BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:
SECTION 1. Section 22-10A-32 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 1988,
Chapter 48, Section 1, as amended) is amended to read:
"22-10A-32. LICENSED SCHOOL EMPLOYEESREQUIRED TRAINING
PROGRAM
A. All licensed school employees shall be required
to complete training in the detection and reporting of child
abuse and neglect, including sexual abuse and assault, and

1 substance abuse. Except as otherwise provided in this 2 subsection, this requirement shall be completed within the 3 licensed school employee's first year of employment by a school 4 district. Licensed school employees hired prior to the 2014-2015 school year shall complete the sexual abuse and assault component of the required training during the 2014-2015 school 6 7 year.

Β. [Pursuant to the policy and rules adopted by the state board] The department shall develop a training program, including training materials and necessary training staff, to meet the requirement of Subsection A of this section to make 11 12 the training available in every school district. The department shall coordinate the development of the program with 13 appropriate staff in school districts and at the human services 14 department, [and] the department of health and the children, 15 youth and families department. The department shall consult 16 with the federal centers for disease control and prevention 17 when developing the evidence-based training component on child 18 sexual abuse and assault to include methods and materials that have proven to be effective. 20

The training program developed pursuant to this C. section shall be made available by the department to the deans of every college of education in New Mexico for use in providing such training to students seeking elementary and secondary education licensure."

An individualized education program that meets 5 C. the requirements of Subsections A and B of this section and 6 7 that meets all applicable transition and procedural 8 requirements of the federal Individuals with Disabilities 9 Education Act for a student with a disability shall satisfy the next-step plan requirements of this section for that student. 10

A local school board shall ensure that each high D. school student has the opportunity to develop a next-step plan based on reports of college and workplace readiness assessments, as available, and other factors and is reasonably informed about:

(1) curricular and course options, including honors or advanced placement courses, dual-credit courses, distance learning courses, career clusters, pre-apprenticeship programs or remediation programs that the college and workplace readiness assessments indicate to be appropriate;

(2) opportunities available that lead to different post-high-school options; and

alternative opportunities available if the (3) student does not finish a planned curriculum.

I. Successful completion of the requirements of the New Mexico diploma of excellence shall be required for graduation for students entering the ninth grade beginning in the 2009-2010 school year. Successful completion of a minimum of twenty-four units aligned to the state academic content and performance standards shall be required to earn a New Mexico diploma of excellence. These units shall be as follows:

(1) four units in English, with major emphasison grammar, nonfiction writing and literature;

(2) four units in mathematics, of which one shall be the equivalent to or higher than the level of algebra 2, unless the parent submitted written, signed permission for the student to complete a lesser mathematics unit; and provided that a financial literacy course that meets state mathematics academic content and performance standards shall qualify as one of the four required mathematics units;

(3) three units in science, two of which shall have a laboratory component;

The state graduation 6 7 examination on social science shall include a section on the constitution of the United States and the constitution of New 8 If a student exits from the school system at the end 9 Mexico. of grade twelve without having passed a state graduation 10 examination, the student shall receive an appropriate state 11 12 certificate indicating the number of credits earned and the grade completed. If within five years after a student exits 13 from the school system the student takes and passes the state 14 graduation examination, the student may receive a high school 15 diploma. Any student passing the state graduation examination 16 and completing all other requirements within five years of 17 entering ninth grade, including a final summer session if 18 completed by August 1, may be counted by the school system in 19 which the student is enrolled as a high school graduate for the 20 year in which completion and examination occur. 21

Final examinations shall be administered to all К.

1 social studies and science, including a section on the 2 constitution of the United States and the constitution of New 3 Mexico, based on a standards-based assessment or assessments or 4 a portfolio of standards-based indicators established by the 5 department by rule. The standards-based assessments required in Section 22-2C-4 NMSA 1978 may also serve as the assessment 6 7 required for high school graduation. If a student exits from 8 the school system at the end of grade twelve without having 9 satisfied the requirements of this subsection, the student shall receive an appropriate state certificate indicating the 10 number of credits earned and the grade completed. If within 11 12 five years after a student exits from the school system the student satisfies the requirement of this subsection, the 13 student may receive a New Mexico diploma of excellence.
