

1 A MEMORIAL

2 DECLARING FEBRUARY 20, 2017 "SCHOOL NUTRITION DAY" IN THE  
3 SENATE.

5 WHEREAS, school nutrition programs provided through the  
6 national school lunch program and school breakfast program  
7 have provided millions of healthy and nutritious meals to  
8 schoolchildren throughout New Mexico for more than seventy  
9 years; and

10 WHEREAS, school nutrition programs serve healthy meals,  
11 free or at low cost, to students in New Mexico schools; and

12 WHEREAS, school nutrition programs not only feed hungry  
13 children and support family well-being, they also act as  
14 "economic stabilizers" during economic downturns; and

15 WHEREAS, many children consume at least one-half of  
16 their daily calories at school, and for many children, food  
17 served at school may be the only nutritious food they  
18 regularly eat; and

19 WHEREAS, school nutrition programs play an important  
20 role in helping to ensure that every student in New Mexico  
21 starts school ready to learn, since studies show that a  
22 well-fed and well-nourished child is a more eager and  
23 attentive student; and

24 WHEREAS, school nutrition programs have demonstrated a  
25 commitment in New Mexico to promote children's health,

1 well-being and educational excellence as primary goals for  
2 student success; and

3 WHEREAS, New Mexico has ranked first or second  
4 nationally in students participating in school breakfast  
5 programs in recent years and has been among the top ten  
6 states in numbers of students participating in school  
7 breakfast programs in the last ten years; and

8 WHEREAS, nearly three hundred forty-seven thousand  
9 students across New Mexico are eligible to participate in  
10 school meal programs; and

11 WHEREAS, the public education department's fresh fruit  
12 and vegetable program brings healthy, farm-grown food to tens  
13 of thousands of schoolchildren in the state, a measure that  
14 contributes to a healthy diet and mitigates childhood  
15 obesity; and

16 WHEREAS, as recently as 2011, nearly one-third of New  
17 Mexico children were overweight or obese, and experts project  
18 that a healthier population could save the state more than  
19 one billion five hundred million dollars (\$1,500,000,000)  
20 annually in health care expenses related to obesity and  
21 diabetes;

22 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE OF THE  
23 STATE OF NEW MEXICO that the state recognize that funding for  
24 school nutrition programs to promote healthier lifestyles and  
25 academic achievement is a wise investment in the health of
