SUMMARY

Synopsis of Bill

Senate Bill 106 would enact a new section of the Public Assistance Act to require the Human Services Department Medical Assistance Division (HSD/MAD) to provide, through its medical assistance programs, coverage for methadone replacement therapy when prescribed by an authorized practitioner.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

SB 106 does not contain an appropriation.

HSD/MAD estimates 250 Medicaid-eligible persons would benefit from the requirements of the bill. Currently through OptumHealth New Mexico, the HSD Behavioral Health Services Division (HSD/BHSD) funds the administration of methadone for methadone replacement therapy, more commonly known as medication-assisted treatment (MAT). HSD estimates that

10% of the 2,500 clients currently receiving services at New Mexico's 10 NM clinics providing methadone treatment services are Medicaid eligible.

HSD estimates these services for Medicaid-eligible individuals, including the cost of the medication, administering the methadone dose, counseling, and transportation, would cost \$20 per person per day. Based on daily administration of this therapy, the combined Federal/State cost is estimated at \$1.8 million (250 x 20 x 365); figuring a Federal match of 69%, the cost to the State would be \$565.8 thousand per year.

SIGNIFICANT ISSUES

Methadone, when used for MAT for opioid addiction, must be dispensed by an Opioid Treatment Program (OTP) that is regulated by Drug Enforcement Agency and certified by the HSD/BHSD as the federally designated State Opioid Treatment Authority. Currently, New Mexico has 10 OTPs that serve about 2,500 persons at any point in time. These programs are located in Rio Arriba, Santa Fe, Bernalillo, and Valencia counties. Five of these programs receive varying degrees of State funding. None are fully funded by the State.

According to the National Conference of State Legislatures, 30 states currently allow Medicaid to pay for some level of MAT using methadone. (Medicaid Financing of Medication-Assisted Treatment for Opiate Addiction (http://www.ncsl.org/issues-research/health/mat-opiate-50-state-table-medicaid.aspx) HSD estimates that, excluding pregnant and postpartum women, less than 10% of the individuals currently receiving methadone are Medicaid eligible.

PERFORMANCE IMPLICATIONS

HSD's Strategic Goal 4, 'Improve Behavioral Health' relates to SB 106, specifically:

- Task 4.2: Reduce adverse impacts of substance abuse and mental illness on individuals, families and communities and
- Task 4.3: Promote recovery and resiliency for high-risk and high-need individuals with mental illness and/or substance abuse to successfully manage life challenges, and to live, work, learn and participate fully in their communities by increasing access to housing, education, employment, transportation and positive social interactions.

RELATIONSHIP

Senate Bill 106 relates to SB 90, Overdose Prevention Campaign.

ALTERNATIVES

HSD could explore what changes to its State Plan and regulations would be necessary to cover this service in lieu of legislation. Additional costs as discussed above would remain.
