14	RECONCILING MULTIPLE AMENDMENTS TO THE SAME SECTION OF LAW IN

17	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:
18	SECTION 1. Section 22-13-1.1 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 1986,
19	Chapter 33, Section 5, as amended by Laws 2010, Chapter 25,
20	Section 1 and by Laws 2010, Chapter 110, Section 1) is amended
21	to read:
22	"22-13-1.1. GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS
23	A. At the end of grades eight through eleven, each
24	student shall prepare an interim next-step plan that sets forth
25	the coursework for the grades remaining until high school
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graduation. Each year's plan shall explain any differences from previous interim next-step plans, shall be filed with the principal of the student's high school and shall be signed by the student, the student's parent and the student's guidance counselor or other school official charged with coursework planning for the student.

B. Each student must complete a final next-step plan during the senior year and prior to graduation. The plan shall be filed with the principal of the student's high school and shall be signed by the student, the student's parent and the student's guidance counselor or other school official charged with coursework planning for the student.

C. An individualized education program that meets the requirements of Subsections A and B of this section and that meets all applicable transition and procedural requirements of the federal Individuals with Disabilities Education Act for a student with a disability shall satisfy the next-step plan requirements of this section for that student.

D. A local school board shall ensure that each high school student has the opportunity to develop a next-step plan based on reports of college and workplace readiness assessments, as available, and other factors and is reasonably informed about:

(1) curricular and course options, including honors or advanced placement courses, dual-credit courses,

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1 distance learning courses, career clusters, pre-apprenticeship 2 programs or remediation programs that the college and workplace 3 readiness assessments indicate to be appropriate; 4 (2) opportunities available that lead to 5 different post-high-school options; and alternative opportunities available if the 6 (3) 7 student does not finish a planned curriculum. 8 Ε. The secretary shall: establish specific accountability 9 (1)standards for administrators, counselors, teachers and school 10 district staff to ensure that every student has the opportunity 11 12 to develop a next-step plan; (2) promulgate rules for accredited private 13 schools in order to ensure substantial compliance with the 14 provisions of this section; 15 monitor compliance with the requirements (3) 16 of this section; and 17 (4) compile such information as is necessary 18 to evaluate the success of next-step plans and report annually, 19 by December 15, to the legislative education study committee 20 and the governor. 21 Successful completion of a minimum of twenty-F. 22 three units aligned to the state academic content and 23 performance standards shall be required for graduation. These 24 units shall be as follows: 25 .193695.2

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1	(1) four units in English, with major emphasis
2	on grammar and literature;
3	(2) three units in mathematics, at least one
4	of which is equivalent to the algebra l level or higher;
5	(3) two units in science, one of which shall
6	have a laboratory component; provided, however, that with
7	students entering the ninth grade beginning in the 2005-2006
8	school year, three units in science shall be required, one of
9	which shall have a laboratory component;
10	(4) three units in social science, which shall
11	include United States history and geography, world history and
12	geography and government and economics;
13	(5) one unit in physical education;
14	(6) one unit in communication skills or
15	business education, with a major emphasis on writing and
16	speaking and that may include a language other than English;
17	(7) one-half unit in New Mexico history for
18	students entering the ninth grade beginning in the 2005-2006
19	school year; and
20	(8) nine elective units and seven and
21	one-half elective units for students entering the ninth grade
22	in the 2005-2006 school year that meet department content and
23	performance standards. Student service learning shall be
24	offered as an elective. Financial literacy shall be offered as
25	an elective. Pre-apprenticeship programs may be offered as
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electives. Media literacy may be offered as an elective.

G. For students entering the ninth grade beginning in the 2009-2010 school year, at least one of the units required for graduation shall be earned as an advanced placement or honors course, a dual-credit course offered in cooperation with an institution of higher education or a distance learning course.

8 H. The department shall establish a procedure for
9 students to be awarded credit through completion of specified
10 career technical education courses for certain graduation
11 requirements.

I. Successful completion of the requirements of the New Mexico diploma of excellence shall be required for graduation for students entering the ninth grade beginning in the 2009-2010 school year. Successful completion of a minimum of twenty-four units aligned to the state academic content and performance standards shall be required to earn a New Mexico diploma of excellence. These units shall be as follows:

(1) four units in English, with major emphasison grammar, nonfiction writing and literature;

(2) four units in mathematics, of which oneshall be the equivalent to or higher than the level of algebra2, unless the parent submitted written, signed permission forthe student to complete a lesser mathematics unit; and providedthat a financial literacy course that meets state mathematics

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academic content and performance standards shall qualify as one
 of the four required mathematics units;
 (3) three units in science, two of which shall

3 (3) three units in science, two of which shall
4 have a laboratory component;

5 (4) three and one-half units in social
6 science, which shall include United States history and
7 geography, world history and geography, government and
8 economics and one-half unit of New Mexico history;

(5)

(6) one unit in one of the following: a career cluster course, workplace readiness or a language other than English; and

one unit in physical education;

(7) seven and one-half elective units that meet department content and performance standards. Student service learning shall be offered as an elective. Financial literacy shall be offered as an elective. Pre-apprenticeship programs may be offered as electives. Media literacy may be offered as an elective.

J. For students entering the eighth grade in the 2012-2013 school year, a course in health education is required prior to graduation. Health education may be required in either middle school or high school, as determined by the school district. Each school district shall submit to the department by the beginning of the 2011-2012 school year a health education implementation plan for the 2012-2013 and

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subsequent school years, including in which grade health education will be required and how the course aligns with department content and performance standards.

K. Final examinations shall be administered to all students in all classes offered for credit.

Until July 1, 2010, a student who has not passed L. a state graduation examination in the subject areas of reading, English, mathematics, writing, science and social science shall not receive a high school diploma. The state graduation examination on social science shall include a section on the constitution of the United States and the constitution of New Mexico. If a student exits from the school system at the end of grade twelve without having passed a state graduation examination, the student shall receive an appropriate state certificate indicating the number of credits earned and the grade completed. If within five years after a student exits from the school system the student takes and passes the state graduation examination, the student may receive a high school diploma. Any student passing the state graduation examination and completing all other requirements within five years of entering ninth grade, including a final summer session if completed by August 1, may be counted by the school system in which the student is enrolled as a high school graduate for the year in which completion and examination occur.

M. [Beginning with] In the 2010-2011, 2011-2012, .193695.2

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1 2012-2013 and 2013-2014 school [year] years, a student shall 2 not receive a New Mexico diploma of excellence if the student 3 has not demonstrated competence in the subject areas of 4 mathematics, reading and language arts, writing, social studies 5 and science, including a section on the constitution of the United States and the constitution of New Mexico, based on a 6 7 standards-based assessment or assessments or a portfolio of standards-based indicators established by the department by 8 9 rule. The standards-based assessments required in Section 22-2C-4 NMSA 1978 may also serve as the assessment required for 10 high school graduation. The department shall provide specific 11 12 minimum scoring requirements for the standards-based assessment and the specific requirements of the portfolio of standards-13 based indicators to all school districts and charter schools no 14 less than one year before the requirements take effect. If a 15 student exits from the school system at the end of grade twelve 16 without having satisfied the requirements of this subsection, 17 the student shall receive an appropriate state certificate 18 indicating the number of credits earned and the grade 19 completed. If within five years after a student exits from the 20 school system the student satisfies the requirement of this 21 subsection, the student may receive a New Mexico diploma of 22 excellence. Any student satisfying the requirements of this 23 subsection and completing all other requirements within five 24 years of entering ninth grade, including a final summer session 25

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if completed by August 1, may be counted by the school system in which the student is enrolled as a high school graduate for the year in which all requirements are satisfied.

4 N. Beginning with the 2014-2015 school year, a student shall not receive a New Mexico diploma of excellence if the student has not demonstrated competence in the subject areas of mathematics; reading and language arts; writing; science; and social studies, including a section on the constitution of the United States and the constitution of New Mexico, based on the district-developed, department-approved end-of-course examinations in those subjects or the ACT or SAT test scores. The department shall provide specific minimum scoring requirements for the ACT and SAT to all school districts and charter schools no less than one year before the requirements take effect. The department shall also develop alternative methods for special education students to demonstrate competence and distribute those requirements to all school districts and charter schools no less than one year before the alternative methods take effect. If a student exits from the school system at the end of grade twelve without having satisfied the requirements of this subsection, the student shall receive an appropriate state certificate indicating the number of credits earned and the grade completed. If within five years after a student exits from the school system the student satisfies the requirements of this 25

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1	subsection, the student may receive a New Mexico diploma of
2	excellence. A student satisfying the requirements of this
3	subsection and completing all other requirements within five
4	years of entering ninth grade, including a final summer session
5	if completed by August 1, may be counted by the school system
6	in which the student is enrolled as a high school graduate for
7	the year in which all requirements are satisfied. Upon
8	adoption of an assessment aligned with the common core state
9	standards, that assessment shall be added to the options for
10	demonstrating competence for a New Mexico diploma of
11	<u>excellence.</u>
12	[N.] <u>O.</u> As used in this section:
13	(1) "final next-step plan" means a next-step
14	plan that shows that the student has committed or intends to
15	commit in the near future to a four-year college or university,
16	a two-year college, a trade or vocational program, an
17	internship or apprenticeship, military service or a job;
18	(2) "interim next-step plan" means an annual
19	next-step plan in which the student specifies post-high-school
20	goals and sets forth the coursework that will allow the student
21	to achieve those goals; and
22	(3) "next-step plan" means an annual personal
23	written plan of studies developed by a student in a public
24	school or other state-supported school or institution in
25	consultation with the student's parent and school counselor or
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1	other school official charged with coursework planning for the
2	student that includes one or more of the following:
3	(a) advanced placement or honors
4	courses;
5	(b) dual-credit courses offered in
6	cooperation with an institution of higher education;
7	(c) distance learning courses;
8	(d) career-technical courses; and
9	(e) pre-apprenticeship programs.
10	$[\Theta_{\bullet}]$ <u>P</u> . The secretary may establish a policy to
11	provide for administrative interpretations to clarify
12	curricular and testing provisions of the Public School Code."
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
