AN ACT

AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE AND SALE OF CAPITAL PROJECTS GENERAL
OBLIGATION BONDS TO MAKE CAPITAL EXPENDITURES FOR SENIOR
CITIZEN FACILITY IMPROVEMENTS AND ACQUISITIONS, FOR LIBRARY
ACQUISITIONS, FOR CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS AND ACQUISITIONS AT
INSTITUTIONS OF HIGHER EDUCATION, STATE SPECIAL SCHOOLS AND
TRIBAL SCHOOLS AND FOR CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS AND ACQUISITIONS
FOR PUBLIC SAFETY; PROVIDING FOR A PROPERTY TAX LEVY FOR
PAYMENT OF PRINCIPAL OF, INTEREST ON AND CERTAIN COSTS RELATED
TO THE BONDS; REQUIRING APPROVAL OF THE REGISTERED VOTERS AT
THE 2016 GENERAL ELECTION OF THE STATE; DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.--This act may be cited as the
"2016 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act".

SECTION 2. PURPOSE.--For the purpose of providing funds

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1 for capital expenditures as authorized in the 2016 Capital
2 Projects General Obligation Bond Act, general obligation
3 indebtedness of the state is authorized for the purposes and in
4 the amounts set forth in Section 10 of that act.

5 SECTION 3. BOND TERMS.--

6 A. The state board of finance, except as limited by
7 the 2016 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act, shall
8 determine the terms, covenants and conditions of bonds issued
9 pursuant to that act, including but not limited to:

10 (1) date or dates of issue, denominations and
11 maturities;

12 (2) principal amounts;

13 (3) rate or rates of interest; and

14 (4) provisions for redemption, including
15 premiums, registration and refundability, whether the bonds are
16 issued in one or more series and other covenants relating to
17 the bonds and the issuance thereof.

18 B. The bonds shall be in such form as the state
19 board of finance determines with an appropriate series
20 designation and shall bear interest payable as set forth in the
21 resolution of the state board of finance.

22 C. Payment of the principal of the bonds shall
23 begin not more than two years after the date of their issuance,
24 and the bonds shall mature not later than ten years after the
25 date of their issuance. Both principal and interest shall be

1 payable in lawful money of the United States at the office of
2 the paying agent within or without the state as the state board
3 of finance may direct.

4 D. The bonds shall be executed with the manual or
5 facsimile signature of the governor or the state treasurer, and
6 the seal or a facsimile of the seal of the state shall be
7 placed on each bond, except for any series of bonds issued in
8 book entry or similar form without the delivery of physical
9 securities.

10 E. The bonds shall be issued in accordance with the
11 provisions of the 2016 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond
12 Act, the Supplemental Public Securities Act and the Uniform
13 Facsimile Signature of Public Officials Act and may be issued
14 in accordance with the Public Securities Short-Term Interest
15 Rate Act.

16 F. The full faith and credit of the state is
17 pledged for the prompt payment when due of the principal of and
18 interest on all bonds issued and sold pursuant to the 2016
19 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act.

20 **SECTION 4. EXPENDITURES.**--The proceeds from the sale of
21 the bonds shall be expended solely for providing money to be
22 distributed for the purposes and in amounts not to exceed the
23 amounts set forth in Section 10 of the 2016 Capital Projects
24 General Obligation Bond Act and to pay expenses incurred under
25 Section 6 of that act. Any proceeds from the sale of the bonds

1 that are not required for the purposes set forth in Sections 6
2 and 10 of that act shall be used for the purpose of paying the
3 principal of and interest on the bonds.

4 SECTION 5. SALE.--The bonds authorized under the 2016
5 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act shall be sold by
6 the state board of finance at such time and in such manner and
7 amounts as the board may elect. The bonds may be sold at
8 private sale or at public sale, in either case at not less than
9 par plus accrued interest to the date of delivery. If sold at
10 public sale, the state board of finance shall publish a notice
11 of the time and place of sale in a newspaper of general
12 circulation in the state and may also publish the notice in a
13 recognized financial journal outside the state. The required
14 publications shall be made once each week for two consecutive
15 weeks prior to the date fixed for the sale, the last
16 publication thereof to be at least five days prior to the date
17 of the sale. The notice shall specify the amount,
18 denomination, maturity and description of the bonds to be
19 offered for sale and the place, date and hour at which the
20 sealed bids shall be received. At the time and place specified
21 in the notice, the state board of finance shall open the bids
22 in public and shall award the bonds to the bidder or bidders
23 offering the best price for the bonds. The state board of
24 finance may reject any or all bids and readvertise and may
25 waive any irregularity in a bid. All bids, except that of the

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1 state, shall be accompanied by a deposit of two percent of the
2 principal amount of the bonds in a form acceptable to the state
3 board of finance. The deposit of an unsuccessful bidder shall
4 be returned upon rejection of the bid. The state board of
5 finance may also sell the bonds or any part of the bonds to the
6 state treasurer or state investment officer. The state
7 treasurer or state investment officer is authorized to purchase
8 any of the bonds for investment. The bonds are legal
9 investments for any person or board charged with the investment
10 of any public funds and may be accepted as security for any
11 deposit of public money.

12 **SECTION 6. EXPENSES.**--The expenses incurred by the state
13 board of finance in or relating to the preparation and sale of
14 the bonds shall be paid out of the proceeds from the sale of
15 the bonds, and all rebate, penalty, interest and other
16 obligations of the state relating to the bonds and bond
17 proceeds under the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended,
18 shall be paid from earnings on bond proceeds or other money of
19 the state, legally available for such payments.

20 **SECTION 7. PROPERTY TAX LEVY.**--To provide for the payment
21 of the principal of and interest on the bonds issued and sold
22 pursuant to the provisions of the 2016 Capital Projects General
23 Obligation Bond Act, there shall be and there is hereby imposed
24 and levied during each year in which any of the bonds are
25 outstanding an ad valorem tax on all property in the state

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1 subject to property taxation for state purposes sufficient to
2 pay the interest as it becomes due on the bonds, together with
3 an amount sufficient to provide a sinking fund to pay the
4 principal of the bonds as it becomes due, and, if permitted by
5 law, ad valorem taxes may be collected to pay administrative
6 costs incident to the collection of such taxes. The taxes
7 shall be imposed, levied, assessed and collected at the times
8 and in the manner that other property taxes for state purposes
9 are imposed, levied, assessed and collected. It is the duty of
10 all tax officials and authorities to cause these taxes to be
11 imposed, levied, assessed and collected.

12 **SECTION 8. TREASURER--DUTIES.--**The state treasurer shall
13 keep separate accounts of all money collected pursuant to the
14 taxes imposed and levied pursuant to the provisions of the 2016
15 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act and shall use this
16 money only for the purposes of paying the principal of and
17 interest on the bonds as they become due and any expenses
18 relating thereto.

19 **SECTION 9. IRREPEALABLE CONTRACT--AUTHORITY FOR**
20 **ISSUANCE.--**An owner of bonds issued pursuant to the provisions
21 of the 2016 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act may,
22 either at law or in equity, by suit, action or mandamus,
23 enforce and compel the performance of the duties required by
24 that act of any officer or entity mentioned in that act. The
25 provisions of that act constitute an irrepealable contract with

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1 the owners of any of the bonds issued pursuant to that act for
2 the faithful performance of which the full faith and credit of
3 the state is pledged. Without reference to any other act of
4 the legislature, the 2016 Capital Projects General Obligation
5 Bond Act is full authority for the issuance and sale of the
6 bonds authorized in that act, and such bonds shall have all the
7 qualities of investment securities under the Uniform Commercial
8 Code, shall not be invalid for any irregularity or defect in
9 the proceedings for the issuance and sale of the bonds and
10 shall be incontestable in the hands of bona fide purchasers or
11 holders thereof for value. All bonds issued under the
12 provisions of that act, and the interest thereon, are exempt
13 from taxation by the state and any subdivision or public body
14 thereof.

15 **SECTION 10. PROJECTS.**--The proceeds from the sale of
16 bonds issued under the provisions of the 2016 Capital Projects
17 General Obligation Bond Act shall be distributed as follows for
18 the purposes and in the amounts specified:

19 A. for senior citizen facility improvement,
20 construction and equipment acquisition projects, to the aging
21 and long-term services department:

22 (1) one hundred ninety thousand dollars
23 (\$190,000) to purchase and equip vehicles, including meal
24 delivery vehicles, for the Albuquerque department of senior
25 affairs kitchen facility in Albuquerque in Bernalillo county;

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1 (2) three hundred fifty-one thousand two
2 hundred dollars (\$351,200) for improvements to the facility to
3 address code compliance issues at Los Volcanes senior center in
4 Albuquerque in Bernalillo county;

5 (3) forty-seven thousand five hundred dollars
6 (\$47,500) to purchase and equip vehicles for the Los Volcanes
7 senior center in Albuquerque in Bernalillo county;

8 (4) thirty-five thousand dollars (\$35,000) to
9 purchase and install meals equipment for the North Domingo Baca
10 senior center in Albuquerque in Bernalillo county;

11 (5) nine hundred twelve thousand five hundred
12 dollars (\$912,500) to plan, design, construct and equip an
13 addition to the Palo Duro senior fitness center in Albuquerque
14 in Bernalillo county;

15 (6) forty-seven thousand five hundred dollars
16 (\$47,500) to purchase and equip vehicles for the Palo Duro
17 senior fitness center in Albuquerque in Bernalillo county;

18 (7) fifty-one thousand dollars (\$51,000) for
19 improvements to the facility to address code compliance issues
20 at the Glenwood senior center in Glenwood in Catron county;

21 (8) twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000) for
22 renovations to the Quemado senior center in Quemado in Catron
23 county;

24 (9) ninety-one thousand dollars (\$91,000) to
25 purchase and equip hot meal delivery vehicles for the Reserve

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1 senior center in Reserve in Catron county;

2 (10) forty-three thousand seven hundred
3 dollars (\$43,700) to purchase and equip a vehicle for the
4 Hagerman/Dexter senior center in Hagerman in Chaves county;

5 (11) forty-three thousand seven hundred
6 dollars (\$43,700) to purchase and equip a vehicle for the Lake
7 Arthur senior center in Lake Arthur in Chaves county;

8 (12) three hundred thousand two hundred
9 dollars (\$300,200) to purchase and equip vehicles for the
10 Roswell senior center in Roswell in Chaves county;

11 (13) sixty-seven thousand dollars (\$67,000)
12 for improvements to the facility to address code compliance
13 issues at the Eagle Nest senior center in Eagle Nest in Colfax
14 county;

15 (14) two hundred fifty thousand dollars
16 (\$250,000) to plan, design and construct a senior facility and
17 meal site for the Clovis senior center in Clovis in Curry
18 county;

19 (15) nineteen thousand one hundred dollars
20 (\$19,100) to purchase and install meals equipment at the Clovis
21 senior center in Clovis in Curry county;

22 (16) forty thousand dollars (\$40,000) to
23 purchase and equip a vehicle for the Grady senior center in
24 Grady in Curry county;

25 (17) six thousand dollars (\$6,000) to purchase

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1 and install meals equipment at the Melrose senior center in

3 (18) one hundred thirty-six thousand dollars

14 center in Mimbres in Grant county;

15 (22) sixty-eight thousand dollars (\$68,000) to
16 purchase and install meals equipment at the Santa Clara senior
17 center in Santa Clara in Grant county;

18 (23) one hundred eight thousand dollars
19 (\$108,000) to purchase and install meals equipment at the
20 Silver City senior center in Silver City in Grant county;

21 (24) thirty-seven thousand two hundred dollars

6 purchase and equip vehicles for the Lovington Bill McKibben
7 senior center in Lovington in Lea county;

8 (28) thirty thousand one hundred fifty dollars
9 (\$30,150) to purchase and equip a vehicle for the Tatum senior
10 center in Tatum in Lea county;

11 (29) twelve thousand eight hundred dollars

5 SECTION 11. ELECTION.--

6 A. Bonds issued pursuant to the 2016 Capital
7 Projects General Obligation Bond Act shall be submitted to the
8 registered voters of the state at the general election to be
9 held in November 2016, and, if they receive a majority of all
10 the votes cast thereon at such election, shall take effect upon
11 certification of the state canvassing board announcing the
12 results of the election. No bonds shall be issued or sold
13 under that act until the registered voters of this state have
14 voted upon and approved the bonds and property tax as provided
15 in this section. Any bonds issued under that act shall be
16 issued within thirty months from the date of such election.

17 B. The ballots used at the 2016 general election

18 13-4A-4 NMSA 1978 and where applicable, the appropriations
19 authorized in the 2016 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond
20 Act include money for the art in public places fund.

21 SECTION 13. PROJECT SCOPE--EXPENDITURES--REVERSION.--

22 A. If an appropriation for a project authorized in
23 the 2016 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act is not
24 sufficient to complete all the purposes specified, the
25 appropriation may be expended for any portion of the purposes

1 specified in the appropriation. Expenditures shall not be made
2 for purposes other than those specified in the appropriation.

3 B. The state agencies and state institutions to
4 which money has been appropriated in the 2016 Capital Projects
5 General Obligation Bond Act shall be responsible for monitoring
6 the projects funded in that act to ensure compliance with the
7 constitution and laws of New Mexico and shall cause to be
8 reverted any unexpended or unencumbered balance remaining at
9 the earlier of the third full fiscal year after issuance of the
10 bonds or the termination or completion of the specific project.
11 Reverted funds shall be deposited in the debt service fund
12 established by the state treasurer for the purpose of paying
13 the principal of and interest on the state's general obligation
14 bonds.

15 SECTION 14. SEVERABILITY.--If any part or application of
16 the 2016 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act is held
17 invalid, the remainder or its application to other situations
18 or persons shall not be affected.

19 SECTION 15. EMERGENCY.--It is necessary for the public
20 peace, health and safety that this act take effect immediately.
