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# Local Government Planning Fund Amended and Restated Rules

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- ♦ Created in 2002, the Local Government Planning Fund provides grants determined on a sliding scale to local governments for critical planning documents, primarily for infrastructure projects
- ♦ Senate Bill 216 passed in the 2024 Regular Legislative Session
  - Expanded the use of the LGPF to include Affordable Housing Plans, Flood Inundation Maps, and Archaeological Clearances
    - Affordable Housing Plans are necessary for entities to implement an Affordable Housing Act ordinance
    - Flood Inundation Maps and Archaeological Clearances are necessary for entities to comply with regulatory requirements
- Proposed LGPF Rule Changes
  - □ Add Affordable Housing Plans, Flood Inundation Maps, and Archaeological Clearances as eligible planning documents and explicitly provide that Asset Management Plans are eligible
  - ☐ Increase the maximum grant award from \$50,000 to \$100,000
  - Retain a maximum of \$100,000 per entity per 24-month period but allow for an additional \$100,000 per 24-month period for Affordable Housing Plans
  - □ Provide increased grant funding for entities with local MHI's of less than 100% of the state MHI
  - Expand local match waivers to include planning documents required to address regulatory compliance and affordable housing needs
  - Include new definitions and clarifications to reflect current terminology and practices

# **LGPF** Overview



- Provides grants up to \$50,000 for planningrelated documents – Proposed amendment <u>changes maximum per document to \$100,000</u>
- ◆ Communities can qualify for two grants per 24-month period, not to exceed \$100,000 -Proposed amendment keeps \$100,000 per 24-month maximum in place
- Matching funds are determined by a community's MHI, and local water rates as compared to state averages. Waivers of local match include:
  - Applicant serves fewer than 250 households and does not have taxing authority
  - Project cures NMED compliance issues
  - Public health threats, waterborne disease outbreak& inadequate water supply
  - Projects that cure conditions brought on by unforeseeable calamity

### **Local Match Waivers**

- Planning documents that enact or update LEDA ordinances
- Planning documents that enact or update
   Metropolitan Redevelopment plans
- Qualified entities that qualify for Small
   Cities Assistance Fund or Small Counties
   Assistance Fund and experience decline of
   GRT over past 24 months
- Qualified entities that don't qualify for Small Cities Assistance Fund or Small Counties Assistance Fund and experience decline of GRT over past 36 months
- Qualified entities that experience loss of major employer in past 12 months
- Qualified entities without GRT authority that serve fewer than 250 connections

- Applicants apply monthly
- NMFA Rules provide planning document standards
- Applicants are provided between 12 18 months to complete the planning document
- Documents must be completed and approved before the grant agreement is executed ("closing")
- After the grant is closed, the document preparer may be paid or the grantee reimbursed
