

1 AN ACT

2 AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE AND SALE OF CAPITAL PROJECTS GENERAL
3 OBLIGATION BONDS TO MAKE CAPITAL EXPENDITURES FOR SENIOR
4 CITIZEN FACILITY IMPROVEMENTS AND ACQUISITIONS, FOR LIBRARY
5 ACQUISITIONS, FOR CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS AND ACQUISITIONS AT
6 INSTITUTIONS OF HIGHER EDUCATION, STATE SPECIAL SCHOOLS AND
7 TRIBAL SCHOOLS AND FOR CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS AND ACQUISITIONS
8 FOR PUBLIC SAFETY; PROVIDING FOR A PROPERTY TAX LEVY FOR
9 PAYMENT OF PRINCIPAL OF, INTEREST ON AND CERTAIN COSTS
10 RELATED TO THE BONDS; REQUIRING APPROVAL OF THE REGISTERED
11 VOTERS AT THE 2016 GENERAL ELECTION OF THE STATE; DECLARING
12 AN EMERGENCY.

14 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

15 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.--This act may be cited as the
16 "2016 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act".

17 SECTION 2. PURPOSE.--For the purpose of providing funds
18 for capital expenditures as authorized in the 2016 Capital
19 Projects General Obligation Bond Act, general obligation
20 indebtedness of the state is authorized for the purposes and
21 in the amounts set forth in Section 10 of that act.

22 SECTION 3. BOND TERMS.--

23 A. The state board of finance, except as limited
24 by the 2016 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act,
25 shall determine the terms, covenants and conditions of bonds

1 issued pursuant to that act, including but not limited to:

- 2 (1) date or dates of issue, denominations
3 and maturities;
4 (2) principal amounts;
5 (3) rate or rates of interest; and
6 (4) provisions for redemption, including
7 premiums, registration and refundability, whether the bonds
8 are issued in one or more series and other covenants relating
9 to the bonds and the issuance thereof.

10 B. The bonds shall be in such form as the state
11 board of finance determines with an appropriate series
12 designation and shall bear interest payable as set forth in
13 the resolution of the state board of finance.

14 C. Payment of the principal of the bonds shall
15 begin not more than two years after the date of their
16 issuance, and the bonds shall mature not later than ten years
17 after the date of their issuance. Both principal and
18 interest shall be payable in lawful money of the
19 United States at the office of the paying agent within or
20 without the state as the state board of finance may direct.

21 D. The bonds shall be executed with the manual or
22 facsimile signature of the governor or the state treasurer,
23 and the seal or a facsimile of the seal of the state shall be
24 placed on each bond, except for any series of bonds issued in
25 book entry or similar form without the delivery of physical

1 securities.

2 E. The bonds shall be issued in accordance with
3 the provisions of the 2016 Capital Projects General
4 Obligation Bond Act, the Supplemental Public Securities Act
5 and the Uniform Facsimile Signature of Public Officials Act
6 and may be issued in accordance with the Public Securities
7 Short-Term Interest Rate Act.

8 F. The full faith and credit of the state is
9 pledged for the prompt payment when due of the principal of
10 and interest on all bonds issued and sold pursuant to the
11 2016 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act.

12 SECTION 4. EXPENDITURES.--The proceeds from the sale of
13 the bonds shall be expended solely for providing money to be
14 distributed for the purposes and in amounts not to exceed the
15 amounts set forth in Section 10 of the 2016 Capital Projects
16 General Obligation Bond Act and to pay expenses incurred
17 under Section 6 of that act. Any proceeds from the sale of
18 the bonds that are not required for the purposes set forth in
19 Sections 6 and 10 of that act shall be used for the purpose
20 of paying the principal of and interest on the bonds.

21 SECTION 5. SALE.--The bonds authorized under the 2016
22 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act shall be sold by
23 the state board of finance at such time and in such manner
24 and amounts as the board may elect. The bonds may be sold at
25 private sale or at public sale, in either case at not less

1 than par plus accrued interest to the date of delivery. If
2 sold at public sale, the state board of finance shall publish
3 a notice of the time and place of sale in a newspaper of
4 general circulation in the state and may also publish the
5 notice in a recognized financial journal outside the state.
6 The required publications shall be made once each week for
7 two consecutive weeks prior to the date fixed for the sale,
8 the last publication thereof to be at least five days prior
9 to the date of the sale. The notice shall specify the
10 amount, denomination, maturity and description of the bonds
11 to be offered for sale and the place, date and hour at which
12 the sealed bids shall be received. At the time and place
13 specified in the notice, the state board of finance shall
14 open the bids in public and shall award the bonds to the
15 bidder or bidders offering the best price for the bonds. The
16 state board of finance may reject any or all bids and
17 readvertise and may waive any irregularity in a bid. All
18 bids, except that of the state, shall be accompanied by a
19 deposit of two percent of the principal amount of the bonds
20 in a form acceptable to the state board of finance. The
21 deposit of an unsuccessful bidder shall be returned upon
22 rejection of the bid. The state board of finance may also
23 sell the bonds or any part of the bonds to the state
24 treasurer or state investment officer. The state treasurer
25 or state investment officer is authorized to purchase any of

1 the bonds for investment. The bonds are legal investments
2 for any person or board charged with the investment of any
3 public funds and may be accepted as security for any deposit
4 of public money.

5 SECTION 6. EXPENSES.--The expenses incurred by the
6 state board of finance in or relating to the preparation and
7 sale of the bonds shall be paid out of the proceeds from the
8 sale of the bonds, and all rebate, penalty, interest and
9 other obligations of the state relating to the bonds and bond
10 proceeds under the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended,
11 shall be paid from earnings on bond proceeds or other money
12 of the state, legally available for such payments.

13 SECTION 7. PROPERTY TAX LEVY.--To provide for the
14 payment of the principal of and interest on the bonds issued
15 and sold pursuant to the provisions of the 2016 Capital
16 Projects General Obligation Bond Act, there shall be and
17 there is hereby imposed and levied during each year in which
18 any of the bonds are outstanding an ad valorem tax on all
19 property in the state subject to property taxation for state
20 purposes sufficient to pay the interest as it becomes due on
21 the bonds, together with an amount sufficient to provide a
22 sinking fund to pay the principal of the bonds as it becomes
23 due, and, if permitted by law, ad valorem taxes may be
24 collected to pay administrative costs incident to the
25 collection of such taxes. The taxes shall be imposed,

1 levied, assessed and collected at the times and in the manner
2 that other property taxes for state purposes are imposed,
3 levied, assessed and collected. It is the duty of all tax
4 officials and authorities to cause these taxes to be imposed,
5 levied, assessed and collected.

6 SECTION 8. TREASURER--DUTIES.--The state treasurer
7 shall keep separate accounts of all money collected pursuant
8 to the taxes imposed and levied pursuant to the provisions of
9 the 2016 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act and
10 shall use this money only for the purposes of paying the
11 principal of and interest on the bonds as they become due and
12 any expenses relating thereto.

13 SECTION 9. IRREPEALABLE CONTRACT--AUTHORITY FOR
14 ISSUANCE.--An owner of bonds issued pursuant to the
15 provisions of the 2016 Capital Projects General Obligation
16 Bond Act may, either at law or in equity, by suit, action or
17 mandamus, enforce and compel the performance of the duties
18 required by that act of any officer or entity mentioned in
19 that act. The provisions of that act constitute an
20 irrepealable contract with the owners of any of the bonds
21 issued pursuant to that act for the faithful performance of
22 which the full faith and credit of the state is pledged.
23 Without reference to any other act of the legislature, the
24 2016 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act is full
25 authority for the issuance and sale of the bonds authorized

1 in that act, and such bonds shall have all the qualities of
2 investment securities under the Uniform Commercial Code,
3 shall not be invalid for any irregularity or defect in the
4 proceedings for the issuance and sale of the bonds and shall
5 be incontestable in the hands of bona fide purchasers or
6 holders thereof for value. All bonds issued under the
7 provisions of that act, and the interest thereon, are exempt
8 from taxation by the state and any subdivision or public body
9 thereof.

10 SECTION 10. PROJECTS.--The proceeds from the sale of
11 bonds issued under the provisions of the 2016 Capital
12 Projects General Obligation Bond Act shall be distributed as
13 follows for the purposes and in the amounts specified:

14 A. for senior citizen facility improvement,
15 construction and equipment acquisition projects, to the aging
16 and long-term services department:

17 (1) one hundred ninety thousand dollars
18 (\$190,000) to purchase and equip vehicles, including meal
19 delivery vehicles, for the Albuquerque department of senior
20 affairs kitchen facility in Albuquerque in Bernalillo county;

21 (2) three hundred fifty-one thousand two
22 hundred dollars (\$351,200) for improvements to the facility
23 to address code compliance issues at Los Volcanes senior
24 center in Albuquerque in Bernalillo county;

25 (3) forty-seven thousand five hundred

1 dollars (\$47,500) to purchase and equip vehicles for the
2 Los Volcanes senior center in Albuquerque in Bernalillo
3 county;

4 (4) thirty-five thousand dollars (\$35,000)
5 to purchase and install meals equipment for the North Domingo
6 Baca senior center in Albuquerque in Bernalillo county;

7 (5) nine hundred twelve thousand five
8 hundred dollars (\$912,500) to plan, design, construct and
9 equip an addition to the Palo Duro senior fitness center in
10 Albuquerque in Bernalillo county;

11 (6) forty-seven thousand five hundred
12 dollars (\$47,500) to purchase and equip vehicles for the Palo
13 Duro senior fitness center in Albuquerque in Bernalillo
14 county;

15 (7) fifty-one thousand dollars (\$51,000) for
16 improvements to the facility to address code compliance
17 issues at the Glenwood senior center in Glenwood in Catron
18 county;

19 (8) twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000) for
20 renovations to the Quemado senior center in Quemado in Catron
21 county;

22 (9) ninety-one thousand dollars (\$91,000) to
23 purchase and equip hot meal delivery vehicles for the
24 Reserve senior center in Reserve in Catron county;

25 (10) forty-three thousand seven hundred

1 dollars (\$43,700) to purchase and equip a vehicle for the
2 Hagerman/Dexter senior center in Hagerman in Chaves county;

3 (11) forty-three thousand seven hundred
4 dollars (\$43,700) to purchase and equip a vehicle for the
5 Lake Arthur senior center in Lake Arthur in Chaves county;

6 (12) three hundred thousand two hundred
7 dollars (\$300,200) to purchase and equip vehicles for the

9 SECTION 11. ELECTION.--

10 A. Bonds issued pursuant to the 2016 Capital
11 Projects General Obligation Bond Act shall be submitted to
12 the registered voters of the state at the general election to
13 be held in November 2016, and, if they receive a majority of
14 all the votes cast thereon at such election, shall take
15 effect upon certification of the state canvassing board
16 announcing the results of the election. No bonds shall be
17 issued or sold under that act until the registered voters of
18 this state have voted upon and approved the bonds and
19 property tax as provided in this section. Any bonds issued
20 under that act shall be issued within thirty months from the
21 date of such election.

22 B. The ballots used at the 2016 general election
23 shall contain substantially the following language:

2 C. Each question set forth in this section
3 includes a specific work or object to be financed by the
4 bonds. If any such question is not approved by a majority
5 vote of the electorate at the state's 2016 general election,
6 the issuance of bonds for the work or object specified by the
7 question shall be excluded from and shall not be part of the
8 2016 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act. The
9 failure of a question to be approved by the electorate at the
10 2016 general election shall not affect those questions that
11 are approved at the election.

12 D. The secretary of state shall include the
13 submission of the capital projects general obligation bonds
14 to the people at the 2016 general election, and it shall be
15 included in the general election proclamation of each of the
16 county clerks. The secretary of state shall cause the 2016
17 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act to be published
18 in full in at least one newspaper in each county of the state
19 if one be published therein, once each week, for four
20 successive weeks next preceding the general election as

22 SECTION 12. ART IN PUBLIC PLACES.--Pursuant to
23 Section 13-4A-4 NMSA 1978 and where applicable, the
24 appropriations authorized in the 2016 Capital Projects
25 General Obligation Bond Act include money for the art in

1 public places fund.

2 SECTION 13. PROJECT SCOPE--EXPENDITURES--REVERSION.--

3 A. If an appropriation for a project authorized
4 in the 2016 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act is
5 not sufficient to complete all the purposes specified, the
6 appropriation may be expended for any portion of the purposes
7 specified in the appropriation. Expenditures shall not be
8 made for purposes other than those specified in the
9 appropriation.

10 B. The state agencies and state institutions to
11 which money has been appropriated in the 2016 Capital
12 Projects General Obligation Bond Act shall be responsible for
13 monitoring the projects funded in that act to ensure
14 compliance with the constitution and laws of New Mexico and
15 shall cause to be reverted any unexpended or unencumbered
16 balance remaining at the earlier of the third full fiscal
17 year after issuance of the bonds or the termination or
18 completion of the specific project. Reverted funds shall be
19 deposited in the debt service fund established by the state
20 treasurer for the purpose of paying the principal of and
21 interest on the state's general obligation bonds.

22 SECTION 14. SEVERABILITY.--If any part or application
23 of the 2016 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act is
24 held invalid, the remainder or its application to other
25 situations or persons shall not be affected.

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SECTION 15. EMERGENCY.--It is necessary for the public
peace, health and safety that this act take effect
immediately. _____
