9 "9-15C-3. INTERTRIBAL CEREMONIAL OFFICE CREATED--POWERS
10 AND DUTIES.--

A. The "intertribal ceremonial office" is created [and]. <u>The office is</u> administratively attached to the department.

B. The governor shall appoint a director, who shall serve at the pleasure of the governor. The director shall hire and terminate other necessary employees, who shall be subject to the provisions of the Personnel Act.

C. The director shall:

19 (1) work with the department to establish20 steady funding for the intertribal ceremonial;

(2) supervise the activities of the office;(3) work with the department to promote the intertribal ceremonial; and

(4) prepare an annual budget and an annual report on the activities of the office.

1	D. The office [in cooperation with the department]
2	shall:
3	(1) administer an annual intertribal

5	(2) cooperate with and assist public and

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officio, the secretary or the secretary's designated

2 representative and six members, appointed by the governor, who 3 shall serve terms of five years each; provided that the 4 governor's first appointments shall be made of two board 5 members for one-year terms, two for two-year terms, one for a 6 three-year term and one for a four-year term. All intertribal 7 ceremonial board members shall be bona fide residents of the 8 state, and at least a majority of the members shall be Native 9 American. A board member shall not be removed during the term 10 of office except for cause, following notice and an opportunity 11 for a hearing."

Section 4. Section 9-15C-4 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 2005, Chapter 219, Section 4) is amended to read:

"9-15C-4. FUND CREATED--ADMINISTRATION.--The "intertribal ceremonial fund" is created in the state treasury. [Money in the fund is appropriated to the intertribal ceremonial office. The fund shall consist of appropriations, gifts, grants, donations, bequests and devises.] Money appropriated to the fund or accruing to it through sales, gifts, grants, fees, penalties, bequests or any other source shall be delivered to the state treasurer and deposited in the fund. Money in the fund is appropriated to the office for the purpose of carrying out the intertribal ceremonial. Money in the fund at the end of any fiscal year shall not revert. Interest and earnings from the fund shall be credited to the fund. [The fund shall .161498.1

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be administered by the office, and] Disbursements from the fund shall be made on warrant drawn by the secretary of finance and administration pursuant to vouchers signed by the director or the director's authorized representative."

Section 5. APPROPRIATION.--Two hundred ninety-five thousand dollars (\$295,000) is appropriated from the general fund to the intertribal ceremonial fund for expenditure in fiscal year 2006 and subsequent fiscal years to pay the salaries of the director of the intertribal ceremonial office and the director's assistant, to pay per diem and mileage for intertribal ceremonial board members and to carry out the purposes of the Intertribal Ceremonial Act. Any unexpended or unencumbered balance remaining at the end of a fiscal year shall not revert to the general fund.

Section 6. EMERGENCY.--It is necessary for the public peace, health and safety that this act take effect immediately.

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
