AN ACT

MAKING GENERAL APPROPRIATIONS AND AUTHORIZING EXPENDITURES;
PROVIDING AN EXCEPTION TO LEGISLATIVE CONFIDENTIALITY.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

SECTION 1. LEGISLATIVE FISCAL YEAR 2022

APPROPRIATION.--Two hundred thousand dollars (\$200,000) is appropriated from the general fund to the legislative council service for expenditure in fiscal years 2022 and 2023 for cybersecurity systems and operations for the legislative information system. Any unexpended or unencumbered balance remaining at the end of fiscal year 2023 shall revert to the general fund.

SECTION 2. JUDICIAL FISCAL YEAR 2022 APPROPRIATIONS.--The

appropriations in this section are from the general fund for the following agencies for expenditure in fiscal years 2022 and .222873.3

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1 2023 for the purposes specified and, unless otherwise
2 indicated, the unexpended or unencumbered balance of an
3 appropriation in this section at the end of fiscal year 2023
4 shall revert to the general fund:

5 A. to the court of appeals, fifty thousand dollars
6 (\$50,000) to improve and enhance the timely processing of
7 judicial appeals;

8 B. to the administrative office of the courts:

9 (1) one hundred thirty thousand dollars
10 (\$130,000) to expand New Mexico's statewide volunteer attorney
11 pool to provide legal assistance to low- and moderate-income
12 persons who are not qualified or are conflicted out of the
13 legal aid volunteer attorney pool; and

14 (2) fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) for the
15 Children's Code reform task force;

16 C. to the first judicial district court, fifty
17 thousand dollars (\$50,000) for offsite court operations to rent
18 facilities and to contract for security and personnel to
19 conduct jury trials in accordance with coronavirus disease 2019
20 safe practices;

21 D. to the second judicial district court, sixty
22 thousand dollars (\$60,000) to assist with case backlog and jury
23 trials;

24 E. to the third judicial district court, one
25 hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000) to purchase and install

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1 information technology improvements at court locations for
2 remote hearings;

3 F. to the eleventh judicial district court, one
4 hundred fifty thousand dollars (\$150,000) to upgrade courtroom
5 technology in San Juan county;

6 G. to the district attorney of the first judicial
7 district, three hundred sixty thousand dollars (\$360,000) for
8 an integrated prosecution, intervention and diversion data
9 system; and

10 H. to the district attorney of the sixth judicial
11 district, one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000) to purchase
12 and install forensic interviewing and information technology
13 equipment.

14 **SECTION 3. GENERAL CONTROL FISCAL YEAR 2022**

15 APPROPRIATIONS.--The appropriations in this section are from
16 the general fund for the following agencies for expenditure in

11 construct and install traffic control devices along the bosque
12 in Albuquerque to reduce pedestrian and off-road vehicle
13 accidents;

14 (6) fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) for the
15 regional emergency dispatch authority for coordination and
16 equipment in southeastern New Mexico;

17 (7) one hundred ten thousand dollars
18 (\$110,000) to contract for the provision of civil legal
19 services for immigrant families;

20 (8) one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000) to
21 provide funding for the economic development department to
22 administer the healthy food financing initiative as part of the
23 statewide hunger initiative;

10 contract for services for mentoring African American students
11 in Albuquerque;

12 (g) fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) for
13 educational programs at the Albuquerque zoo;

14 (h) one hundred thousand dollars
15 (\$100,000) for Los Ranchos de Albuquerque's Fourth street
16 revitalization project, which includes an outdoor classroom at
17 the Larry P. Abraham agri-nature center;

18 (i) fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) to
19 repair and install new Vietnam veteran recognition plaques;
20 repair a rock wall; and plan, design and construct new
21 memorials honoring veterans from all military conflicts at the
22 Tijeras veterans memorial;

9 out the purposes of the fund;

10 (2) fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) for the

12 recreation infrastructure plan for the Rio Grande trail;

13 (3) one hundred eighty thousand dollars
14 (\$180,000) for economic development organizations promoting
15 economic development along west Central avenue in Bernalillo

9 affordability of health coverage for New Mexico residents and
10 assessing a global payment system for hospitals and health; and

12 (\$350,000) to contract for consultants to assess improvements
13 needed to health benefits procurement to ensure fairness,
14 health improvement and cost-effectiveness.

15 SECTION 5. AGRICULTURE, ENERGY AND NATURAL RESOURCES
16 FISCAL YEAR 2022 APPROPRIATIONS.--The appropriations in this

23 SECTION 20. TEMPORARY PROVISION.--Notwithstanding the
24 provisions of Section 2-3-13 NMSA 1978 and Legislative Joint
25 Rule 12-1, the legislative council service shall publish on the
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1 legislative website a searchable list of the appropriations
2 contained in this act as it passed the legislature, the name of
3 each legislator who allocated a portion of the appropriation
4 and the amount of the verified allocation. The list shall be
5 published no earlier than the day after the governor signs this
6 act and no later than thirty days after adjournment of the
7 third special session of the fifty-fifth legislature.

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
