AN ACT

AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE AND SALE OF CAPITAL PROJECTS GENERAL OBLIGATION BONDS TO MAKE CAPITAL EXPENDITURES FOR SENIOR CITIZEN FACILITY IMPROVEMENTS AND ACQUISITIONS, FOR LIBRARY ACQUISITIONS, FOR PRE-KINDERGARTEN CLASSROOM CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS AND SCHOOL BUS ACQUISITIONS, FOR CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS AND ACQUISITIONS FOR PUBLIC SAFETY AND FOR CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS AND ACQUISITIONS AT INSTITUTIONS OF HIGHER EDUCATION, STATE SPECIAL SCHOOLS AND TRIBAL SCHOOLS; PROVIDING FOR A TAX LEVY FOR PAYMENT OF PRINCIPAL OF, INTEREST ON AND CERTAIN COSTS RELATED TO THE BONDS; REQUIRING APPROVAL OF THE REGISTERED VOTERS AT THE 2016 GENERAL ELECTION OF THE STATE; DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.--This act may be cited as the

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1 "2016 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act".

2 SECTION 2. PURPOSE.--For the purpose of providing funds
3 for capital expenditures as authorized in the 2016 Capital
4 Projects General Obligation Bond Act, general obligation
5 indebtedness of the state is authorized for the purposes and in
6 the amounts set forth in Section 10 of that act.

7 SECTION 3. BOND TERMS.--

8 A. The state board of finance, except as limited by
9 the 2016 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act, shall
10 determine the terms, covenants and conditions of bonds issued
11 pursuant to that act, including but not limited to:

12 (1) date or dates of issue, denominations and
13 maturities;

14 (2) principal amounts;

15 (3) rate or rates of interest; and

16 (4) provisions for redemption, including
17 premiums, registration and refundability, whether the bonds are
18 issued in one or more series and other covenants relating to
19 the bonds and the issuance thereof.

20 B. The bonds shall be in such form as the state
21 board of finance determines with an appropriate series
22 designation and shall bear interest payable as set forth in the
23 resolution of the state board of finance.

24 C. Payment of the principal of the bonds shall
25 begin not more than two years after the date of their issuance,

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1 and the bonds shall mature not later than ten years after the
2 date of their issuance. Both principal and interest shall be
3 payable in lawful money of the United States at the office of
4 the paying agent within or without the state as the state board
5 of finance may direct.

6 D. The bonds shall be executed with the manual or
7 facsimile signature of the governor or the state treasurer, and
8 the seal or a facsimile of the seal of the state shall be
9 placed on each bond, except for any series of bonds issued in
10 book entry or similar form without the delivery of physical
11 securities.

12 E. The bonds shall be issued in accordance with the
13 provisions of the 2016 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond
14 Act, the Supplemental Public Securities Act and the Uniform
15 Facsimile Signature of Public Officials Act and may be issued
16 in accordance with the Public Securities Short-Term Interest
17 Rate Act.

18 F. The full faith and credit of the state is
19 pledged for the prompt payment when due of the principal of and
20 interest on all bonds issued and sold pursuant to the 2016
21 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act.

22 **SECTION 4. EXPENDITURES.**--The proceeds from the sale of
23 the bonds shall be expended solely for providing money to be
24 distributed for the purposes and in amounts not to exceed the
25 amounts set forth in Section 10 of the 2016 Capital Projects

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1 General Obligation Bond Act and to pay expenses incurred under
2 Section 6 of that act. Any proceeds from the sale of the bonds
3 that are not required for the purposes set forth in Sections 6
4 and 10 of that act shall be used for the purpose of paying the
5 principal of and interest on the bonds.

6 SECTION 5. SALE.--The bonds authorized under the 2016
7 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act shall be sold by
8 the state board of finance at such time and in such manner and
9 amounts as the board may elect. The bonds may be sold at
10 private sale or at public sale, in either case at not less than
11 par plus accrued interest to the date of delivery. If sold at
12 public sale, the state board of finance shall publish a notice
13 of the time and place of sale in a newspaper of general
14 circulation in the state and may also publish the notice in a
15 recognized financial journal outside the state. The required
16 publications shall be made once each week for two consecutive
17 weeks prior to the date fixed for the sale, the last
18 publication thereof to be at least five days prior to the date
19 of the sale. The notice shall specify the amount,
20 denomination, maturity and description of the bonds to be
21 offered for sale and the place, date and hour at which the
22 sealed bids shall be received. At the time and place specified
23 in the notice, the state board of finance shall open the bids
24 in public and shall award the bonds to the bidder or bidders
25 offering the best price for the bonds. The state board of

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1 finance may reject any or all bids and readvertise and may
2 waive any irregularity in a bid. All bids, except that of the
3 state, shall be accompanied by a deposit of two percent of the
4 principal amount of the bonds in a form acceptable to the state
5 board of finance. The deposit of an unsuccessful bidder shall
6 be returned upon rejection of the bid. The state board of
7 finance may also sell the bonds or any part of the bonds to the
8 state treasurer or state investment officer. The state
9 treasurer or state investment officer is authorized to purchase
10 any of the bonds for investment. The bonds are legal
11 investments for any person or board charged with the investment
12 of any public funds and may be accepted as security for any
13 deposit of public money.

14 **SECTION 6. EXPENSES.**--The expenses incurred by the state
15 board of finance in or relating to the preparation and sale of
16 the bonds shall be paid out of the proceeds from the sale of
17 the bonds, and all rebate, penalty, interest and other
18 obligations of the state relating to the bonds and bond
19 proceeds under the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended,
20 shall be paid from earnings on bond proceeds or other money of
21 the state, legally available for such payments.

22 **SECTION 7. TAX LEVY.**--To provide for the payment of the
23 principal of and interest on the bonds issued and sold pursuant
24 to the provisions of the 2016 Capital Projects General
25 Obligation Bond Act, there shall be and there is hereby imposed

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1 and levied during each year in which any of the bonds are
2 outstanding an ad valorem tax on all property in the state
3 subject to property taxation for state purposes sufficient to
4 pay the interest as it becomes due on the bonds, together with
5 an amount sufficient to provide a sinking fund to pay the
6 principal of the bonds as it becomes due, and, if permitted by
7 law, ad valorem taxes may be collected to pay administrative
8 costs incident to the collection of such taxes. The taxes
9 shall be imposed, levied, assessed and collected at the times
10 and in the manner that other property taxes for state purposes
11 are imposed, levied, assessed and collected. It is the duty of
12 all tax officials and authorities to cause these taxes to be
13 imposed, levied, assessed and collected.

14 **SECTION 8. TREASURER--DUTIES.--**The state treasurer shall
15 keep separate accounts of all money collected pursuant to the
16 taxes imposed and levied pursuant to the provisions of the 2016
17 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act and shall use this
18 money only for the purposes of paying the principal of and
19 interest on the bonds as they become due and any expenses
20 relating thereto.

21 **SECTION 9. IRREPEALABLE CONTRACT--AUTHORITY FOR**
22 **ISSUANCE.--**An owner of bonds issued pursuant to the provisions
23 of the 2016 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act may,
24 either at law or in equity, by suit, action or mandamus,
25 enforce and compel the performance of the duties required by

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1 that act of any officer or entity mentioned in that act. The
2 provisions of that act constitute an irrevocable contract with
3 the owners of any of the bonds issued pursuant to that act for
4 the faithful performance of which the full faith and credit of
5 the state is pledged. Without reference to any other act of
6 the legislature, the 2016 Capital Projects General Obligation
7 Bond Act is full authority for the issuance and sale of the
8 bonds authorized in that act, and such bonds shall have all the
9 qualities of investment securities under the Uniform Commercial
10 Code, shall not be invalid for any irregularity or defect in
11 the proceedings for the issuance and sale of the bonds and
12 shall be incontestable in the hands of bona fide purchasers or
13 holders thereof for value. All bonds issued under the
14 provisions of that act, and the interest thereon, are exempt
15 from taxation by the state and any subdivision or public body
16 thereof.

17 **SECTION 10. PROJECTS.**--The proceeds from the sale of
18 bonds issued under the provisions of the 2016 Capital Projects
19 General Obligation Bond Act shall be distributed as follows for
20 the purposes and in the amounts specified:

21 A. for senior citizen facility improvement,
22 construction and equipment acquisition projects, to the aging
23 and long-term services department:

24 (1) one hundred ninety thousand dollars
25 (\$190,000) to purchase and equip vehicles, including meal

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1 delivery vehicles, for the Albuquerque department of senior
2 affairs kitchen facility in Albuquerque in Bernalillo county;

3 (2) three hundred fifty-one thousand two
4 hundred dollars (\$351,200) for improvements to the facility to
5 address code compliance issues at Los Volcanes senior center in
6 Albuquerque in Bernalillo county;

7 (3) forty-seven thousand five hundred dollars
8 (\$47,500) to purchase and equip vehicles for the Los Volcanes
9 senior center in Albuquerque in Bernalillo county;

10 (4) thirty-five thousand dollars (\$35,000) to
11 purchase and install meals equipment for the North Domingo Baca
12 senior center in Albuquerque in Bernalillo county;

13 (5) nine hundred twelve thousand five hundred
14 dollars (\$912,500) to plan, design, construct and equip an
15 addition to the Palo Duro senior fitness center in Albuquerque

14 SECTION 11. ELECTION.--

15 A. Bonds issued pursuant to the 2016 Capital
16 Projects General Obligation Bond Act shall be submitted to the
17 registered voters of the state at the general election to be
18 held in November 2016, and, if they receive a majority of all
19 the votes cast thereon at such election, shall take effect upon
20 certification of the state canvassing board announcing the
21 results of the election. No bonds shall be issued or sold
22 under that act until the registered voters of this state have
23 voted upon and approved the bonds and property tax as provided
24 in this section. Any bonds issued under that act shall be
25 issued within thirty months from the date of such election.

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1 B. The ballots used at the 2016 general election
2 shall contain substantially the following language:

3 (1) "The 2016 Capital Projects General
4 Obligation Bond Act authorizes the issuance and sale of senior
5 citizen facility improvement, construction and equipment
6 acquisition bonds. Shall the state be authorized to issue

14 bonds and the collection of the tax as permitted by law?

20 C. Each question set forth in this section includes
21 a specific work or object to be financed by the bonds. If any
22 such question is not approved by a majority vote of the
23 electorate at the state's 2016 general election, the issuance
24 of bonds for the work or object specified by the question shall
25 be excluded from and shall not be part of the 2016 Capital

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1 Projects General Obligation Bond Act. The failure of a
2 question to be approved by the electorate at the 2016 general
3 election shall not affect those questions that are approved at
4 the election.

5 D. The secretary of state shall include the
6 submission of the capital projects general obligation bonds to
7 the people at the 2016 general election, and it shall be
8 included in the general election proclamation of each of the
9 county clerks. The secretary of state shall cause the 2016
10 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act to be published in
11 full in at least one newspaper in each county of the state if
12 one be published therein, once each week, for four successive
13 weeks next preceding the general election as required by the
14 constitution of New Mexico.

15 SECTION 12. ART IN PUBLIC PLACES.--Pursuant to Section
16 13-4A-4 NMSA 1978 and where applicable, the appropriations
17 authorized in the 2016 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond
18 Act include money for the art in public places fund.

19 SECTION 13. PROJECT SCOPE--EXPENDITURES--REVERSION.--

20 A. If an appropriation for a project authorized in
21 the 2016 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act is not
22 sufficient to complete all the purposes specified, the
23 appropriation may be expended for any portion of the purposes
24 specified in the appropriation. Expenditures shall not be made
25 for purposes other than those specified in the appropriation.

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B. The state agencies and state institutions to which money has been appropriated in the 2016 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act shall be responsible for monitoring the projects funded in that act to ensure compliance with the constitution and laws of New Mexico and shall cause to be reverted any unexpended or unencumbered balance remaining at the earlier of the third full fiscal year after issuance of the bonds or the termination or completion of the specific project. Reverted funds shall be deposited in the debt service fund established by the state treasurer for the purpose of paying the principal of and interest on the state's general obligation bonds.

SECTION 14. SEVERABILITY.--If any part or application of the 2016 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act is held invalid, the remainder or its application to other situations or persons shall not be affected.

SECTION 15. EMERGENCY.--It is necessary for the public peace, health and safety that this act take effect immediately.
