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17	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:
18	Section 1. Section 61-12A-1 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 1996,
19	Chapter 55, Section 1) is amended to read:
20	"61-12A-1. SHORT TITLE[This act] <u>Chapter 61, Article</u>
21	<u>12A NMSA 1978</u> may be cited as the "Occupational Therapy Act"."
22	Section 2. Section 61-12A-2 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 1996,
23	Chapter 55, Section 2) is amended to read:

25	Occupational Therapy Act to provide for the regulation of
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1 persons offering occupational therapy services to the public in 2 order to safeguard the public health, safety and welfare; to protect the public from being misled by incompetent and 3 4 unauthorized persons; to assure the highest degree of professional conduct on the part of [registered] occupational 5 therapists and [certified] occupational therapy assistants; and 6 7 to assure the availability of occupational therapy services of high quality to persons in need of such services." 8 Section 61-12A-3 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 1996, 9 Section 3. 10 Chapter 55, Section 3) is amended to read: "61-12A-3.  <u>having no less than an associate degree in occupational therapy</u>
 <u>and holding an active license to practice occupational therapy</u>
 <u>in New Mexico who assists an occupational therapist under the</u>
 <u>supervision of the occupational therapist;</u>

[H.] <u>I.</u> "person" means an individual, association, partnership, unincorporated organization or corporate body;

[I-] J. "probation" means continued licensure is subject to fulfillment of specified conditions such as monitoring, education, supervision or counseling;

[J. "registered occupational therapist" means a person having no less than a baccalaureate degree in occupational therapy who is registered by the American occupational therapy certification board and licensed in New Mexico to practice occupational therapy;]

K. "reprimand" means a formal expression of disapproval that [shall be] is retained in the licensee's file but [shall] not [be] publicly announced;

L. "revocation" means permanent loss of licensure; .152331.1

Section 5. Section 61-12A-5 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 1996, Chapter 55, Section 5) is amended to read:

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"61-12A-5. SUPERVI SI ON- - REQUI RED- - DEFI NED. - -

<u>A.</u> [No] Occupational therapy shall <u>not</u> be performed by [<u>any certified</u>] <u>an</u> occupational therapy assistant, occupational therapy aide or technician or by any person practicing on a provisional permit unless such therapy is supervised by [<u>a registered</u>] <u>an</u> occupational therapist. The board shall adopt [<u>regulations</u>] <u>rules</u> defining supervision, which definitions may include various categories such as "close supervision", "routine supervision" and "general supervision".

<u>B.</u> An occupational therapy aide or technician is
<u>not a primary service provider of occupational therapy in any</u>
<u>practice setting and, therefore, does not provide skilled</u>
<u>occupational therapy services.</u> An occupational therapy aide or
<u>technician is trained by an occupational therapist or an</u>
<u>occupational therapy assistant to perform specifically</u>
<u>delegated tasks, and the occupational therapist is responsible</u>
<u>for the overall use and actions of the occupational therapy</u>
<u>aide or technician.</u> An occupational therapy aide or technician
<u>must demonstrate competence to perform the assigned, delegated</u>
<u>client and nonclient tasks.</u>"

Section 6. Section 61-12A-6 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 1996, .152331.1

1 Chapter 55, Section 6) is amended to read:

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"61-12A-6. LICENSE REQUIRED. --

A. Unless licensed to practice the level of
occupational therapy provided in the Occupational Therapy Act,
[no] <u>a</u> person shall <u>not</u> practice as [a registered] <u>an</u>
occupational therapist or [certified] occupational therapy
assistant.

B. It is unlawful for [any] <u>a</u> person not licensed pursuant to the Occupational Therapy Act or whose license has been denied, suspended or revoked in this or another state to hold himself out as [<u>a registered</u>] <u>an</u> occupational therapist or [certified] occupational therapy assistant or to use words or titles containing "occupational therapist" ["registered occupational therapist"] <u>or</u> "occupational therapy assistant" [or "certified occupational therapy assistant"] that would indicate or imply that the person is licensed as [<u>a registered</u>] <u>an</u> occupational therapist or [certified] occupational therapy assistant.

C. [No] <u>A</u> facility or employer shall <u>not</u> represent that it offers occupational therapy unless it [utilizes] <u>uses</u> the services of a licensee pursuant to the provisions of the Occupational Therapy Act.

D. A person offering or assisting in the offering of occupational therapy shall be properly identified by a name badge or other identification indicating whether [he] the

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1 person is [a registered] an occupational therapist, [certified] an occupational therapy assistant, an occupational therapy aide 2 or technician or a person practicing under a provisional 3 4 permit." Section 7. Section 61-12A-8 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 1996, 5 Chapter 55, Section 8, as amended) is amended to read: 6 "61-12A-8. **BOARD CREATED.** - -7 The "board of examiners for occupational 8 Α. therapy" is created. 9 10 [B. The board shall be administratively attached to the regulation and licensing department. 11 12 C.] B. The board shall consist of five members appointed by the governor who have been residents of the state 13 for <u>at least</u> two years preceding the appointment. 14 [D.] C. Three members shall be licensed under the 15 provisions of the Occupational Therapy Act; have a minimum of 16 five years' professional experience, with two years' experience 17 in New Mexico; and have not had their licenses suspended or 18 revoked by this or any other state. One of the professional 19 20 members may be [a certified] an occupational therapy assistant and one of the professional members may be a retired 21 [registered] occupational therapist or occupational therapy 22 assistant, who has been retired for no more than five years at 23 the time of appointment. 24 [E.] D. 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The two public members shall have no direct interest in the profession of occupational therapy. The public members shall not:

(2) be habitually intemperate or be addicted to the use of habit-forming drugs or be addicted to [a] <u>any</u> <u>other</u> vice to such a degree as to render [him] <u>the member</u> unfit to fulfill his board duties and responsibilities; or

9 (3) be guilty of a violation of the Controlled10 Substances Act.

[F.] E. Appointments shall be made for staggered terms of three years with no more than two terms ending at any one time. A board member shall not serve more than two consecutive terms. Vacancies shall be filled for the unexpired term by appointment by the governor prior to the next scheduled board meeting.

[G.] <u>F.</u> An individual member of the board shall not be liable in a civil or criminal action for an act performed in good faith in the execution of his duties as a member of the board.

[H.] <u>G.</u> Members of the board shall be reimbursed for per diem and travel expenses as provided in the Per Diem and Mileage Act and shall receive no other compensation, perquisite or allowance.

[I.] <u>H.</u> A simple majority of the board members . 152331.1

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currently serving shall constitute a quorum of the board for
 the conduct of business.

[J.-] I. The board shall meet at least four times a year and at other times as it deems necessary. Additional meetings may be convened at the call of the president of the board or on the written request of any two board members to the president. Meetings of the board shall be conducted in accordance with the provisions of the Open Meetings Act.

9 [K.] J. A member failing to attend three
10 consecutive meetings, unless excused as provided by board
11 policy, shall automatically be recommended for removal as a
12 member of the board.

[L.] <u>K.</u> At the beginning of each fiscal year, the board shall elect a president, vice president and secretary-treasurer."

(2) use funds for the purpose of meeting the necessary expenses incurred in carrying out the provisions of the Occupational Therapy Act;

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1	(3) adopt a code of ethics;
2	(4) enforce the provisions of the Occupational
3	Therapy Act to protect the public by conducting hearings on
4	charges relating to the discipline of licensees, including the
5	denial, suspension or revocation of a license;
6	(5) establish and collect fees;
7	(6) provide for examination for and issuance,
8	renewal and reinstatement of licenses;
9	(7) establish, impose and collect fines for
10	violations of the Occupational Therapy Act;
11	(8) appoint a registrar to keep records and
12	minutes necessary to carry out the functions of the board; and
13	(9) obtain the legal assistance of the
14	attorney general.
15	B. The board may:
16	(1) issue investigative subpoenas for the
17	purpose of investigating complaints against licensees prior to
18	the issuance of a notice of contemplated action;
19	(2) hire or contract with an investigator to
20	investigate complaints that have been filed with the board.
21	The board shall set the compensation of the investigator to be
22	paid from the funds of the board;
23	(3) inspect establishments; [and]
24	(4) designate hearing officers;
25	(5) employ and discharge such employees as it
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1 deems necessary and shall determine their duties and set their 2 compensation; and (6) hire or contract with an attorney to give 3 4 advice in regard to any matter connected with the duties of the board, to represent the board in any legal proceedings and to 5 aid in the enforcement of the Occupational Therapy Act. 18	by the [American] national board for certification in

24	institution where the [registered] occupational therapist or
25	the [certified] occupational therapy assistant has met the
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1	academic requirements of Paragraph (1) of this subsection;

3	<u>(a) an occupational therapist shall</u>
4	<u>complete a minium of twenty-four weeks of supervised fieldwork</u>
5	experience or satisfy any generally recognized past standards
6	<u>that identified minimum fieldwork requirements at the time of</u>

8	(b) an occupational therapy assistant
9	<u>shall complete a minimum of sixteen weeks of supervised</u>
10	fieldwork experience or satisfy any generally recognized past
11	standards that identified minimum fieldwork requirements at the
12	<u>time of graduation;</u>
13	(3) has passed an examination prescribed by
14	the [American] national board for certification in occupational
15	therapy [certification board] or the board [of examiners for
16	occupational therapy]; and
17	(4) has no record of unprofessional conduct or
18	[incompetency] <u>incompetence</u> .
19	B. In the case of [a certified] <u>an</u> occupational
20	therapy assistant or a person practicing on a provisional
21	permit, the applicant shall file with the board a signed,
22	current statement of supervision by the [registered]
23	occupational therapist who will be the responsible supervisor.
24	C. The board shall verify, as necessary,
25	information contained on the completed application and any
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supporting documentation required to obtain a license."

Section 11. Section 61-12A-12 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 1996, Chapter 55, Section 12) is amended to read:

"61-12A-12. EXAMINATIONS.--The board shall require proof of passage of the [American] <u>national board for certification</u> <u>in</u> occupational therapy [certification board] examination. The board may require each applicant to pass an examination on the state laws <u>and</u> rules [and regulations] that pertain to the practice of occupational therapy."

Section 12. Section 61-12A-13 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 1996, Chapter 55, Section 13) is amended to read:

"61-12A-13. PROVISIONAL PERMITS. -- A provisional permit may be granted to a person who has completed the education and experience requirements of the Occupational Therapy Act. The permit shall allow the person to practice occupational therapy under the supervision of [a registered] an occupational therapist. The provisional permit shall be valid until the date on which the results of the next qualifying examination have been made public. The provisional permit shall not be renewed if the applicant has failed the examination. The board shall verify, as necessary, information contained on the completed application and any supporting documentation required to obtain a license."
