

### DCA FACILITIES OVERVIEW

- 191 structures, 100 of which are on the State Cultural Properties and/or National Register of Historic Places; 1.3M square feet; over 1,000 acres
- DCA is responsible for the maintenance and improvements of those sites which includes:
- 8 State Museums (Alamogordo, Albuquerque, Las Cruces, Santa Fe)

8 Historic Sites (Alcalde, Bernalillo, Ft. Stanton, Ft. Sumner, Jemez, Lincoln, Mesilla, Radium Springs)




## FACILITIES FUNDING OVERVIEW

- In 2017, DCA facilities and collections were valued by Risk Management Division at \$1 billion.
- A recent analysis shows justification for over \$53 million of needs through FY28
- Historic structures are more expensive to maintain and renovate
- Basic repair and replacement (e.g. leaking roofing, HVAC repair, water systems leaks, etc.); long term investments (e.g. photovoltaic systems)
- Climate-controlled (humidity and temperature) facilities are necessary to preserve collections and exhibitions
- but do not raise private funds for building repairs and maintenance. Affiliated foundations contribute private funding for exhibits, educational programming, and special capital projects

# CULTURAL AFFAIRS FACILITIES INFRASTRUCTURE FUND (CAIF)

- Created and initially capitalized in the 2020 session by the passage of SB 103
- Dedicated to pay the costs of repairing, renovating, planning, engineering, equipping and furnishing department facilities and exhibits.
- Managed by DCA and has received three appropriations from the Public Project Revolving Loan Fund (PPRF) totaling \$15M
- During the 2021 legislative session, the NMFA Oversight Committee endorsed HB 70 (the PPRF Omnibus Bill), which included the second appropriation from the PPRF to the CAIF
- other agencies who also own their buildings and are not under the purview of the General Services Department. Without the CAIF, DCA has no recurring, stable source of funding for repair and maintenance of facilities, unlike








## BOSQUE REDONDO MEMORIAL AT FT. SUMNER HISTORIC SITE

## DINÉ CAPTIVES UNDER GUARD FORT SUMNER, NEW MEXICO, 1864 -1868.




## SIGNERS OF THE NAVAJO TREATY, 1868.





June 1968, 3,000 people participated in the 100th commemoration of the signing of the Navajo Treaty.



In August 1970, the Fort Summer State Monument visitor center, which included an 880-square-foot museum, opened to the public.



- In February 2016, an Interpretive Planning Committee was established to rethink the direction of interpretation at Bosque Redondo Memorial.
- On August 15, 2016, the first meeting was held at Bosque Redondo Memorial, kicking off a new partnership between the State of New Mexico, the Navajo Nation, the Mescalero Apache Tribe, and Historical Research Associates.
- Future meetings were held on Mescalero Apache Tribal lands and at Navajo Nation.
