HB411 amends NMSA 1978 12-3-4 to adopt Smithsonite as the official mineral of New Mexico.

Smithsonite, also known as zinc spar, is the mineral form of zinc carbonate. Smithsonite comes in a range of colors, from bright yellow to soft pink. The Kelly Mine, located in the Magdalena mining district of Socorro, New Mexico, is renowned for its high-quality deposits of Smithsonite with a distinctive blue-green hue. While Smithsonite can be found worldwide, the clarity and quality of the specimens from New Mexico are considered exceptionally rare. Smithsonite has not been adopted as the state mineral for any other state.
