16	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:
17	Section 1. Section 61-14A-3 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 1993,
18	Chapter 158, Section 11, as amended) is amended to read:
19	"61-14A-3. DEFINITIONSAs used in the Acupuncture and
20	Oriental Medicine Practice Act:
21	A. "acupuncture" means the surgical use of needles
22	inserted into and removed from the body and the use of other
23	devices, modalities and procedures at specific locations on the
24	body for the prevention, cure or correction of any disease,
25	illness, injury, pain or other condition by controlling and
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<u>B.</u> "bioidentical hormones" means compounds, or salt forms of those compounds, that have exactly the same chemical and molecular structure as hormones that are produced in the human body;

7 [B.] C. "board" means the board of acupuncture and 8 oriental medicine;

9 [G.] D. "doctor of oriental medicine" means a
10 person licensed as a physician to practice acupuncture and
11 oriental medicine with the ability to practice independently,
12 serve as a primary care provider and as necessary collaborate
13 with other health care providers;

[Đ.] E. "moxibustion" means the use of heat on or above specific locations or on acupuncture needles at specific locations on the body for the prevention, cure or correction of any disease, illness, injury, pain or other condition;

 $[\underline{E} \cdot] \underline{F} \cdot$ "oriental medicine" means the distinct system of primary health care that uses all allied techniques of oriental medicine, both traditional and modern, to diagnose, treat and prescribe for the prevention, cure or correction of disease, illness, injury, pain or other physical or mental condition by controlling and regulating the flow and balance of energy, form and function to restore and maintain health;

[F.] <u>G.</u> "primary care provider" means a health care .175407.3SA

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practitioner acting within the scope of the health care 2 practitioner's license who provides the first level of basic or 3 general health care for a person's health needs, including diagnostic and treatment services, initiates referrals to other health care practitioners and maintains the continuity of care when appropriate;

7 [G.] H. "techniques of oriental medicine" means: 8 (1) the diagnostic and treatment techniques 9 used in oriental medicine that include diagnostic procedures; 10 acupuncture; moxibustion; manual therapy, also known as tui na; 11 other physical medicine modalities and therapeutic procedures; 12 breathing and exercise techniques; and dietary, nutritional and 13 lifestyle counseling;

the prescribing, administering, combining (2) and providing of <u>non-injectable</u> herbal medicines, homeopathic medicines, vitamins, minerals, enzymes, glandular products, natural substances, natural medicines, protomorphogens, live cell products, [gerovital] amino acids, lipids, carbohydrates, proteins, dietary and nutritional supplements, cosmetics as they are defined in the New Mexico Drug, Device and Cosmetic Act and nonprescription drugs as they are defined in the Pharmacy Act; and

the prescribing, administering and (3) providing of devices, restricted devices and prescription devices, as those devices are defined in the New Mexico Drug, .175407.3SA - 3 -

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1 Device and Cosmetic Act, if the board determines by rule that 2 the devices are necessary in the practice of oriental medicine 3 and if the prescribing doctor of oriental medicine has 4 fulfilled requirements for prescriptive authority in accordance with rules promulgated by the board for the devices enumerated in this paragraph; and

[H.] I. "tutor" means a doctor of oriental medicine with at least ten years of clinical experience who is a teacher of acupuncture and oriental medicine]."

Section 2. Section 61-14A-8.1 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 2000, Chapter 53, Section 12, as amended) is amended to read:

"61-14A-8.1. EXPANDED PRACTICE AND RESTRICTIVE PRESCRIPTIVE AUTHORITY--CERTIFICATIONS.--

The board shall issue certifications in the four Α. expanded practices of basic injection therapy, injection therapy, intravenous therapy and bioidentical hormone therapy, as determined by rule of the board, for expanded practice and prescriptive authority only for the substances enumerated in [Paragraphs (1) and (2) of] Subsection [6] <u>B</u> of this section to a doctor of oriental medicine who has submitted completed forms provided by the board, paid the application fee for certification and submitted proof of successful completion of additional education and training required by rule of the The board shall adopt the rules determined by the board board. of pharmacy for additional <u>education and</u> training required for .175407.3SA

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the prescribing, administering, compounding or dispensing of
 [caffeine, procaine, oxygen, epinephrine and bioidentical
 hormones] the substances listed in Subsection B of this
 <u>section</u>. The board and the board of pharmacy shall consult as
 appropriate.

[B. The board shall issue certifications in the four expanded practices of basic injection therapy, injection therapy, intravenous therapy and bioidentical hormone therapy.

C.] <u>B.</u> The expanded practice and prescriptive authority shall include

[(1) the prescribing, administering, compounding and dispensing of herbal medicines, homeopathic medicines, vitamins, minerals, amino acids, proteins, enzymes, carbohydrates, lipids, glandular products, natural substances, natural medicines, protomorphogens, live cell products, gerovital, dietary and nutritional supplements, cosmetics as they are defined in the New Mexico Drug, Device and Cosmetic Act and nonprescription drugs as they are defined in the Pharmacy Act; and

(2)] the prescribing, administering, compounding and dispensing of [the following] <u>drugs</u>, dangerous drugs or controlled substances as [they] <u>drugs</u>, <u>dangerous drugs</u> <u>and controlled substances</u> are defined in the New Mexico Drug, Device and Cosmetic Act, the Controlled Substances Act or the Pharmacy Act, if the prescribing doctor of oriental medicine .175407.3SA - 5 -

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has fulfilled the requirements for expanded practice and
 prescriptive authority in accordance with the rules promulgated
 by the board for the substances enumerated in this [paragraph]
 <u>subsection</u>.

20	sodium morrhuate, sterile water, water soluble vitamins and
21	autologous oxygenated blood infusion, including ultraviolet
22	radiation of blood, with appropriate anticoagulant, except
23	that authority is not provided for total parenteral
24	nutrition; and
25	(4) non-injectable bioidentical hormone
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1	certification and prescriptive authority is provided for
2	<u>7-keto dehydroepiandrosterone, cortisone,</u>
3	dehydroepiandrosterone, dihydrotestosterone, estradiol,
4	estriol, estrone, hydrocortisone, pregnenolone, progesterone,
5	testosterone, tetraiodothyronine, levothyroxine, thyroxine
6	and triiodothyronine combination, triiodothyronine,
7	liothyronine or desiccated thyroid.
8	C. Subcutaneous epinephrine, inhaled oxygen and
9	additives necessary to stabilize, preserve or balance the pH
10	of approved substances are applicable to any of the
11	certifications in Subsection B of this section.
12	D. Appropriately certified doctors of oriental
13	medicine are authorized to prescribe, use and dispense a
14	compounded drug preparation from Subsection B of this section
15	that is compounded in compliance with state and federal
16	requirements. When compounding drugs for their patients,
17	doctors of oriental medicine certified for expanded practice
18	and prescriptive authority shall comply with the compounding
19	requirements for licensed health care professionals in the
20	United States pharmacopeia and national formulary. <u>A</u>
21	substance is only authorized for use if procured, prescribed,
22	administered, compounded and dispensed in compliance with
23	federal and state law.
24	E. A doctor of oriental medicine or oriental

medicine student enrolled in a board-approved educational .175407.3SA

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1	course or program leading to certification in one of the
2	oriental medicine expanded practice categories of basic
3	injection therapy, injection therapy, intravenous therapy or
4	bioidentical hormone therapy is authorized to perform the
5	techniques and have the prescriptive authority, for the
6	duration of the course or program, to administer and compound
7	the substances that are authorized in the expanded practice
8	formulary for which the student is studying under the direct
9	supervision of the teacher of the approved expanded practice
10	educational course or program. The student is not authorized
11	to obtain, prescribe or dispense such substances without
12	direct supervision."
