superintendent of public instruction shall establish a preliminary unit value to establish on a program unit value determined by the superintendent of public instruction. The budgets for the 2000-2001 school year; and then upon verification of the number of units statewide for fiscal year 2001 but no later than January 31, the superintendent of public instruction may adjust the program unit value. The appropriation for the state equalization guarantee contains sufficient funds to provide a statewide average five percent salary increase for teachers and a statewide average two and one-half percent salary increase for other certified and non-certified staff, including transportation employees. Included in the state equalization guarantee is a nine million nine hundred fifty thousand seven hundred dollar (\$9,950,700) reduction in base program cost, an amount equal to eight thousand ninety units multiplied by one-half the unit value of one thousand two hundred thirty dollars (\$1,230).

12 The general fund appropriation in the state equalization guarantee distribution reflects 13 the deduction of federal revenues pursuant to Paragraph (2) of Subsection C of Section 22-8-25 14 NMSA 1978 that includes payments commonly known as "impact aid funds" pursuant to 20 USCA 7701 15 et seq., formerly known as "P.L. 874 funds".

16 The general fund appropriation to the public school fund shall be reduced by the amounts 17 transferred to the public school fund from the current school fund and from the federal Mineral 18 Lands Leasing Act (30 USCA 181, et seq.) receipts otherwise unappropriated.

Any unexpended or unencumbered balance in the distributions authorized remaining at the end of fiscal year 2001 from appropriations made from the general fund shall revert to the general fund.
