BILL SUMMARY

<u>Synopsis</u>: House Bill 443 (HB 443) proposes amendments to the Liquor Control Act (LCA) to allow individuals at least eighteen years old to deliver and stock packaged alcoholic beverages. The bill revises Section 60-7B-10 NMSA 1978 to permit minors of legal working age to enter licensed premises for the purpose of delivering or stocking alcohol, removing the previous requirement that such individuals hold a commercial driver's license. It also amends Section 60-7B-11 NMSA 1978 to allow wholesalers to employ eighteen-year-olds for warehouse operations, delivery, and stocking of sealed, unbroken containers of alcoholic beverages, while maintaining prohibitions on minors working as bartenders or sampling alcohol.

References to "regulations" in the legislation have a proposed change to "rules."

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

None for WSD.

SIGNIFICANT ISSUES

Although the New Mexico Child Labor Act governs the employment of minors under the age of 18, such as setting restrictions on hazardous work, work hours, and certain job duties, HB 443 only applies to individuals 18 years old and older. Therefore, there is no conflict with the Child Labor Act.
