## ALASKA

**KEY FACTS** 

Cigarette smoking is responsible for more than 480,000 deaths per year in the United States, including nearly 42,000 deaths resulting from secondhand smoke exposure. Tobacco prevention and control activities are a public health "best buy."

#### STATE TOBACCO CONTROL POLICIES (AS OF MARCH 31, 2016)

#### SMOKEFREE INDOOR AIR

There is no risk-free level of secondhand smoke exposure; even brief exposure can be harmful to health. Smokefree laws can reduce the risk for heart disease and lung cancer among nonsmokers.

• Alaska currently has no comprehensive smoke-free policy prohibiting smoking in bars, restaurants, and private worksites.

#### PRICE

Increasing the price of tobacco products is the single most effective way to prevent initiation among nonsmokers and to reduce consumption.

• The current excise tax on packs of cigarettes in Alaska is \$2.00. The 2014 Surgeon General's Report recommends that states increase the price of cigarettes to at least \$10 per pack.

#### CESSATION COVERAGE

Nearly 7 out of every 10 (68.8%) of all current U.S. adult cigarette smokers say that they want to quit completely.

• Alaska currently has no comprehensive Medicaid coverage of cessation treatments, including fee-for-service plans.

#### E-CIGARETTES

Three million middle and high school students were current users of e-cigarettes in 2015. E-cigarettes are now the most commonly used tobacco product among youth, and use continues to climb.

- Alaska currently prohibits the sales of e-cigarettes to minors under the age of 19.
- Currently, Alaska does not require licenses for over-the-counter sales of e-cigarettes.
- Alaska does not prohibit the use of e-cigarettes in indoor areas of private worksites, restaurants, and bars.

#### HOW CDC'S TIPS CAMPAIGN IMPACTS ALASKA

Mass-reach health communication interventions, such as CDC's Tips from Former Smokers campaign, can prevent initiation and promote cessation.

• Incoming calls to the Alaska state quitline increased by an average 13.7% during the 2015 *Tips from Former Smokers Campaign (Mar – Aug, 2015).* Overall, the campaign generated an additional 145,000 calls to quitlines.
