

The State Land Office is comprised of 175 employees in its Santa Fe office and 11 District Offices (Albuquerque, Carlsbad, Clovis, Farmington, Hobbs, Las Cruces, Logan, Moriarty, Roswell, Silver City, Socorro) who are responsible for administering 9 million surface acres and 13 million acres of mineral estate on behalf of trust beneficiaries.




NMSLO EARNINGS BY YEAR

Up 90% Over Last 5 Years; Last Three Years Have Each Exceeded \$1 Billion






New Mexico State Land Office Revenue Flow





REQUEST OVERVIEW


- Operations funded by agency revenue (NOT General Funds)
- > \$20,673,200 base budget request reflects a 5% (\$984,600) increase over FY22 Operational. Including:
 - ➤ \$314,700 (S&B) for three new remediation & reclamation positions and to fill existing FTEs (4% budgeted vacancy rate)
 - > \$158,600 to restore Contractual Services to FY21 funding level
 - ➤ \$511,300 (Other) to address deferred needs that are now necessary to avoid significant impact to agency operations (replace high-mileage vehicles, IT servers/equipment, travel for site inspections, professional development for specialized staff, etc.)



VACANCY RATE









FY21 ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- ➤ Highest earnings on record (\$1.25 billion)
- > Executed seven additional renewable energy leases
- ➤ Partnered with the City of Las Cruces on solar array project; Bernalillo County on recreational complex; Audubon on Melrose Woods project
- ➤ Major economic development projects (Netflix, Prewitt Business Park, etc.)
- > Created standalone Cultural Resources Office
- > Launched Accountability and Enforcement Program / enhanced royalty auditing
- Issued new fresh water policy
- Successfully completed conversion from antiquated, 1990s, mainframe ONGARD system
- ➤ Helped enact strong methane rule
- Advocated for bonding report (first study of its kind on trust lands)
- Signed 4 year Game and Fish Easement
- > Increased dispersed camping opportunities
- > Completed 40 land maintenance projects in 16 counties








Oil (WTI) Exceed \$80 BBLS for the First Time in 7 Years





Natural Gas (Henry Hub) Exceed \$6 MMBtu for First Time in 11 Years

Gas royalty Returns Greater Percentage of Revenue







- > \$24 million in estimated lease payments (in addition to jobs, generated tax revenue)

- > 92 affordable housing units for seniors





- Mitigation payments






PROTECTING THE TRUST

<u>Accountability & Enforcement Program</u>: Ensure lessees honor their contractual obligations to operate and close out activities responsibly; reduce legacy financial liability for the trust



Wells Plugged: 32



Leases Reclaimed: 14, returning over 8,000 acres



Lawsuits Filed: 18 (4 fully resolved, 2 close to resolution)





CULTURAL RESOURCES

- Established Cultural Resources Office
- ➤ Proposed Cultural Properties Rule archeological survey required before surface disturbing activities can occur
- > Timeline:
 - Pre-publication input & consultation with internal and external stakeholders
 - Draft rule published in NM Register August 10, 2021
 - Public hearing held October 21, 2021
 - Comment period extended until December 6, 2021
