A MEMORIAL

RECOGNIZING THE DEDICATION OF STATE, COUNTY, MUNICIPAL AND PRIVATE RECORDS MANAGERS AND CLERKS AND INFORMATION SYSTEMS PROFESSIONALS WHO PRESERVE AND DISSEMINATE IMPORTANT INFORMATION.

WHEREAS, record-keeping has long been considered of great importance in New Mexico, dating back to 1540 when the military scribes of Francisco Vasquez de Coronado recorded the exploration of the vast frontier; and

WHEREAS, when Don Juan de Onate set out to settle New Mexico in 1598, he chose to bring forty-one reams of paper with him in lieu of carrying more critical supplies; and

WHEREAS, the New Mexico state records center and archives has in its repository a document prepared in 1621 that is the

oldest surviving document prepared in the continental United States: and

WHEREAS, Secretary of State Stephanie Gonzales first recognized the importance and dedication of public employees and elected officials by declaring April 5, 1995 as the first records and information management professionals day in New Mexico: and

WHEREAS, the secretary of state's office is the official repository of records vital to government, commerce and industry in the state of New Mexico, and continues to be the premier records-keeping agency in New Mexico by its work in establishing standards for electronic signature authentication; and

WHEREAS, Governor Gary Johnson has recognized the importance of establishing April 2, 1996 as the second annual records and information management day in New Mexico through his open door at four program; and

WHEREAS, the association of records managers and administrators international represents nearly 11,000 records managers and information specialists throughout the world, with the purpose of promoting professionalism and education in records and information management, and the association provides a forum for the exchange of information and the establishment of standards within information management and electronic recordkeeping practices; and

WHEREAS, the management and control and quality assurance

of information is increasingly critical to every industry, business and government agency, and the systematic creation, distribution, storage and retrieval of records are of vital importance to the continued and efficient operation of all organizations; and

WHEREAS, many public employees, public officers and elected

WHEREAS, many public employees, public officers and elected officials at the state, county and municipal levels have worked long hours to assure the integrity, reliability, protection and preservation of vital public records under their custody; and

WHEREAS, encouraging this type of education and public recognition promotes: productivity and profits, organizational efficiency, consumer and public awareness, the reduction of costs and budgets, decreases in public fraud and abuse, the elimination of duplicative procedures and regulations, the streamlining of processes, the simplification of paperwork, the recycling and reduced consumption of paper, the planning of operational change and systems analysis, the tracking and dissemination of information on criminal acts and activities, the protection of employee rights, the decrease of ethics violations, the reduction and avoidance of an employer's legal liabilities and preserves records for historical research and future generations of New Mexicans;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE OF THE STATE

OF NEW MEXICO that the legislative council service reserve the

capitol rotunda on April 2, 1996 at noon for the celebration and

proclamation of records and information management day in New Mexico; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that each municipality and county and their respective executive, legislative and judicial branches be encouraged to recognize their public employees, public officers and elected officials who are interested in improving the quality management of their records and information systems in their home communities; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that copies of this memorial be transmitted to the co-chairmen of the New Mexico legislative council.
