SUMMARY

Synopsis of Bill

House Bill 216 amends the County Subdivision Act to eliminate the state records administrator from any requirements for filing of any county subdivision regulation. The bill further updates agency statutory names.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

NMCPR will not incur additional operating expenses and will not see a change in other revenues obtained through fees.

According to the FIR published in 2017, NMCPR suggested counties will incur additional costs to properly house and protect these historical and permanent records to prevent loss and ensure the preservation of history and lessen the demand for space at the NMCPR.

SIGNIFICANT ISSUES

NMCPR reports that it will no longer have to receive, file and archive county subdivision regulations. The records center operates at full capacity, this will free up space for additional records.
