ABANDONMENT OR ABUSE OF A CHILD. --18 As used in this section: 19 "child" means a person who is less than (1) 20 eighteen years of age; 21 "neglect" means that a child is without (2) proper parental care and control of subsistence, education, 22 medical or other care or control necessary for the child's 23 24 well-being because of the faults or habits of the child's 25 parents, guardian or custodian or their neglect or refusal,

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when able to do so, to provide them; and

- "negligently" refers to criminal negligence and means that a person knew or should have known of the danger involved and acted with a reckless disregard for the safety or health of the child.
- Abandonment of a child consists of the parent, В. guardian or custodian of a child intentionally leaving or abandoning the child under circumstances whereby the child may or does suffer neglect. A person who commits abandonment of a child is guilty of a misdemeanor, unless the abandonment results in the child's death or great bodily harm, in which case the person is guilty of a second degree felony.
- A parent, guardian or custodian who leaves an infant less than ninety days old in compliance with the Safe Haven for Infants Act shall not be prosecuted for abandonment of a child.
- Abuse of a child consists of a person knowingly, intentionally or negligently, and without justifiable cause, causing or permitting a child to be:
- (1) placed in a situation that may endanger the child's life or health;
- tortured, cruelly confined or cruelly (2) punished; or
 - exposed to the inclemency of the weather. (3)
- A person who commits abuse of a child that does .226572.1

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not result in the child's death or great bodily harm is, for a first offense, guilty of a third degree felony and for second and subsequent offenses is guilty of a second degree felony. If the abuse results in great bodily harm to the child, the person is guilty of a first degree felony.

- A person who commits negligent abuse of a child that results in the death of the child is guilty of a first degree felony.
- A person who commits intentional abuse of a child twelve to eighteen years of age that results in the death of the child is guilty of a first degree felony.
- A person who commits intentional abuse of a child less than twelve years of age that results in the death of the child is guilty of a first degree felony resulting in the death of a child.
- Evidence that demonstrates that a child has been knowingly, intentionally or negligently allowed to enter or remain in a motor vehicle, building or any other premises that contains chemicals and equipment used or intended for use in the manufacture of a controlled substance shall be deemed prima facie evidence of abuse of the child.
- J. Evidence that demonstrates that a child has been knowingly and intentionally exposed to the use of methamphetamine or fentanyl shall be deemed prima facie evidence of abuse of the child.

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K. A person who leaves an infant less than ninety
days old at a hospital may be prosecuted for abuse of the
infant for actions of the person occurring before the infant
was left at the hospital."

SECTION 2. EFFECTIVE DATE.--The effective date of the provisions of this act is July 1, 2024.

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
