AN ACT

RELATING TO FAMILIES; CREATING THE QUALITY FOSTER PARENT RECRUITMENT AND RETENTION TASK FORCE; REQUIRING A FINAL REPORT.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

SECTION 1. TEMPORARY PROVISION--QUALITY FOSTER PARENT
RECRUITMENT AND RETENTION TASK FORCE--CREATED--DUTIES--FINAL
REPORT.--

- A. The "quality foster parent recruitment and retention task force" is created. The task force shall be convened and administered by the children, youth and families department. The task force consists of the following sixteen members:

- B. The task force shall be appointed by August 1, 2025 and complete its work by July 1, 2026.
- C. The task force shall collaborate with an institution of higher education to perform research that supports the task force.
- D. The task force shall conduct a bold experiment relating to the quality of foster parent recruitment and retention to fix the broken system and get the children out of offices.
- E. The task force shall study proven examples of successful models that work in other large rural states, including Utah Senate Bill 163 from 1998.

G. The task force shall submit its final report to the interim legislative health and human services committee, the interim legislative finance committee and the governor by July 1, 2026.

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
