SECTION III: NARRATIVE

BILL SUMMARY

This amendment removes a strikethrough that was in the original bill and was intended as a stylistic amendment. The current statute defines emergency replacement wells as, *inter alia*, wells drilled into "the same and only the same" underground stream, channel, artesian basin, reservoir or lake as the original well.

The original bill struck out the language "and only the same." The HAAWC amendment removes this strikethrough, keeping the definition of an emergency replacement well unchanged.

SIGNIFICANT ISSUES

In the OSE analysis of the original bill, the OSE pointed out that striking out "and only the same" could potentially open up the possibility for applicants to argue that emergency replacement wells could tap into multiple aquifers, including aquifers that the original well did not tap, so long as the replacement well also tapped into the same aquifer that the original well tapped. This could increase the effects on neighboring wells.

The amendment, which removes the strikethrough of "and only the same", removes this possibility. Emergency replacement wells will continue to be limited to the same and only the same aquifers that are tapped by the wells they are replacing.
