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19	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:
20	Section 1. SHORT TITLEThis act may be cited as the
21	"Office of Peace Act".
22	Section 2. PURPOSEThe purpose of the Office of Peace
23	Act is to establish an office dedicated to peacemaking and the
24	study of conditions that are conducive to peace.
25	Section 3. DEFINITIONSAs used in the Office of Peace

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1 Act: "chief" means the chief of peace; 2 A. "council" means the citizens peace advisory B. 3 council; and 4 C. "office" means the office of peace. 5 OFFICE ESTABLISHED. -- The "office of peace" is Section 4. 6 7 created. The office shall be administratively attached to the department of finance and administration. For purposes of this 8 section, the term "administratively attached" means the same as 9 10 specified in Section 9-1-7 NMSA 1978. Section 5. CHIEF OF PEACE- - APPOINTMENT. - -11 12 A. The administrative head of the office is the "chief of peace", who shall be appointed by the governor with 13 the consent of the senate. 14 **B**. The chief shall serve and have all the duties, 15 responsibilities and authority of that office during the period 16 of time prior to final action by the senate confirming or 17 rejecting the appointment. 18 Section 6. CHIEF--GENERAL DUTIES.--19 20 A. The chief is responsible to the governor for the operation of the office. It is the chief's duty to manage all 21 operations of the office and to administer and enforce the laws 22 with which the chief is charged. 23 **B**. The chief shall: 24 analyze existing policies and develop new (1) 25 . 149083. 1

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1 approaches for dealing with societal issues, including: 2 (a) spouse abuse, child abuse and mistreatment of the elderly; 3 4 drug and alcohol abuse; (b) (c) crime, punishment and 5 rehabilitation: 6 7 (d) violence against animals; (e) gun-related violence; 8 9 (f) school and gang violence; 10 (g) racial or ethnic violence and violence against gays and lesbians; and 11 12 (h) disputes between the police and community members; 13 make policy recommendations to the 14 (2)attorney general regarding civil rights and labor law; 15 assist in establishing community-based 16 (3) violence prevention programs, including violence prevention 17 counseling and peer mediation in schools; 18 provide for counseling for and advocate on 19 (4) behalf of women victimized by violence; 20 provide for public education programs and 21 (5) counseling strategies concerning hate crimes; and 22 (6) promote racial and ethnic tolerance. 23 CHIEF--HUMAN SECURITY DUTIES.--The chief shall Section 7. 24 address and offer nonviolent conflict resolution strategies on 25 . 149083. 1 - 3 -

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issues of human security if security is threatened, whether the
 conflict is:

A. based on geographic, religious, ethnic, racial
d or class concerns;

**B.** derived from economic concerns, including trade **6** or distribution of wealth; or

7 C. initiated through disputes concerning the8 scarcity of natural resources, food or trade.

Section 8. CHIEF--MEDIA DUTIES.--The chief shall:

10 A. seek assistance in the design and implementation
11 of nonviolent policies from media professionals;

B. study the role of the media in the escalation and recession of conflict and make findings public; and

C. make recommendations to professional media organizations to increase media awareness of peace-building initiatives.

Section 9. CHIEF--EDUCATIONAL DUTIES.--The chief shall:

A. develop a peace education curriculum, which shall include the study of:

(1) the civil rights movement in the United States and throughout the world with special emphasis on how individual involvement has contributed to advancements in peace and justice; and

(2) peace agreements and circumstances inwhich peaceful intervention has succeeded in stopping conflict;. 149083.1

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2 **B**. cooperate with the secretary of public education to develop curricula and make curricula available to school 3 districts to facilitate instruction in peaceful conflict 4 resolution and other peace education objectives at elementary 5 and secondary schools. 6 7 Section 10. PERSONNEL. -- The chief shall employ professional and clerical assistance as deemed necessary and 8 shall appoint a: 9 10 A. director of peace education and training; R director of peace activities; 11 12 С. director of technology for peace; director of peaceful coexistence and nonviolent D. 13 conflict resolution; and 14 **E**. general counsel. 15 COMMISSION OF PEACE EDUCATION AND TRAINING. --Section 11. 16 A. The "commission of peace education and training" 17 is created in the office, and the administrative head of the 18 commission is the "director of peace education and training". 19 20 **B**. The director of peace education and training shall: 21 (1) in collaboration with the chief, develop a 22 peace education curriculum and supporting materials for 23 distribution to the public education department; 24 provide peace education grants for the (2) 25 . 149083. 1 - 5 -

1 creation and expansion of peace studies programs; and 2 (3) create a community peace block grant program to provide grants to nonviolent conflict resolution 3 4 programs and local peace-building initiatives. Section 12. COMMISSION OF PEACE ACTIVITIES. --5 The "commission of peace activities" is created A. 6 in the office, and the administrative head of the commission is 7 the "director of peace activities". 8 The director of peace activities shall: 9 B. develop alternatives for the treatment of 10 (1) drug and alcohol abuse; 11 12 (2)initiate programs and build on existing programs to prevent crime, including community policing and 13 peaceful settlement programs for police and other public safety 14 officers; and 15 develop community-based strategies for 16 (3) celebrating diversity and promoting tolerance. 17 COMMISSION OF TECHNOLOGY FOR PEACE. --Section 13. 18 The "commission of technology for peace" is 19 Α. created in the office, and the administrative head of the 20 commission is the "director of technology for peace". 21 **B**. The director of technology for peace shall 22 provide grants for the research and development of technology 23 in transportation, communication and energy that: 24 are nonviolent in their application; and (1) 25 . 149083. 1 - 6 -

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1 (2) encourage the conservation of natural 2 resources to prevent future conflicts stemming from resource scarcity. 3 Section 14. COMMISSION OF PEACEFUL COEXISTENCE AND 4 NONVIOLENT CONFLICT RESOLUTION. --5 The "commission of peaceful coexistence and A. 6 nonviolent conflict resolution" is created in the office, and 7 the administrative head of the commission is the "director of 8 peaceful coexistence and nonviolent conflict resolution". 9 10 **B**. The director of peaceful coexistence and nonviolent conflict resolution shall: 11 12 (1) publish a monthly journal of the office's activities and encourage scholarly participation; 13 gather information on effective community 14 (2)peace-building activities and disseminate the information; 15 research the effect of violence in the 16 (3) media and make the reports annually available to the public; 17 and 18 hold conferences to create awareness of 19 (4) the office's findings. 20 CITIZENS PEACE ADVISORY COUNCIL--CREATION--Section 15. 21 MEMBERS- - RESPONSI BILITIES- - COMPENSATION. - -22 The "citizens peace advisory council" is created 23 A. and shall be composed of five ex-officio and eighteen appointed 24 members as follows: 25 . 149083. 1 - 7 -

23	use, who shall be appointed by the secretary of energy,

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1 radio or television station or a print publication, appointed 2 by the chief; and three public school educators, appointed 3 (13)4 by the secretary of public education. **B**. The council shall select a chairperson, a vice 5 chairperson and other officers as it deems necessary. 6 C. The council shall meet no less than twice 7 annually and may meet more frequently upon the call of the 8 The council shall: 9 chai rperson. 10 organize and participate in public (1) dialogues throughout the state; 11 12 (2)provide assistance and make recommendations to the chief and the governor concerning 13 policies relating to peace and nonviolent conflict resolution; 14 and 15 submit, annually, a report to the chief 16 (3) and the governor reviewing the impact of state peace activities 17 on local governments. 18 Council members shall receive per diem and 19 D. 20 mileage as provided for nonsalaried public officers in the Per Diem and Mileage Act and shall receive no other compensation, 21 perquisite or allowance. 22 Section 16. APPROPRIATION. -- Two hundred fifty thousand 23 dollars (\$250,000) is appropriated from the general fund to the 24 office of peace for expenditure in fiscal year 2005 to carry 25 . 149083. 1
