11	RELATING TO ANIMALS; AMENDING DEFINITIONS IN THE LIVESTOCK
12	CODE; ALLOWING FERTILITY CONTROL, RELOCATION AND ADOPTION OF
13	FREE-ROAMING HORSES UNDER CERTAIN CIRCUMSTANCES; ALLOWING A
14	FREE-ROAMING HORSE EXPERT TO CONTROL THE POPULATION OF FREE-
15	ROAMING HORSES ON CERTAIN LAND THROUGH CERTAIN METHODS;
16	REQUIRING THE NEW MEXICO LIVESTOCK BOARD TO APPROVE THE
17	QUALIFICATIONS OF A FREE-ROAMING HORSE EXPERT; ALLOWING THE NEW
18	MEXICO LIVESTOCK BOARD TO MAKE RULES REGARDING THE APPROVAL OF
19	THE QUALIFICATIONS OF A FREE-ROAMING HORSE EXPERT; PROHIBITING
20	THE SLAUGHTER OR EXPORT FOR SLAUGHTER OF FREE-ROAMING HORSES;
21	PROVIDING A PENALTY.
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23	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:
24	SECTION 1. Section 77-2-1.1 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 1993,
25	Chapter 248, Section 2, as amended) is amended to read:

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"77-2-1.1. DEFINITIONS.--As used in The Livestock Code: 1 "animals" or "livestock" means all domestic or 2 Α. 3 domesticated animals that are used or raised on a farm or 4 ranch, including the carcasses thereof, and exotic animals in 5 captivity and includes equines, cattle, sheep, goats, swine, 6 bison, poultry, ostriches, emus, rheas, camelids and farmed 7 cervidae upon any land in New Mexico. "Animals" or "livestock" 8 does not include canine or feline animals; 9 Β. "bill of sale" means an instrument in 10 substantially the form specified in The Livestock Code by which 11 the owner or the owner's authorized agent transfers to the 12 buyer the title to animals described in the bill of sale; 13 "bison" or "buffalo" means a bovine animal of C. 14 the species bison; 15 "board" means the New Mexico livestock board; D. 16 "bond" means cash or an insurance agreement from Ε. 17 a New Mexico licensed surety or insurance corporation pledging 18 surety for financial loss caused to another, including 19 certificate of deposit, letter of credit or other surety as may 20 be approved by the grain inspection, packers and stockyards 21 administration of the United States department of agriculture 22 or the board;

F. "brand" means a symbol or device in a form approved by and recorded with the board as may be sufficient to readily distinguish livestock should they become intermixed .229262.6 - 2 -

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1 with other livestock; "brand inspector" means an inspector who is not 2 G. 3 certified as a peace officer; 4 "carcasses" means dead or dressed bodies of Η. 5 livestock or parts thereof; "cattle" means animals of the genus bos, 6 Τ. 7 including dairy cattle, and does not include any other kind of 8 livestock: 9 J. "dairy cattle" means animals of the genus bos 10 raised not for consumption but for dairy products and 11 distinguished from meat breed cattle; 12 "director" means the executive director of the Κ. 13 board: 14 L. "disease" means a communicable, infectious or 15 contagious disease; 16 Μ. "district" means a livestock inspection 17 district; 18 "equine" means a horse, pony, mule, donkey or N. 19 hinny; 20 "estray" means livestock found running at large 0. 21 upon public or private lands, either fenced or unfenced, whose 22 owner is unknown, or that is branded with a brand that is not 23 on record in the office of the board or is a freshly branded or 24 marked offspring not with its branded or marked mother, unless 25 other proof of ownership is produced; .229262.6

2	a corporation or an organization, including a corporation's or
3	organization's contractors, determined by the board to possess
4	qualifications, including demonstrated expertise in:
5	(1) conducting free-roaming horse herd
6	surveys;
7	(2) analyzing the ownership status and animal
8	carrying capacity of land in conjunction with environmental
9	health; and
10	(3) understanding free-roaming horse habitat,
11	biology, behavior, management strategies and population
12	dynamics;
13	[ <del>P.</del> ] <u>Q.</u> "inspector" means a livestock or brand
14	inspector;
15	$[Q_{\bullet}]$ <u>R.</u> "livestock inspector" means a certified
16	inspector who is granted full law enforcement powers for
17	enforcement of The Livestock Code and other criminal laws
18	relating to livestock;
19	[ <del>R.</del> ] <u>S.</u> "mark" means an ear tag or ownership mark
20	that is not a brand;
21	$[S_{\cdot}]$ <u>T.</u> "meat" means the edible flesh of poultry,
22	birds or animals sold for human consumption and includes
23	livestock, poultry and livestock and poultry products;
24	$[T_{\cdot}]$ <u>U.</u> "mule" means a hybrid resulting from the
25	cross of a horse and [ <del>an ass</del> ] <u>a donkey</u> ; and
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1 [U.] V. "person" means an individual, firm, 2 partnership, association, corporation or similar legal entity." SECTION 2. Section 77-2-30 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 2005, 3 Chapter 236, Section 1, as amended) is amended to read: 4 5 "77-2-30. EQUINE RESCUE OR RETIREMENT FACILITY--REGISTRATION--BOARD POWERS AND DUTIES--FEES.--6 7 As used in this section, "facility" means an Α. equine rescue or retirement facility, including a public or 8 9 private reserve or [private] preserve, that [advertises or 10 solicits for equines and provides lifelong care or finds new 11 owners for equines that are unwanted or have been neglected or 12 abused or captured wild equines that cannot be returned to 13 their range] provides lifelong care or finds new owners for 14 unwanted, abused or neglected equines or captured free-roaming 15 horses, but does not include a federal facility. 16 A facility shall not operate in New Mexico Β. 17 unless registered by the board. 18 C. The board shall: 19 (1) register facilities that meet the 20 requirements of this section and rules promulgated by the 21 board; 22 annually consult with representatives from (2) 23 the equine industry, equine rescue organizations and 24 veterinarians on facility standards; and 25 after consideration of recommendations by (3) .229262.6 - 5 -

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1 national organizations for the care of unwanted equines and 2 equine rescue and retirement facilities, promulgate rules for facilities, including: 3 4 (a) health and sanitary requirements; 5 (b) standards for barns, paddocks, 6 pastures and ranges; 7 qualifications of the facility (c) 8 staff; 9 (d) provision of veterinary care; 10 (e) feeding and watering requirements; 11 (f) transportation; 12 (g) a process to issue a temporary 13 capacity waiver to a facility for the purpose of transferring 14 equines in the custody of the board to a facility; and 15 (h) other requirements necessary to 16 ensure the humane care of equines. 17 D. The board may establish fines and penalties not 18 exceeding one thousand dollars (\$1,000) per violation for 19 violations of this section. 20 [D.] E. The board may charge the following fees: 21 (1)an initial inspection and registration fee 22 of not more than two hundred fifty dollars (\$250); 23 (2) an annual inspection and registration fee 24 of not more than one hundred dollars (\$100); and 25 reinspection fees of not more than one (3) .229262.6 - 6 -

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hundred dollars (\$100).

 $[E_{\bullet}]$  F. Fees collected pursuant to this section shall be deposited in the New Mexico livestock board general fund and may be used to carry out the provisions of this section and Section 77-2-31 NMSA 1978."

SECTION 3. A new section of Chapter 77, Article 2 NMSA 1978 is enacted to read:

"[NEW MATERIAL] FREE-ROAMING HORSE EXPERT--APPROVAL OF QUALIFICATIONS--RULES.--

10 An individual, a corporation or an organization Α. 11 that provides free-roaming horse or herd management services, 12 administers free-roaming horse fertility control or captures a 13 free-roaming horse for relocation in New Mexico shall be registered by the board; provided that this subsection shall not apply to the federal bureau of land management or the United States forest service acting in accordance with applicable federal law, regulations and policy.

> Β. The board shall:

(1)promulgate rules regarding the determination and approval of qualifications and registration of free-roaming horse experts;

register free-roaming horse experts that (2) meet the requirements of this section and the rules promulgated by the board; and

revoke the registration of a free-roaming (3) .229262.6

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1 horse expert that fails to comply with Section 77-18-5 NMSA 2 1978, or related rules, and apply other penalties that the 3 board deems appropriate. 4 The board may charge the following fees: C. an initial approval fee of not more than 5 (1)6 five hundred dollars (\$500); and 7 an annual registration fee of not more (2) than two hundred fifty dollars (\$250). 8 9 D. Fees collected pursuant to this section shall be 10 deposited in the New Mexico livestock board general fund and 11 may be used to carry out the provisions of this section." 12 SECTION 4. Section 77-18-5 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 2007, 13 Chapter 216, Section 1) is amended to read: 14 "77-18-5. [WILD HORSES--CONFORMATION, HISTORY AND 15 DEOXYRIBONUCLEIC ACID TESTING--SPANISH COLONIAL HORSES--BIRTH1 16 FREE-ROAMING HORSES--HUMANE MANAGEMENT--FERTILITY CONTROL--17 PROHIBITIONS .--18 [A. As used in this section: 19 (1) "public land" does not include federal 20 land controlled by the bureau of land management, the forest 21 service or state trust land controlled by the state land 22 office; 23 (2) "range" means the amount of land necessary 24 to sustain a herd of wild horses, which does not exceed its 25 known territorial limits; .229262.6 - 8 -

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1	<del>(3) "Spanish colonial horse" means a wild</del>
2	horse that is descended from horses of the Spanish colonial
3	<del>period; and</del>
4	(4) "wild horse" means an unclaimed horse on
5	public land that is not an estray.
6	B. A wild horse that is captured on public land
7	shall have its conformation, history and deoxyribonucleic acid
8	tested to determine if it is a Spanish colonial horse. If it
9	is a Spanish colonial horse, the wild horse shall be relocated
10	to a state or private wild horse preserve created and
11	maintained for the purpose of protecting Spanish colonial
12	horses. If it is not a Spanish colonial horse, it shall be
13	returned to the public land, relocated to a public or private
14	wild horse preserve or put up for adoption by the agency on
15	whose land the wild horse was captured.
16	C. If the mammal division of the museum of
17	southwestern biology at the university of New Mexico determines
18	that a wild horse herd exceeds the number of horses that is
19	necessary for preserving the genetic stock of the herd and for
20	preserving and maintaining the range, it may cause control of
21	the wild horse population through the use of birth control and
22	may cause excess horses to be:
23	(1) humanely captured and relocated to other
24	public land or to a public or private wild horse preserve;
25	(2) adopted by a qualified person for private
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1 maintenance; or 2 (3) euthanized; provided that this option 3 applies only to wild horses that are determined by a 4 veterinarian to be crippled or otherwise unhealthy.] 5 A. A state, county or municipal government or governmental subdivision may enter into an agreement with a 6 7 registered free-roaming horse expert to conduct free-roaming 8 horse surveys and management and determine land carrying 9 capacity. If a qualified free-roaming horse expert determines 10 as part of such an agreement that the free-roaming horse or 11 herd exceeds the carrying capacity of the land inhabited, as 12 determined using the best available science, the expert, and 13 that expert's employees, contractors and volunteers, may cause 14 control of a free-roaming horse or herd upon the approval of 15 the appropriate landowner through: 16 (1) the use of fertility control via 17 immunocontraception or castration; 18 (2) humane capture and relocation to an equine 19 rescue or retirement facility, with permission of the facility, 20 having the capacity to accept free-roaming horses that is 21 registered with the board pursuant to Section 77-2-30 NMSA 1978 22 or an equivalent out-of-state facility that meets the board's 23 facility standards for lifelong sanctuary care or for the 24 purposes of adoption of the free-roaming horse or horses; 25 (3) humane capture and relocation to land,

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1	with the permission of the landowner, that has the capacity to
2	sustain free-roaming horse herds or family bands; or
3	(4) for a horse determined by a veterinarian
4	licensed to practice in New Mexico to suffer from a medical
5	condition that significantly impacts the horse's quality of
6	life and cannot be reasonably treated, humane euthanasia.
7	B. A free-roaming horse captured pursuant to this
8	section and relocated to an equine rescue or retirement
9	facility shall be microchipped or freeze branded for individual
10	and ownership identification purposes.
11	C. Nothing in this section shall authorize a
12	qualified free-roaming horse expert to engage in herd
13	management activities on federal or tribal land.
14	D. Nothing in this section shall affect the federal
15	bureau of land management's or the United States forest
16	service's authority to manage free-roaming horses that are not
17	subject to the federal Wild Free-Roaming Horses and Burros Act
18	and found on lands administered by the federal bureau of land
19	management or the United States forest service, including the
20	federal bureau of land management's or the United States forest
21	service's authority to gather, remove and sell free-roaming
22	horses in accordance with applicable law, regulations and
23	policy.
24	E. A person shall not slaughter, allow to be
25	slaughtered, export for slaughter or release from a facility or

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1	adoptive home into the wild a free-roaming horse. A person who
2	violates this subsection is guilty of a misdemeanor and upon
3	conviction shall be sentenced in accordance with the provisions
4	of Section 31-19-1 NMSA 1978. Each free-roaming horse that a
5	person slaughters, allows to be slaughtered, exports for
6	slaughter or releases constitutes a separate offense.
7	F. As used in this section:
8	(1) "adoption" means the taking of custody and
9	ownership of a free-roaming horse by a qualified individual who
10	has demonstrated to the equine rescue or retirement facility in
11	possession of that horse the capacity and intent to provide
12	humane treatment and care of the animal, including proper
13	feeding, sheltering, husbandry, handling and care;
14	(2) "carrying capacity" means the number of
15	free-roaming horses that a given amount of land can support
16	long-term while maintaining or improving healthy vegetation,
17	soil, water and free-roaming horse herds inhabiting that land,
18	taking into account human uses and wildlife populations;
19	(3) "free-roaming horse" means an unclaimed
20	horse found at large that is not an estray due to lack of
21	evidence of private ownership or domestication and does not
22	include horses subject to the jurisdiction of the federal
23	government pursuant to the federal Wild Free-Roaming Horses and
24	<u>Burros Act;</u>
25	(4) "humane capture" means to gather or move

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	1	free-roaming horses to a holding location using baited corrals
	2	or other low-stress methods whenever feasible, but does not
	3	include use of aircraft or motorized vehicles;
	4	(5) "humane euthanasia" means to produce a
	5	humane death of an animal by standards deemed acceptable by the
	6	board of veterinary medicine as set forth in the board's rules;
	7	and
	8	(6) "qualified free-roaming horse expert"
	9	means an individual who has been approved by the board."
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
