SECTION III: NARRATIVE

BILL SUMMARY

Seante Bill 4 (SB 4) SB 4 amends the Environmental Improvement Act, NMSA 1978, Section 74-1-1, and the Air Quality Control Act, NMSA 1978, Section 74-2-1, to set limits on emissions of greenhouse gases and requires the Environment Department (NMED), in consultation with Energy, Minerals and Natural Resources Department, to allocate by greenhouse gas sector necessary reductions through rulemaking. Additionally, SB 4 requires all state agencies to apply climate equity principles to rule development.

NO IMPACT STATEMENT

SB 4 should have no substantive fiscal or administrative impact on the NMDOT in the near future. NMDOT would be required to "a) prioritize greenhouse gas reduction in overburdened communities; b) incorporate tribal consultation and outreach to tribal communities in the A-1366

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rulemaking; and c) consider how to address adverse health and environmental impacts from greenhouse gases and other pollutants" during the rulemaking process. The application of climate equity principles to rule development could be expected to nominally increase costs related to rulemaking.

It is possible that the rules developed by NMED to achieve the greenhouse gas emissions goals mandated in SB 4 could also have negative fiscal or administrative impacts. However, at this time estimating the fiscal or administrative impacts associated with SB 4 rulemaking mandates would be speculative. Additionally, any evaluation of the fiscal or administrative impacts related to greenhouse gas emissions restrictions would be speculative in the absence of rulemaking.
