20	SECTION 1. Section 32A-2-25 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 1993,		
21	Chapter 77, Section 54, as amended) is amended to read:

24	A. A child on [parole from an agency that has legal		
25	custody] <u>supervised release</u> who violates a term of [parole]

1 supervised release may be proceeded against in a [parole 2 revocation] supervised release proceeding conducted by the department [or the supervising agency] or by a hearing officer 3 contracted by the department [who is neutral to the child and 4 the agency] in accordance with procedures established by the 5 department in cooperation with the juvenile [parole] public 6 7 safety advisory board and any other person designated by the department. If a child willfully absconds from supervised 8 release, the children's court attorney from the district where 9 the child was initially committed may file a petition pursuant 10 to Subsection E of this section. 11

<u>B.</u> A juvenile probation [and parole] officer may detain a child on [parole status] supervised release who is alleged to have violated a term or condition of [parole] supervised release until the completion and review of a preliminary [parole] supervised release revocation hearing. A child may waive the right to a preliminary [parole] supervised release revocation hearing after consultation with the child's attorney, parent, guardian or custodian.

[B.] C. If a retake warrant is issued by the department upon the completion of the preliminary [parole] <u>supervised release</u> revocation hearing, <u>or if a child waived the</u> <u>right to a preliminary supervised release revocation hearing</u>, the juvenile [institution] facility to which the warrant is issued shall promptly transport the child to that [institution] .204976.2SA

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<u>facility</u> at the expense of the department. If a child absconds from [parole supervision] <u>supervised release</u> and is apprehended in another state after the issuance of a [retake] warrant by the [department] <u>district court</u>, the juvenile justice division of the department [shall] <u>may</u> cause the return of the child to this state at the expense of the department.

D. The issuance of a warrant upon an allegation
that the child has absconded from supervised release shall toll
the supervised release period. After a hearing upon return, if
the court finds that the child absconded from supervised
release, the time from the date of the violation to the date of
the child's arrest shall not be counted as time served on
supervised release.

E. The children's court attorney may file a 14 petition alleging that a child has willfully absconded from 15 supervised release. If the court finds that the child 16 willfully absconded from supervised release and that it is 17 necessary to safeguard the welfare of the child or the public's 18 19 safety, the court may extend the child's commitment not to 20 exceed six months on a short-term commitment, not to exceed one year on a long-term commitment or until the child reaches the 21 age of twenty-one. The petition shall be filed in the district 22 where the child was initially committed. Extension of the 23 child's commitment under this subsection shall follow the 24 procedures to extend a child's commitment provided in Section 25 .204976.2SA

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
