#### **NM Food Security Grant Program Overview**

The purpose of this grant is to ensure that individuals and families throughout New Mexico have access to food, with a special focus on multi-sector collaborations that increase food security for all residents.



105 grant applications which totaled \$22,594,617.86 in requested grants.




#### **Eligible Funding Categories**

- Facility adaptations and renovations to increase capacity.
- Kitchen equipment for use in preparing, processing, cooking, and serving food.

#### **Eligible Programs**


- Child nutrition programs, senior programs, non-profit food banks and food pantries, non-profit food hubs and grower cooperatives.



# Regional Recreation Centers/Quality of Life Grant

The purpose of this grant is to improve the quality of life for New Mexico residents by creating new or expanding existing regional recreational facilities. These recreational facilities are defined as any project that will contribute to the quality of life for regional residents. Some examples of these recreational facilities could be a community center, skatepark, rodeo grounds, picnic shelters, or structures that enhance public based recreational activities.



147 applicants (128 from rural areas) which totaled \$244M in requested grants with \$27.5M available for disbursement this year.



\$45M available over 2 years





#### **Regional Recreation Centers/Quality of Life Grant**

#### **Eligible Applicants: NM Local Government Entities**

- Municipalities
- Counties
- Tribal Governments
- Special Districts (Acequias & Land Grants)

#### **Eligibility Requirements**

- Economic Impact: Project must show demonstrable benefit to a local community with limited access to recreational activities, either by attracting and retaining residents or attracting visitors.
- Recreation Access: The project must be open for public use. Note:
   Projects on tribal lands are eligible and do not have to be open to the general public but should be open to tribal members.





#### **Law Enforcement Protection Fund**

The purpose of this grant is to to provide equitable distribution of money to municipal police, university police, tribal police and county sheriff departments to enhance the efficiency and effectiveness of law enforcement services and to sustain at a reasonable level the payments available from the Peace Officer Survivors' Fund to surviving eligible family members of a peace officer killed in the line of duty.

### **NM Capacity Building Grant**

The purpose of this grant is for local governments to hire or contract with grant specialists to conduct grant writing, grant management, and project management. It is a capacity-building initiative with \$1.5 million in grant management state funding. In addition, there is \$1 million available to match federal funds.



Applications for the grant opened on Friday, September 9th, 2022, at 8:00 AM, and the deadline to apply is Friday, September 23, 2022, at 5:00 p.m. Funds will be distributed on a direct distribution basis and must be used by June 30, 2023.



## Housing Services

#### **NM Home Fund: ERAP + HAF**

The Home Fund provides a single access point (NMHomeFund.org) for several emergency housing programs, including rental assistance, utility assistance, temporary housing assistance, relocation assistance, eviction prevention support, and now homeowner assistance.

Assistance is available until September 2025 or until program funds are exhausted, whichever comes first.

#### Eviction


#### **Eviction Prevention & Diversion Program & NM Legal Aid**

DFA is in a partnership with the NM Courts through the Eviction Prevention and Diversion Program to help individuals currently in the legal eviction process. This program continues to be successful as their team helps New Mexicans avoid eviction and apply for ERAP funds. DFA also has a partnership with NM Legal Aid to provide legal assistance for renters should they need it. The initial funding for this program is through ERAP.

## Housing Services

#### **Homeowner Assistance**

The Mortgage Finance Authority administers Homeowner Assistance in collaboration with DFA. This assistance helps homeowners avoid foreclosure due to financial hardship during the pandemic. Eligible homeowners can receive assistance for past due mortgage payments, property taxes, home insurance, and other associated housing expenses.
