MAKING GENERAL APPROPRIATIONS AND AUTHORIZING EXPENDITURES; PROVIDING AN EXCEPTION TO LEGISLATIVE CONFIDENTIALITY.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

6 SECTION 1. LEGISLATIVE FISCAL YEAR 2023

SECTION 11. TRANSFERS TO APPROPRIATION ACCOUNT OF
GENERAL FUND.—In addition to the transfer authority provided
in Section 14 of the General Appropriation Act of 2022, if
revenue and transfers to the general fund at the end of
fiscal year 2023 are not sufficient to meet appropriations,
the governor, with state board of finance approval, may
transfer up to four hundred thirty million dollars
(\$430,000,000) to the appropriation account of the general
fund from the operating reserve.

SECTION 12. TEMPORARY PROVISION.--Notwithstanding the provisions of Section 2-3-13 NMSA 1978 and Legislative Joint Rule 12-1, the legislative council service shall publish on

1	the legislative website a searchable list of the	
2	appropriations contained in this act as it passed the	
3	legislature, the name of each legislator who allocated a	
4	portion of the appropriation and the amount of the verified	
5	allocation. The list shall be published thirty days after
