FISCAL IMPLICATIONS The bill appropriates \$200.0 in general fund in FY01 to DOH. DOH indicates the \$200.0 appropriation would only be sufficient for public information and education efforts and would not fund early detection/screening services. The Commission on Higher Education indicates an option to the appropriation to DOH would be to appropriate the funds to the UNM Health Sciences Center.
