BILL SUMMARY

House Bill 89 (HB89) prohibits public bodies from entering into agreements used to detain individuals for federal civil immigration violations and requires any existing such agreements to be terminated; prohibits public agencies from otherwise using public property to assist federal authorities in detaining individuals over federal civil immigration violations.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

No fiscal impact to DPS.

SIGNIFICANT ISSUES

The State of New Mexico has received approximately 6.5 billion dollars in federal funding since 2021. It is undetermined currently how much federal funding is tied to compliance with immigration laws and how much this legislation could adversely affect funding in the State of New Mexico.

The law could eliminate this source of funding, and the loss of federal funding or resources could strain their budgets and affect their ability to carry out other law enforcement functions. This could lead to a loss of personnel, equipment, or support services necessary for effective public safety enforcement.

This bill could compromise DPS' ability to work effectively with federal agencies, reduce public safety, and complicate the department's ability to address crime at the local, state, and national levels. It is vital to DPS' mission of protecting the safety and well-being of the public to maintain flexibility in how they cooperate with federal authorities, especially in tackling complex criminal activities and national security issues.
