A MEMORIAL

REQUESTING THE LEGISLATIVE EDUCATION STUDY COMMITTEE TO STUDY
CLASS SIZE REDUCTIONS FOR KINDERGARTEN THROUGH TWELFTH GRADE
CLASSES.

WHEREAS, fewer than one in four students in New Mexico
scored "proficient" in reading and math on the national
assessment of educational progress tests in 2022, ranking New
Mexico the lowest in the nation for student reading and math
proficiency; and

WHEREAS, a large proportion of kindergarten through
twelfth grade students in New Mexico are at-risk, with one in
four children living in poverty and higher than national
averages of students identified as English language learners or
students with disabilities; and

WHEREAS, the percentages of kindergarten through twelfth

1 grade economically disadvantaged students, English language
2 learners, Native American students and students with
3 disabilities scoring "proficient" on statewide assessment tests
4 in New Mexico continue to fall below statewide proficiency
5 averages; and

6 WHEREAS, kindergarten through twelfth grade teachers in
7 New Mexico and across the nation report a marked impact of the
8 coronavirus disease 2019 pandemic on students' social,
9 emotional and behavioral development, resulting in increased
10 disruptions of instructional time and demands on teachers and
11 support staff; and

12 WHEREAS, a finding in the consolidated *Yazzie/Martinez v.*
13 *State of New Mexico* lawsuit pointed out the critical need for
14 highly effective educators to serve kindergarten through
15 twelfth grade students with disabilities, Native American
16 students, economically disadvantaged students and English
17 language learners; and

18 WHEREAS, national research indicates that reducing
19 kindergarten through twelfth grade class sizes can be an
20 effective means to improve educational outcomes, increase
21 student engagement and improve classroom behavior, particularly
22 in early elementary grades, among at-risk students and in
23 classes with less experienced or effective teachers; and

24 WHEREAS, the turnover rate for kindergarten through
25 twelfth grade teachers in New Mexico has increased over the

1 past three years, and more kindergarten through twelfth grade
2 teacher candidates are completing alternative licensure
3 pathways than traditional licensure pathways, with little or no
4 classroom experience prior to teaching; and

5 WHEREAS, reducing kindergarten through twelfth grade class
6 size maximums would require hiring additional teachers and
7 administrative assistants while New Mexico continues to face
8 shortages in those areas;

9 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF
10 REPRESENTATIVES OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO that the legislative
11 education study committee be requested to study kindergarten
12 through twelfth grade class size reductions, including the
13 potential effects on student outcomes, staffing and funding;
14 and

15 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the legislative education
16 study committee be requested to work with representatives from
17 the public education department, the higher education
18 department, the legislative finance committee, the early
19 childhood education and care department, school district and
20 charter school leadership, teachers' unions and educator
21 preparation programs; and

22 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the legislative education
23 study committee be requested to submit its research findings
24 and recommendations to the governor and the legislature and to
25 publish its report by December 31, 2024; and
