The Ocotillo Institute for Social Justice in Las Cruces, New Mexico has as its mission to share information, to collaborate, and to build capacity and leadership by providing general operating support through a W.K. Kellogg grant that focuses on Civic Involvement. Ngage New Mexico (Ngage) developed its SUCCESS Partnership to involve a composite of community members and includes two hundred twenty five (225) partners, collectively addressing the needs of the over 64,000 children and youth of Dona Ana County. SUCCESS provides information and resources to students, parents and teachers to build stronger educational capacity and outcomes for children and youth.

The Mayor's Top Teens Programs, such as that of Las Cruces and Hatch, are designed to encourage communities to develop positive images of youth by recognizing and celebrating diverse high school teens, who normally do not receive recognition, that are nominated by community members. The Top Teens Programs collaborate with youth-service organizations and businesses that are advocates for youth.

SM12 also resolves to increase community-based partnerships that involve youth throughout the state and specifically with Native American governing bodies. Organizations such as First Nations, which involves Native American youth in youth-based projects, are built on the belief that "Native youth represent the future of Native communities, and that their health and well-being determines the future health and well-being of a community overall. By investing in youth and giving them a sense of place and tradition in the community, a community ensures that it will have bright and capable future leaders."
