- Audiology and speech-language pathology services help empower individuals.
- Audiologists and speech-language pathologists work to eliminate the isolating effects of communication disorders.

OTHER SUBSTANTIVE ISSUES

HM51 states that one in ten New Mexican families are affected by a hearing, speech or language impairment that, if untreated, can present significant obstacles to academic achievement, social adjustment and career advancement.

According to DOH, hearing, speech and language impairments are fairly common disorders that are amenable to intervention by professional audiologists and speech-language pathologists.

According DOH, there is currently a shortage in our state of these professionals compared to demand for these services, especially in rural areas. Stating appreciation, may contribute to keeping these professionals working within our state.
