### **SUMMARY**

Synopsis of Bill

Senate Bill 187 appropriates \$100.0 from the general fund to the Local Government Division of the Department of Finance and Administration for the purpose of coordinating with an existing youth service program serving Valencia County for a program to provide educational outreach for, and to aid in, the prevention of teenage pregnancy.

### FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

The appropriation of \$100.0 contained in this bill is a recurring expense to the general fund. Any unexpended or unencumbered balance remaining at the end of fiscal year 2010 shall revert to the general fund.

According to the December 2008 revenue estimate, FY10 recurring revenue will only support a base expenditure level that is \$293 million, or 2.6 percent, less than the FY09 appropriation. All appropriations outside of the general appropriation act will be viewed in this declining revenue context.

## SIGNIFICANT ISSUES

CYFD stated a report published in January 2009 by the National Campaign to Prevent Teen and Unplanned Pregnancy ranked New Mexico's teen birth rates the 2<sup>nd</sup> highest in the nation. In New Mexico, most young teen births are registered with no father declared. In 2004, 84.5 percent of births to teens ages 15-19 were to single mothers. CYFD reported some studies have demonstrated that teen pregnancy prevention efforts that target males can be effective in reducing teen birth rates, increasing youth father's involvement and support of their children, and reducing repeat pregnancies. CYFD currently administers statewide contracts for teen pregnancy prevention and teen fatherhood programs.
