BILL SUMMARY

Synopsis:

SB345 proposes changes to New Mexico's teacher licensure system. The bill aims to provide more flexible pathways for teacher licensure, making it easier for educators from other states and new teachers to enter the profession in New Mexico.

Teacher Portfolio for Level One Licensure: Allows aspiring teachers to use a teacher portfolio as an alternative to the New Mexico teacher assessment exam to qualify for a Level One teaching license. This option includes a rigorous assessment for elementary licensure candidates on the science of teaching reading.

Reciprocity for Out-of-State Educators: Level Two and Level Three teachers and school principals licensed in other states may receive equivalent licensure in New Mexico if they have teaching experience and meet competency requirements. Local school superintendents may require a mentorship period for these educators if deemed necessary.

Instructional Support Provider Licensure: Extends reciprocity to instructional support providers (e.g., counselors, therapists) licensed in other states. Applicants must have professional experience, any required professional licenses, and meet competency requirements. Local superintendents can require mentorship for these professionals.
