SUMMARY

Synopsis of Senate Bill 446

Senate Bill 446 (SB446) appropriates \$200 thousand in FY26 to the University of New Mexico (UNM) for the Political Science Department to conduct research on the demographics of individuals who speak at zoning and planning hearings or meetings and city council hearings or meetings on the topics of housing and construction. This will entail data collection and analysis culminating in a report to be submitted to a legislative committee by June 30, 2026. Data collected will include information about age, sex, race, homeownership status, place of birth, and participation of membership in a neighborhood or homeowner association.

This bill does not contain an effective date and, as a result, would go into effect 90 days after the Legislature adjourns if enacted, or June 20, 2025.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

The appropriation of \$200 thousand contained in this bill is a nonrecurring expense to the general fund. Any unexpended or unencumbered balance remaining at the end of FY26 shall revert to the general fund.
