PTSD, Agent Orange, as well as physical injuries have plagued our Vietnam Veterans for over 50 years. These men and women not only came back with these injuries but were constantly faced with treatment that was less than patriotic, still these men and women reached out to other veterans have become examples of selflessness and service. To this day, they continue to reach out to younger veterans as mentors,
