

Senate Memorial 5 Taskforce Membership

Summary

Senate Memorial 5 creates a taskforce, convened by LFC, to make recommendations about improvements to the state's child welfare system. The Memorial notes the taskforce is to be comprised of 12 members, six of which are appointed by a variety of elected officials and stakeholders. The taskforce is charged with examining the state's child welfare and juvenile justice systems and making recommendations by November 2024.
