthorized, by the end of fiscal year 2011, the authorization for that project is void.
- C. Before an agency may certify for the issuance of severance tax bonds, the project must be developed sufficiently so that the agency reasonably expects to:

- (1) incur within six months after the applicable bonds have been issued a substantial binding obligation to a third party to expend at least five percent of the bond proceeds for the project; and
- (2) spend at least eighty-five percent of the bond proceeds within three years after the applicable bonds have been issued.
- D. Except as otherwise specifically provided by law:
- (1) the unexpended balance from the proceeds of severance tax bonds issued pursuant to this act for a project shall revert to the severance tax bonding fund no later than the following dates:
- (a) for a project for which severance tax bonds were issued to match federal grants, six months after completion of the project;
- (b) for a project for which severance tax bonds were issued to purchase vehicles, including emergency vehicles and other vehicles that require special equipment; heavy equipment; books; educational technology; or other equipment or furniture that is not related to a more inclusive construction or renovation project, at the end of the fiscal year two years following the fiscal year in which the severance tax bonds were issued for the purchase; and
  - (c) for any other project for which

severance tax bonds were issued, within six months of completion of the project, but no later than the end of fiscal year 2013; and

- (2) all remaining balances from the proceeds of severance tax bonds issued for a project pursuant to this act shall revert to the severance tax bonding fund three months after the latest reversion date specified for that type of project in Paragraph (1) of this subsection.
- E. Except for appropriations to the capital program fund, money from severance tax bond proceeds provided pursuant to this act shall not be used to pay indirect project costs.
- F. For the purpose of this section, "unexpended balance" means the remainder of an appropriation after reserving for unpaid costs and expenses covered by binding written obligations to third parties.
- Section 3. 231. two hundred thousand dollars (\$200,000) to the department of transportation to plan, design and construct improvements to streets in Clayton in Union county;

232. three hundred thousand dollars (\$300,000) to the department of transportation to plan, design, purchase and install traffic lights on New Mexico highway 304 and 47 at Manzano expressway and Marigold boulevard in Valencia county;

233. one hundred fifteen thousand dollars

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(\$115,000) to the department of transportation to plan, design and construct improvements, including an extension, to Christopher road in Belen in Valencia county;

234. one hundred seventy thousand dollars (\$170,000) to the department of transportation to plan, design and reconstruct road and drainage improvements to New Mexico highway 314, including resurfacing, widening, striping, lighting, pedestrian trails and crossings, in Los Lunas and in Valencia county;

235. six hundred twenty-five thousand dollars (\$625,000) to the department of transportation to plan, design and construct improvements to New Mexico highway 6 in Los Lunas in Valencia county;

236. eighty thousand dollars (\$80,000) to the board of regents of eastern New Mexico university to purchase and install pianos for student use in the department of music at eastern New Mexico university in Portales in Roosevelt county;

237. seven hundred thousand dollars (\$700,000) to the board of regents of New Mexico highlands university to plan, design, construct and equip the student union and services center at New Mexico highlands university in Las Vegas in San Miguel county;

238. four hundred thousand dollars (\$400,000) to the board of regents of New Mexico state university to plan,

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design, construct, equip, furnish and improve the women's soccer stadium in Las Cruces in Dona Ana county;

239. one hundred sixty thousand dollars (\$160,000) to the board of regents of New Mexico state university to plan, design, construct, equip and furnish the livestock research center feed mill at New Mexico state university in Clayton in Union county;

240. three hundred five thousand dollars (\$305,000) to the board of regents of northern New Mexico state school to acquire land for, plan, design and construct a community center campus for social service and educational programs, including site improvements, equipment and furnishings, at northern New Mexico state school in Espanola in Rio Arriba county; and

241. one hundred thirty-five thousand dollars (\$135,000) to the board of regents of the university of New Mexico to plan, design, construct, equip and furnish an alumni center at the university of New Mexico in Albuquerque in Bernalillo county.

Section 4. PUBLIC SCHOOL CAPITAL OUTLAY FUND--TRANSFERS
TO GENERAL FUND.--

A. Thirty-one million six hundred thousand dollars (\$31,600,000) is transferred from the public school capital outlay fund to the general fund for the purpose of meeting appropriations from the general fund. The money transferred

represents the remaining portion of the amount of the general fund appropriation made in Laws 2006, Chapter 111, Section 66 that has been allocated to school districts for the state share of projects pursuant to Section 22-24-5.7 NMSA 1978 but that has not yet been expended.

B. Twenty million dollars (\$20,000,000) is transferred from the public school capital outlay fund to the general fund for the purpose of meeting appropriations from the general fund. The money transferred represents the amount transferred from the general fund to the public school capital outlay fund in Subsection C of Section 12 of the General Appropriation Act of 2009.

Section 5. SEVERANCE TAX BOND APPROPRIATIONS TO THE PUBLIC SCHOOL CAPITAL OUTLAY FUND. -- Pursuant to the provisions of Section 2 of this act, upon certification by the public school capital outlay council that the need exists for the issuance of the bonds, the following amounts are appropriated to the public school capital outlay fund for the following purposes, and any unexpended or unencumbered balance shall not revert:

A. thirty-one million six hundred thousand dollars (\$31,600,000) for the purpose of meeting allocations made in Laws 2006, Chapter 111, Section 66 to school districts for the state share of the projects pursuant to Section 22-24-5.7 NMSA 1978; and

B. twenty million dollars (\$20,000,000) to carry out the purposes of the Public School Capital Outlay Act. Section 6. EMERGENCY.--It is necessary for the public peace, health and safety that this act take effect immediately.\_\_\_\_

## A JOINT MEMORIAL

REMINDING THE LEGISLATURE OF THE IMPORTANCE TO TRIBAL PEOPLE OF THE STATE'S CONTRIBUTIONS TO NATIVE AMERICAN HEALTH CARE AND URGING LEGISLATORS TO HOLD NATIVE AMERICAN TRIBES, NATIONS AND PUEBLOS HARMLESS FROM ANY CUTS TO MEDICAID FUNDING OR PROGRAMS.

WHEREAS, on September 24, 2009, the medical assistance division of the human services department announced a series of cuts expected in medicaid budgets for tribes in New Mexico; and

WHEREAS, the proposed cuts were not discussed in a formal way with the tribes; and

WHEREAS, Governor Bill Richardson's Executive Order 2005-04 promised that tribal consultation would be held in such cases; and

WHEREAS, the human services department is bound by the state-tribal consultation policy announced by the governor and is required by the federal stimulus act, the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009, to consult with federally recognized tribes on any medicaid plan amendments, waiver requests and proposals that are likely to have a direct impact on Indian health programs and Native American medicaid beneficiaries; and

WHEREAS, the health care that most tribal people in New

SJM 1 Page 1 Mexico rely upon is severely underfunded, and the federal Indian health system is experiencing a shortage of professional health care providers, including nurses, dentists and pharmacists; and

WHEREAS, in the year 2000, the per capita income on the Navajo Nation was one-third of the per capita income of the rest of the United States at seven thousand two hundred sixty-nine dollars (\$7,269) per year; and

WHEREAS, the unemployment rate on the Navajo Nation has doubled from twenty-five and six-tenths percent in 2000 to fifty and one-half percent in 2007; and

WHEREAS, it is well documented that American Indians and Alaska natives suffer the most egregious health disparities compared with the rest of the population of this country; and

WHEREAS, the federal government's spending for health care in tribal areas is less than one-half that spent for prisoners; and

WHEREAS, federal funds for tribal health services require no state matching funds; and

WHEREAS, Navajo Nation President Joe Shirley has written a formal request to the medical assistance division requesting consideration of the Navajo Nation's opposition to tribal health cuts; and

WHEREAS, any cut whatsoever to medicaid expenditures for the chapters of the Navajo Nation; the pueblos; the Jicarilla Apache Nation; and the Mescalero Apache Tribe will have a significant and disparate impact on a very vulnerable system of health care delivery;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO that any cuts made to medicaid funds or programs in New Mexico in the first special session of the forty-ninth legislature exempt tribal medicaid funds or programs; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that, rather than making cuts to Indian health service and tribal facilities, the state should consider a Native American carve-out program similar to the carve-out or opt-out program used for the state coverage insurance opt-out; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that no major changes be made to tribal health services delivery or funding absent a formal tribal consultation with New Mexico's twenty-two tribes, nations and pueblos, as mandated by the governor's Executive Order 2005-04 and the provisions of the federal stimulus bill; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that copies of this memorial be transmitted to the governor, the secretary of human services, the medical assistance division of the human services department, the heads' of all Indian tribes, nations and pueblos and the Indian affairs department.

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
