SECTION III: NARRATIVE

BILL SUMMARY

<u>Synopsis:</u> Two million dollars (\$2,000,000) is appropriated from the general fund to the uranium mining reclamation revolving fund for expenditure in fiscal year 2026 and subsequent fiscal years for conducting uranium mine and mill reclamation activities. Any unexpended or unencumbered balance remaining at the end of a fiscal year shall not revert to the general fund.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

SB276 is a \$2 million appropriation to the Uranium Mining Reclamation Revolving Fund administered by NMED. NMED anticipates adding 2 FTE to create the Uranium Mine Cleanup program, costing \$280 thousand annually for personnel. The Department expects costs of up to \$500 thousand annually for contracted site work (initial assessments, detailed assessments and sampling, reclamation planning, and clean up).

Additional funding sources will need to be identified to effectively implement remediation projects.

SIGNIFICANT ISSUES

ADMINISTRATIVE IMPLICATIONS

Creating, hiring, and training the necessary additional FTE is a significant undertaking for the Department and will require additional administrative support.

CONFLICT, DUPLICATION, COMPANIONSHIP, RELATIONSHIP

SB260 appropriates funds into the Water Quality Management Fund for the characterization and remediation of non-uranium neglected contaminate sites as well as abandoned uranium mine sites.

TECHNICAL ISSUES

NMED does not have jurisdictional authority to clean up mines on tribal lands. The mechanism

for addressing sites on tribal land will need to be addressed through Memorandums of Agreement or other means to facilitate work on these sites.

WHAT WILL BE THE CONSEQUENCES OF NOT ENACTING THIS BILL

New Mexico has around 50 uranium mines sites that are not eligible under any current cleanup program on private, state, and federal lands that will continue to pose risk to human health and the environment if left unaddressed for decades more. Former uranium mines on tribal lands increase that count to hundreds of legacy mines in the state that will remain unaddressed, even after decades of impact. There are additional abandoned uranium mines that are technically under federal or other cleanup programs but lack funding to remediate; they will continue to be unfunded and unaddressed, leaving New Mexicans at risk.
