REQUESTI NG THE UNI TED STATES CONGRESS TO PASS S. 1028 AND H. R. 1734, THE FEDERAL MEN' S HEALTH ACT OF 2003, WH CH AMEND THE FEDERAL PUBLI C HEALTH SERVI CE ACT AND ESTABLI SH AN OFFI CE OF MEN' S HEALTH.

WHEREAS, male morbidity and mortality frompreventable causes is substantial, with significant and al arming di sparities among subpopul ations of men based on race, et hni city and soci oeconomic status; and

WHEREAS, life expectancy for mal es in New Mexi co is seventy-two and ei ght-tenths years of age compared to seventyseven and three-tenths years of age for women in the state and seventy-four and one-tenth years of age for males nationwi de; and

WHEREAS, a silent heal th crisis is affecting the heal th . 150350. 1
and well-bei ng of Ameri can men; and
WHEREAS, this health crisis is of particular concern to men but is al so a concern for women and families; and

WHEREAS, the national center for heal th statistics has shown that men have hi gher age- adj usted death rates than women for each of the ten leading causes of death in the United St at es; and

WHEREAS, the state center for heal th statistics has shown that men have hi gher death rates than women for seven of the ei ght I eading causes of death in New Mexi co; and

WHEREAS, men are al most twice as likel y as women to die from heart di sease, the inci dence of stroke is over ten percent hi gher in men than in women and men are fifty percent more I i kel y to die of cancer than women; and

WHEREAS, the life expectancy gap between men and women has steadily increased from one year in 1920 to five and one-hal f years in 2000; and

WHEREAS, st udi es show that the huge di sparity bet ween men and women is due in part to a lack of awareness, poor heal th education and the low number of male-specific health programs; and

WHEREAS, men are one-half as likel y as women to vi sit a doctor for regul ar physician checkups or to obtain preventive screening tests for serious di seases; and

WHEREAS, men's heal th is al so a concern for employers who . 150350. 1

I ose empl oyee productivity as well as pay the empl oyer's portion of heal th care cover age costs; and

WHEREAS, men's heal th is al so a concern for federal and state governments, the private sector and the general public, whi ch absorb the enor mous costs of premat ure death and di sability, including the costs of caring for survi ving dependents; and

WHEREAS, every state has formed a commi ssi on to address momen's issues or has established a women's heal th programbut onl y seven states have a commission to address men's issues or a men's heal th program and

WHEREAS, educating men, thei $r$ families and heal th care provi ders about the i mortance of early detection of nal e heal th problems can result in reducing rates of mortality of mal e-specific di seases as well as improving the heal th of America's men and, as a result, the nation's overall economic wel I - bei ng;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEG SLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXI CO that it support and encour age national, state and local efforts to secure access and remove barriers to heal th care for men and thei $r$ family menbers; and

BE IT FURTHER RESQLVED that the I egi sl at ure encour age the New Mexi co congressi onal del egation to support the passage of the Men's Health Act of 2003, currently under consideration as S. 1028 and H. R. 1734; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that copi es of this menorial be transmitted to the New Mexi co congressional del egation, the department of heal th, the human servi ces department, the children, youth and families department and the state agency on agi ng .

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
