

### **Employment for Veterinarians**


Employment of veterinarians, by state, May 2020



## Debt reduction is important to recruit DVMs back to NM



Blank areas indicate data not available.

- Average student loan debt for veterinarians is \$183,302
- 83% of vet students took out loans to pay for cost of veterinary school
- A veterinarian who owed \$183,302 would have monthly payments of more than \$2,058 on a standard, 10-year repayment term, assuming a 6.25% interest rate. The total amount repaid would be \$246,974
- Take home pay = \$5,390

- Overall goal: provide opportunity for NM residents to attend vet school with an emphasis on mixed animal practice and service to semi-rural and rural communities
- Enhances recruiting, enrollment, and completion rates at NMSU and other NM universities
- TTUVM has agreed to offer seats reserved for non-Texas residents to New Mexico residents only
- New Mexico lacks population density to fully support a school of veterinary medicine.

# Goals for legislative funding to support veterinary students from New Mexico

- NM Legislature has supported this partnership with funding during 2020 and 2021 sessions
- Funding will be used to:
  - Develop an undergraduate visitation program for promising students to visit TTUVM
  - Support for housing and living costs for NM residents during the 4<sup>th</sup> year field rotation
  - \$1,000 scholarship to qualify students for in-state tuition at TTUVM
  - Hire a 0.50 FTE program coordinator to aid in recruiting of potential students, work with participating NM clinics, develop scholarship opportunities for NM students, work with legislature to continue support
