What is a Charter School in NM?

- CHARTER SCHOOLS ARE ALWAYS PUBLIC SCHOOLS!
- Charter schools are FREE to attend. No tuition!
- Charter schools have an open enrollment system. They cannot select their students.
 - Enrollment lottery exists so students have an equal chance of filling available seats.
- Charter schools are funded the same ways as district schools but with less funding overall.
 - Only 98% funding, and limited access to certain funds.
- In New Mexico, for-profit charter schools are banned in law.
- In NM, charter schools are led by local educators that saw a need for something different in their communities



More Public Charter School Facts

- Charter schools have been part of New Mexico's public school system since 2001.
- Currently, there are 99 charter schools in the state.
- Over 30,000 students attend charter schools in NM
- Families rushed to charter schools during the pandemic.
 - Charter schools' enrollment increased 6.7%, while district schools' enrollment decreased 4.9%
- Albuquerque metro has the largest number of charter school students at about 18,500.

Independent

Charter schools make decisions at the school level.

- Charter schools are their own independent, public school.
 - They have their own governing board, budget, educational program, organization and systems
 - Charter school Governing Councils have public meetings that must be announced and publicly posted (subject to Open Meetings Act).
- Charters have the flexibility to be responsive to student needs much faster than traditional schools



Community-Based

Charter schools in New Mexico are born out of our communities.

- A unique public sector experiment: Any community, any group can come together to apply to start a charter school that meets their community need.
 - It starts with an idea of how to make schools best meet the needs of their kids
 - Teachers, parents and community leaders have established charter schools across New Mexico
- The education model you want, in a public school that is open to all.
- The process is rigorous and long.
 - It takes about 2 years from the idea of a school to opening a school.



Mission-Driven

A charter school's mission communicates the school's focus.

- Every charter school has a mission that serves as its north star
- Guides school leadership and staff
- Charter Schools can do things differently because the law allows them to:
 - Design or adopt their own curriculum
 - Plan their school calendar to meet needs of families
 - Manage and hire staff around their program
 - Charter schools must still adhere to school personnel act



Accountable

Charter schools are under a public contract.

- Must follow state and federal laws
- Charter schools are held responsible by an elected body (Authorizer)
 - Contract includes goals and parameters the school must meet
 - Enrollment limits
 - Regularly scheduled on-campus performance reviews
 - Intervention / Corrective action plan / Closure
 - Additional campuses and enrollment increases





Independent + Mission + Community = Innovation

- Independent, mission-driven schools have blazed a trail for what is possible in New Mexico schools
- Community-based charter schools offered the first comprehensive programming for:
 - Arts
 - College & Career Prep (Dual Credit)
 - Project-based learning
 - STEM
 - Blended learning
 - Extended school days
 - Virtual learning
 - International Baccalaureate
 - New Mexican Culture
 - Bi-Lingual schools
 - Montessori
 - Social Emotional Learning



Increasingly, being a charter school means being a quality school in New Mexico. Our performance with students across the board has rebounded substantially since the pandemic, with gains that outmatch our traditional district schools. This is particularly true for low-income students and key subgroups in the Yazzie Martinez Lawsuit.






Reading Charter Schools

■ Reading Traditional District




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Reading Results by Public School Type, SY19-23, Low-Income Students





Annually, we work with our partners to poll New Mexicans on their attitudes toward charter schools. We consistently hear from national education organizations that these are some of the highest statewide polling numbers in the country. The survey was completed by Research and Polling in September 2024, with a sample size of 506 New Mexicans.

Public Education in our State





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
Support or Oppose New Mexico Continuing to Develop and Open More Public charter Schools in the State
