Section 22-24-4 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 1975, 22 Chapter 235, Section 4, as amended) is amended to read: 23 "22-24-4. PUBLIC SCHOOL CAPITAL OUTLAY FUND CREATED--24 USE.--25 .223539.2

<u>underscored material = new</u> [bracketed material] = delete A. The "public school capital outlay fund" is created. Balances remaining in the fund at the end of each fiscal year shall not revert.

B. Except as provided in Subsections G and I through $[Q] \ Q$ of this section, money in the fund may be used only for capital expenditures deemed necessary by the council for an adequate educational program.

The council may authorize the purchase by the C. authority of portable classrooms to be loaned to school districts to meet a temporary requirement. Payment for these purchases shall be made from the fund. Title to and custody of the portable classrooms shall rest in the authority. The council shall authorize the lending of the portable classrooms to school districts upon request and upon finding that sufficient need exists. Application for use or return of state-owned portable classroom buildings shall be submitted by school districts to the council. Expenses of maintenance of the portable classrooms while in the custody of the authority shall be paid from the fund; expenses of maintenance and insurance of the portable classrooms while in the custody of a school district shall be the responsibility of the school district. The council may authorize the permanent disposition of the portable classrooms by the authority with prior approval of the state board of finance.

D. Applications for assistance from the fund shall .223539.2 - 2 -

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be made by school districts to the council in accordance with requirements of the council. Except as provided in Subsection K of this section, the council shall require as a condition of application that a school district have a current five-year facilities plan that shall include a current preventive maintenance plan to which the school adheres for each public school in the school district.

8 E. The council shall review all requests for
9 assistance from the fund and shall allocate funds only for
10 those capital outlay projects that meet the criteria of the
11 Public School Capital Outlay Act.

F. Money in the fund shall be disbursed by warrant of the department of finance and administration on vouchers signed by the secretary of finance and administration following certification by the council that an application has been approved or an expenditure has been ordered by a court pursuant to Section 22-24-5.4 NMSA 1978. At the discretion of the council, money for a project shall be distributed as follows:

(1) up to ten percent of the portion of the project cost funded with distributions from the fund or five percent of the total project cost, whichever is greater, may be paid to the school district before work commences with the balance of the grant award made on a cost-reimbursement basis; or

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(2) the council may authorize payments

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directly to the contractor. 1

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G. Balances in the fund may be annually 3 appropriated for the core administrative functions of the authority pursuant to the Public School Capital Outlay Act, and, in addition, balances in the fund may be expended by the authority, upon approval of the council, for project management 7 expenses; provided that:

the total annual expenditures from the 8 (1)9 fund for the core administrative functions pursuant to this subsection shall not exceed five percent of the average annual 10 grant assistance authorized from the fund during the [three] 11 12 five previous fiscal years; and

any unexpended or unencumbered balance (2) remaining at the end of a fiscal year from the expenditures authorized in this subsection shall revert to the fund.

н. The fund may be expended by the council for building system repair, renovation or replacement initiatives with projects to be identified by the council pursuant to Section 22-24-4.6 NMSA 1978; provided that money allocated pursuant to this subsection shall be expended within three years of the allocation.

Τ. The fund may be expended annually by the council for grants to school districts for the purpose of making lease payments for facilities, including facilities leased by charter The grants shall be made upon application by the schools.

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1 school districts and pursuant to rules adopted by the council; 2 provided that an application on behalf of a charter school 3 shall be made by the school district, but, if the school district fails to make an application on behalf of a charter 4 school, the charter school may submit its own application. 5 The following criteria shall apply to the grants: 6 7 (1)the amount of a grant to a school district or charter school shall not exceed: 8 9 (a) the actual annual lease payments owed for leasing a facility; or 10 (b) seven hundred dollars (\$700) 11 12 multiplied by the MEM using the leased facilities; provided that in fiscal year 2009 and in each subsequent fiscal year, 13 14 this amount shall be adjusted by the percentage change between the penultimate calendar year and the immediately preceding 15 calendar year of the consumer price index for the United 16 States, all items, as published by the United States department 17 of labor; 18 19 (2) a grant received for the lease payments of 20 a charter school may be used by that charter school as a state match necessary to obtain federal grants pursuant to the 21 federal Every Student Succeeds Act; 22 at the end of each fiscal year, any (3) 23 unexpended or unencumbered balance of the grant shall revert to 24 25 the fund;

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1 no grant shall be made for lease payments (4) 2 due pursuant to a financing agreement under which the 3 facilities may be purchased for a price that is reduced according to the lease payments made unless: 4 (a) the agreement has been approved 5 pursuant to the provisions of the Public School Lease Purchase 6 7 Act; and 8 (b) the facilities are leased by a 9 charter school; if the lease payments are made pursuant to 10 (5) a financing agreement under which the facilities may be 11 12 purchased for a price that is reduced according to the lease payments made, neither a grant nor any provision of the Public 13 School Capital Outlay Act creates a legal obligation for the 14 school district or charter school to continue the lease from 15 year to year or to purchase the facilities nor does it create a 16 legal obligation for the state to make subsequent grants 17 pursuant to the provisions of this subsection; and 18 as used in this subsection: 19 (6) 20 (a) "MEM" means: 1) the average fulltime-equivalent enrollment using leased facilities on the 21 second and third reporting dates of the prior school year; or 22 2) in the case of an approved charter school that has not 23 commenced classroom instruction, the estimated full-time-24 equivalent enrollment that will use leased facilities in the 25 .223539.2 - 6 -

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first year of instruction, as shown in the approved charter school application; provided that, after the second reporting date of the current school year, the MEM shall be adjusted to reflect the full-time-equivalent enrollment on that date; and (b) "facilities" includes the space

needed for school activities.

J. In addition to other authorized expenditures from the fund, up to one percent of the average grant assistance authorized from the fund during the three previous fiscal years may be expended in each fiscal year by the authority to pay the state fire marshal, the construction industries division of the regulation and licensing department and local jurisdictions having authority from the state to permit and inspect projects for expenditures made to permit and inspect projects funded in whole or in part under the Public School Capital Outlay Act. The authority may enter into contracts with the state fire marshal, the construction industries division or the appropriate local authorities to carry out the provisions of this subsection. Such a contract may provide for initial estimated payments from the fund prior to the expenditures if the contract also provides for additional payments from the fund if the actual expenditures exceed the initial payments and for repayments back to the fund if the initial payments exceed the actual expenditures. Monev distributed from the fund to the state fire marshal or the

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construction industries division pursuant to this subsection
 shall be used to supplement, rather than supplant,
 appropriations to those entities.

K. Pursuant to guidelines established by the council, allocations from the fund may be made to assist school districts in developing and updating five-year facilities plans required by the Public School Capital Outlay Act; provided that:

(1) no allocation shall be made unless the council determines that the school district is willing and able to pay the portion of the total cost of developing or updating the plan that is not funded with the allocation from the fund. Except as provided in Paragraph (2) of this subsection, the portion of the total cost to be paid with the allocation from the fund shall be determined pursuant to the methodology in Subsection B of Section 22-24-5 NMSA 1978; or

(2) the allocation from the fund may be used to pay the total cost of developing or updating the plan if: (a) the school district has fewer than an average of six hundred full-time-equivalent students on the second and third reporting dates of the prior school year; or (b) the school district meets all of the following requirements: 1) the school district has fewer than an average of one thousand full-time-equivalent students on the second and third reporting dates of the prior school year; 2)

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1 the school district has at least seventy percent of its 2 students eligible for free or reduced-fee lunch; 3) the state share of the total cost, if calculated pursuant to the 3 methodology in Subsection B of Section 22-24-5 NMSA 1978, would 4 be less than fifty percent; and 4) for all educational 5 purposes, the school district has a residential property tax 6 7 rate of at least seven dollars (\$7.00) on each one thousand dollars (\$1,000) of taxable value, as measured by the sum of 8 9 all rates imposed by resolution of the local school board plus rates set to pay interest and principal on outstanding school 10 district general obligation bonds. 11

L. Upon application by a school district, allocations from the fund may be made by the council for the purpose of demolishing abandoned school district facilities; provided that:

(1) the costs of continuing to insure an abandoned facility outweigh any potential benefit when and if a new facility is needed by the school district;

(2) there is no practical use for the abandoned facility without the expenditure of substantial renovation costs; and

(3) the council may enter into an agreement with the school district to fully fund the demolition of the abandoned school district facility if Paragraphs (1) and (2) of this subsection are satisfied.

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1 М. Up to ten million dollars (\$10,000,000) of the 2 fund may be expended each year for an education technology infrastructure deficiency corrections initiative pursuant to 3 Section 22-24-4.5 NMSA 1978; provided that funding allocated 4 pursuant to this section shall be expended within three years 5 of its allocation. 6 7 [N. For each fiscal year from 2018 through 2022, twenty-five million dollars (\$25,000,000) of the fund is 8 9 reserved for appropriation by the legislature to the instructional material fund or to the transportation 10 distribution of the public school fund. The secretary shall 11 12 certify the need for the issuance of supplemental severance tax bonds to meet an appropriation from the public school capital 13 outlay fund to the instructional material fund or to the 14 transportation distribution of the public school fund. Any 15 portion of an amount of the public school capital outlay fund 16 that is reserved for appropriation by the legislature for a 17 fiscal year, but that is not appropriated before the first day 18 of that fiscal year, may be expended by the council as provided 19 20 in this section. 0. Up to ten million dollars (\$10,000,000) of the 21

fund may be expended in each of fiscal years 2019 through 2022 for school security system project grants made in accordance with Section 22-24-4.7 NMSA 1978.

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years 2020 through 2024 for a pre-kindergarten classroom facilities initiative project in accordance with Section 22-24-12 NMSA 1978.

The council may fund pre-kindergarten classrooms with a qualifying, awarded standards-based project; provided that pre-kindergarten classroom space shall not be 7 included in the project prioritization calculation adopted by the council pursuant to Section 22-24-5 NMSA 1978. The council 8 shall develop pre-kindergarten classroom standards to use when funding pre-kindergarten space." 10

The council may approve allocations from the 17 fund pursuant to Subsection M of Section 22-24-4 NMSA 1978 and 18 19 this section for projects in or affecting a school district 20 committing to pay its share of the project costs. C. After consulting with the public school capital 5 outlay oversight task force and other experts, the council 6 7 shall regularly review and update statewide adequacy standards applicable to all school districts. The standards shall 8 9 establish the acceptable level for the physical condition and capacity of buildings, the educational suitability of 10 facilities, the need for career-technical education facilities 11 12 or classrooms and the need for education technology infrastructure. E. In order to encourage private capital investment in the construction of public school facilities, the purchase

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of a privately owned school facility that is, at the time of application, in use by a school district may be considered a public school capital outlay project and eligible for grant assistance pursuant to this section if the council finds that:

(1) at the time of the initial use by the school district, the facility to be purchased equaled or exceeded the statewide adequacy standards and the building standards for public school facilities;

(2) at the time of application, attendance at the facility to be purchased is at seventy-five percent or greater of design capacity and the attendance at other schools in the school district that the students at the facility would otherwise attend is at eighty-five percent or greater of design capacity; and

(3) the school district and the capital outlay project meet all of the requirements for grant assistance pursuant to the Public School Capital Outlay Act; provided that, when determining the deviation from the statewide adequacy standards for the purposes of evaluating and prioritizing the project, the students using the facility shall be deemed to be attending other schools in the school district.

F. It is the intent of the legislature that grant assistance made pursuant to this section allows every school district to meet the standards developed pursuant to Subsection C of this section; provided, however, that nothing in the

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Public School Capital Outlay Act or the development of 2 standards pursuant to that act prohibits a school district from using other funds available to the district to exceed the 3 statewide adequacy standards.

G. Upon request, the council shall work with, and provide assistance and information to, the public school capital outlay oversight task force.

The council may establish committees or task н. forces, not necessarily consisting of council members, and may use the committees or task forces, as well as existing agencies or organizations, to conduct studies, conduct surveys, submit recommendations or otherwise contribute expertise from the public schools, programs, interest groups and segments of society most concerned with a particular aspect of the council's work.

I. Upon the recommendation of the authority, the council shall develop building standards for public school facilities and shall promulgate other such rules as are necessary to carry out the provisions of the Public School Capital Outlay Act.

No later than December 15 of each year, the J. council shall prepare a report summarizing its activities during the previous fiscal year. The report shall describe in detail all projects funded, the progress of projects previously funded but not completed, the criteria used to prioritize and

The amount to be distributed to each charter school shall be in the same proportion as the average full-time-equivalent enrollment of the charter school on the second and third reporting dates of the prior school year is to the total such enrollment in the school district; provided that, in determining the school district's total enrollment, charter school students located .223539.2

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within the school district shall be included; and provided further that no distribution shall be made to an approved charter school that had not commenced classroom instruction in the prior school year. Each year, the department shall certify to the school district the amount to be distributed to each charter school. Distributions received by a charter school pursuant to this subsection shall be expended pursuant to the provisions of the Public School Capital Improvements Act; except that if capital improvements for the charter school were not identified in a resolution approved by the electors, the charter school may expend the distribution for any capital improvements, including those specified in Subsection D of this section.

G. In making distributions pursuant to this section, the secretary shall include such reporting requirements and conditions as are required by rule of the public school capital outlay council. (1) school surveillance systems; 11 12 (2) fencing; secure vestibules; or 13 (3) 14 (4) other capital infrastructure directly related to student safety. 15 The public school facilities authority shall C. 16 make a distribution to each school district in fiscal year 2024 17 in a manner in which each school district receives the greater 18 of fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) or the percentage of the 19 20 total appropriation equal to the percentage attributable to that school district from the total distributions made to 21 school districts for fiscal year 2024 pursuant to the Public 22 School Capital Improvements Act. 23 A distribution provided to a school district D. 24 pursuant to the appropriation provided in this section shall 25

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1 not be subject to any local match or offset.

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SECTION 10. APPROPRIATION. --

A. Seventy-five million dollars (\$75,000,000) is appropriated from the public school capital outlay fund to the public school facilities authority in accordance with any procedures established by the public school capital outlay council for expenditure in fiscal years 2024 through 2027 to make a distribution to each school district in fiscal year 2024 to construct, renovate and equip career-technical educational facilities and pre-kindergarten facilities or to maintain and repair public school buildings. Any unexpended or unencumbered balance remaining at the end of fiscal year 2027 shall revert to the public school capital outlay fund.

B. The public school facilities authority shall make the distribution to each school district in a manner such that each school district receives the greater of one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000) or the percentage of the total appropriation equal to the percentage attributable to that school district from the total distributions made to school districts for fiscal year 2024 pursuant to the Public School Capital Improvements Act.

C. A distribution provided to a school district pursuant to the appropriation provided in this section shall not be subject to any local match or offset.
