BILL SUMMARY

Authorizes law enforcement officers and Department of Transportation (DOT) employees to tow vehicles or cargo that pose an immediate public safety hazard from roadways and offers limited liability protection for state, county and municipal employees — who would not be held liable for potential damage to vehicles or cargo damaged during removal.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

SIGNIFICANT ISSUES

There are no significant issues to DPS and only provides for smoother operations and enhanced public safety to save lives.

PERFORMANCE IMPLICATIONS

This legislation benefits both the New Mexico Department of Public Safety (DPS) and citizens by enhancing road safety and ensuring more efficient management of hazardous situations on roadways. It improves public safety by allowing law enforcement officers and Department of Transportation (DOT) employees to move vehicles, debris, or cargo creating immediate safety hazards, thereby minimizing the risk of accidents and enabling quicker responses to dangerous conditions. Additionally, the legislation facilitates faster traffic recovery by allowing for the prompt removal of obstructions, which reduces traffic disruptions, improves traffic flow, and alleviates congestion for commuters and other road users. By granting law enforcement and DOT employees the authority to act swiftly when public safety is at risk, the law enhances their ability to manage road hazards effectively and reduces delays in addressing such situations. The legislation also provides protection against liability, ensuring that law enforcement, DOT employees, and their agencies are not held responsible for any damage caused by removing a hazard, which encourages timely action. For citizens, this translates into clearer roadways and safer driving conditions, reducing the risk of accidents and secondary incidents like rear-end collisions.

The legislation ensures quicker response times to road hazards, improves traffic safety, and enhances the ability of the New Mexico DPS and DOT to protect the public.

WHAT WILL BE THE CONSEQUENCES OF NOT ENACTING THIS BILL

If this legislation is not enacted, the consequences could be significant for both public safety and the efficient management of road hazards. Without the authority for law enforcement and DOT employees to quickly move vehicles, debris, or cargo creating safety hazards, dangerous conditions could persist longer on roadways, increasing the likelihood of accidents, including secondary incidents like rear-end collisions. Response times to hazardous situations could be delayed, leaving obstructions on the road for longer periods and further heightening the risks for drivers. Traffic congestion would also continue for an extended time, frustrating commuters and emergency responders, and creating a ripple effect across broader traffic systems. Additionally, without protection against liability, law enforcement officers and DOT employees may hesitate to act in urgent situations for fear of legal repercussions, leading to inaction or delayed interventions. This hesitation could further compromise public safety. A lack of efficient responses to road hazards could erode public trust in the ability of law enforcement and DOT employees to maintain safety, reducing confidence and the public's sense of security. Moreover, increased accidents, traffic delays, and congestion could have wider economic impacts, such as lost productivity and stretched emergency services.

Without this legislation, the roadways could become more hazardous, slower, and less efficient, compromising safety for both citizens and first responders.
