BILL SUMMARY

Synopsis:

SB 96 amends Section 30-28-1, concerning attempts to commit a felony, so that if the crime attempted is murder in the second degree, the person committing the attempted murder is guilty of a third degree felony and, notwithstanding the provisions of Section 31-18-15 NMSA 1978, the basic sentence of imprisonment is nine years. This would differentiate second degree murder from other second degree felonies, as under present law, if the crime attempted is a second degree felony, the person committing such attempt is guilty of a third degree felony.

SB 96 also raises the penalty for a second degree felony resulting in the death of a human being from 15 to 18 years.

SIGNIFICANT ISSUES

SB 96 creates a special third degree felony basic sentence for attempted second degree murder of nine years, in contrast to the present basic sentence for a third degree felony of three years. It is worth nothing that the basic sentence for a third degree felony for the death of human being is only six years, so under SB 96 the attempt of second degree murder would have a higher basic sentence than third degree felonies that result in someone's death.

It is difficult to determine what the effect of passing SB 96 would be on the state's prison population, but the penalties included in the bill could lead to people being incarcerated by the Corrections Department for longer periods. As of June 30 2023, there were 481 people incarcerated in the state where second degree murder was their highest offense. There were also six people confined for attempted murder in the second degree as their highest offense. The average per day cost to incarcerate someone in the state's prison system is \$156.45/day; this average includes private and public facilities.
